REACHING HIGHER

"The rung of a ladder was never meant to rest upon, but only to hold a man's foot long enough to enable him to put the other somewhat higher." Thomas Huxley

Reflecting back on 2023, we see that it was a year of reaching higher – of striving to build upon the strengths of our past and our solid foundation to reach higher, to stretch further, to continue to strive to have a broader and more meaningful impact.

As a result, 2023 was a year of many firsts for Alexander JFS. The year began at the 110th Annual Meeting with the announcement of our new name. Adding Joan and Stanford Alexander's name to ours was a natural outgrowth of the tremendous impact this philanthropic couple has had – and continues to have – on our agency's development. Adding such a highly respected name to ours very quickly drew attention at a local and national level. Alexander JFS has become synonymous with high quality, professional services delivered with expertise and compassion.

The naming was meant to serve as a positive catalyst for others to partner with the agency in our mission. A quote from Joan Alexander, at the annual meeting, illustrates:

I know Stanford would join me in saying that the best way that anyone can acknowledge the new Alexander JFS name is to continue to support the work of the agency. Knowing that our affiliation has inspired others to join in this sacred work honors our dream that JFS will remain an asset to the community for generations to come.

This exciting rebranding set the stage for many other "firsts" in 2023. The agency reached out into a new community and added a second location for Celebration Company, the extraordinary entrepreneurial program for adults with disabilities. Celebration Company West, located on Dairy Ashford at the JCC West campus, offers the same quality employment and life skills training that was developed at the original, central campus location and allows us to extend our reach into a community we had not served before.

In addition, Alexander JFS started its first partnership to offer affordable living for adults with disabilities. During 2023, we committed to upgrading six apartments at Noah's House that would serve families who wanted more independent living for their loved ones with disabilities. Uniquely, JFS provides support which keeps these residents connected to the community, allowing us to support them as they reach towards independence.

Our newly expanded Career and Employment Center, made possible through the generous response to "Paddles Up" at our previous gala, grew to include new tools and resources to assist our career coaches in expanding opportunities for clients who are reaching to improve their earning potential and gain increased financial security.

In our Behavioral and Mental Health Services department, we are reaching higher to broaden and deepen our work to prevent suicide and reduce the stigma around seeking care. For the first time, the agency trained over 100 teachers in a single day on Youth Mental Health First Aid. As more schools reach out to Alexander JFS for support after the tragedy of a student death by suicide, we have become a trusted resource for training adults who work with youth to become skilled in recognizing the early warning signs and more confident in knowing how to respond to the mental health needs of the youth with whom they interact.

The agency added programs and services to specifically address the needs of populations at risk: we added a teen counseling room and created collaborations that allow us to provide Behavioral and Mental Health services to specific populations. A good example of that is our work with Hillel Houston, providing a dedicated therapist for student referrals.

Reaching higher, Alexander JFS became a leading advocate for the new national 988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline for mental health emergencies. We created tools that we distributed to schools, synagogues, businesses, and community partners that help those in crisis know they are not alone and provide them information about how to quickly connect to help.

Reaching beyond Houston, we shared this resource with agency partners of the Network of Jewish Human Service Agencies (NJHSA), at a national conference providing resources to each of over 600 attendees so that they could replicate the program in their home communities.

Alexander JFS continues to be recognized as a national leader among our peers. Being able to present to our colleagues at the NJHSA national conference on how to successfully engage Board members using a proven model from Alexander JFS was also a highlight of the year.

Last year, we were focused on implementing new services and strategies of United Way's Second Century Vision to help raise families out of poverty. In 2023, we added the new goals of the "Hineni" project of our significant community funding partner, Jewish Federation of Greater Houston. The Federation's intensive community conversations helped articulate several ways Alexander JFS will participate in the future needs of the community, including providing our services to a broader geographic area.

We hope that you enjoy reading the highlights of 2023, as we share with you the stories, statistics, and impact of our vital, and above all, compassionate, services.

Your support allows us to fuel our passion to build upon past successes to expand our impact locally, regionally, and nationally. Thank you for sharing our passion to build a more sustainable community through broadening and deepening our impact. Together we will continue to reach higher.

2023 was the year that allowed for fully emerging from the unusual circumstances of Covid, with clients navigating the challenges of changed family dynamics and returning to the workplace.

October 7, 2023 was a seminal moment which deeply impacted the Jewish community

worldwide. BMHS was called upon to respond to the mental health needs of the local community, for individuals, families and organizations.

One client, whose initial response had been to enthusiastically join solidarity gatherings, soon became emotionally paralyzed with panic attacks. Speaking in the client's native language, her therapist helped her regulate her emotions. The client began to re-engage and reflect on her reactions. While she continued to grieve, she became better equipped to feel joy and see hope again.

BMHS therapists offer counseling in several languages, allowing clients to express their feelings and thoughts in their native tongue.

Alexander JFS provided Mental Health Support for the community after the events of October 7, serving:

Mental Health First Aid

Teaches a five step action plan to offer initial help to anyone showing signs of mental health distress, severe illness or mental health crisis, and then connect them with the appropriate professional peer, social or self-help care.

Bright Stars is an annual memorial service that invites family members to celebrate the special qualities and memories of their loved ones who tragically died.

In 2023, 10 individuals attended in person and another 15 families attended virtually. This intimate experience offers a positive experience on the journey to healing.



Alexander JFS was asked to send a mental health professional to accompany the Kehillah High trip to Israel in the summer of 2023. Katelyn Bleiweiss, MPH, used her community intervention experience to provide support for the staff and participants.

STORY: A sixteen-year-old joined a trip to Israel knowing no one and having trouble connecting with peers. Through physical and reflective activities and supported by staff encouragement, the teen started being able to share in groups and try bold activities like rappelling down a cliff. That fall he was seen sitting at a table with friends, laughing and talking. He was no longer isolated from the group.

Alexander JFS directly serves seniors with Coaching and Case Management and also provides outreach programs to provide food security, disaster preparedness, and to reduce the risks associated with isolation.

A 78-year-old client who does not speak English knew he needed help to pay a \$120,00 hospital bill. Also, he knew he did not have the money. He did know the Alexander JFS Case Manager at Pinemont would help him even if they did not speak the same language. She wrote a letter to the hospital, provided documentation and the hospital was able to write off the total bill.

Opportunities for Success

Alexander JFS partnered with Boys and Girls Clubs of Houston to teach teens pre-vocational skills and explore post-secondary education options with them. There were 70 teens who participated in the summer program, with 3 earning their NRF Foundation RISE UP Customer Service and Sales Certifications.



Working to Increase Salary Potential

Among the 34 clients who achieved full-time employment:

13 accepted salaried positions with an average salary of \$75,262 per year (lowest salary \$33,800 and highest salary \$145,600).

21 accepted positions that paid hourly with an average annual wage of \$35,152 (\$16.90 per hour) and the highest annual wages \$52,000 (\$25/hour)

CELEBRATION COMPANY GOES WEST



Joan and Stanford Alexander Celebration Company opened its second location. In September, 2023, Celebration Company West opened at the JCC West building on Dairy Ashford, due to a collaborative process working with the ERJCC. This location allowed for new opportunities for individuals living on the west side to access this entrepreneurial employment program.

Bailey was working three days a week at our central location, not able to attend five days a week because of the distance. When she heard about the new location coming closer to her home, she was thrilled, as were her parents. She was asked to participate in the planning of the space and program there, and was thrilled to be able to begin five days a week there when it opened in September.

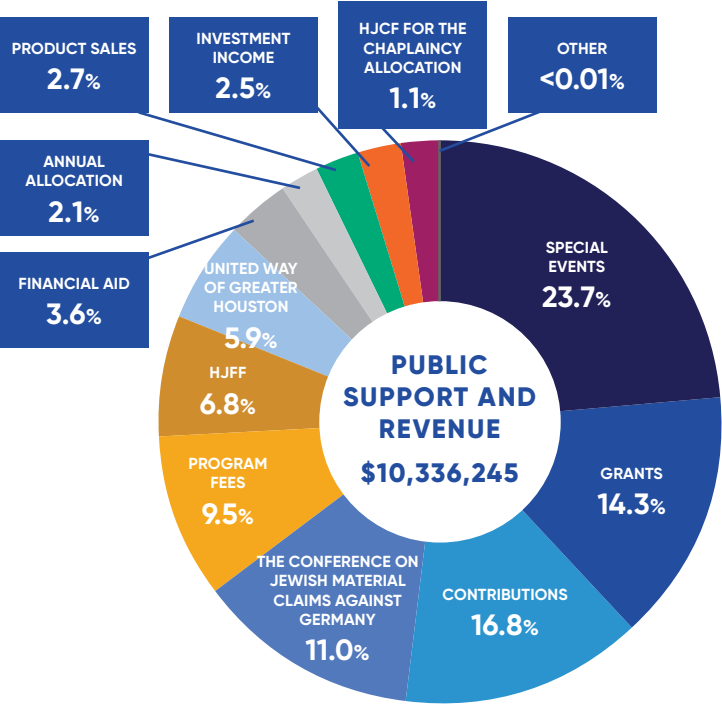

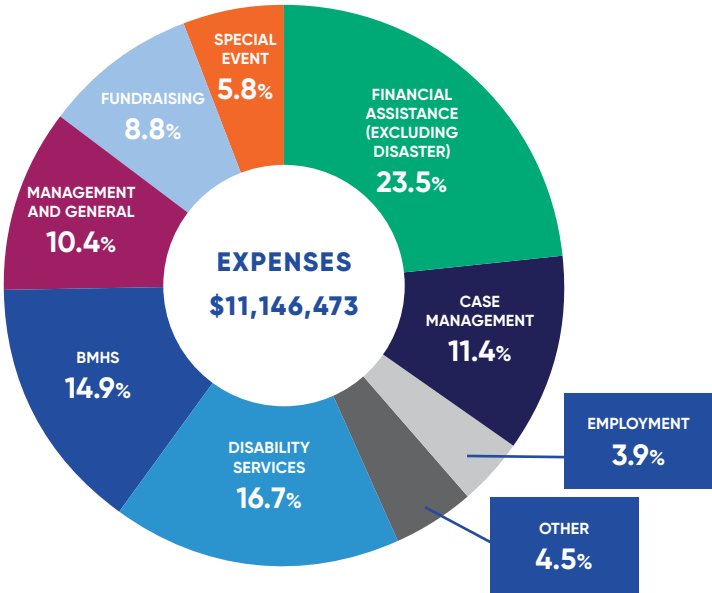
