21. ... those in... **humanitarian settings**... often bear a **disproportionate burden** of NCDs and MHCs;

22. ...since the adoption of the political declaration in 2018, issues such as... **humanitarian emergencies**... and other intersected crises have strained... **fiscal capacity**...;

48. Strengthen... health systems and social care policies... through measures such as...: (v) ensuring **access to care** for people in **humanitarian settings** and ensuring **continuity of care** for people during emergencies...;

70. **Integrate** NCD prevention and control... into **humanitarian response frameworks** to contribute to resilient and responsive health systems...;

71. Strengthen the design and implementation of **policies**... to treat people living with NCDs... in **humanitarian emergencies**...
