Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Restoring Hope Nepal (a nonprofit organization), which comprise the statements of financial position as of December 31, 2025 and 2024 and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Restoring Hope Nepal as of December 31, 2025 and 2024, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of Restoring Hope Nepal and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Restoring Hope Nepal's ability to continue as a going concern for one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with GAAS, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of Restoring Hope Nepal's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Restoring Hope Nepal's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

1. NATURE OF ACTIVITIES AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Nature of activities

Restoring Hope Nepal (the Organization) is a non-profit organization exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The mission of the Organization is to provide vocational training and rehabilitative care to support restoration, reintegration and wholeness for women rescued from sex trafficking.

Basis of presentation

The Organization's financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP) as codified by the Financial Accounting Standards Board.

Cash and Cash Equivalents and Investments in Certificates of Deposit

For the purpose of the statement of cash flows, cash equivalents consist of cash and investments with original maturity of three months or less. Cash restricted for a particular purpose is not considered cash readily available and is not included in cash equivalents.

Promises to Give

Contributions are recognized when the donor makes an unconditional promise to give to the Organization. Contributions that are restricted by the donor are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets if the restrictions expire in the fiscal year in which the contributions are recognized. All other donor-restricted contributions are reported as increases in net assets with donor restrictions depending on the nature of the restrictions. When a restriction expires, net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions.

Categories of Net Assets

Net assets are classified as *without donor restrictions* in the absence of donor-imposed restrictions. This category includes net amounts that have been earned and expended according to donor and contract conditions and generally unrestricted activities. Net assets without donor restrictions are used to benefit the Organization at the discretion of the Board of Directors, and for internal operations and administration. This also may include net assets that are restricted by the Board of Directors of the Organization.

Net assets classified as *with donor restrictions* have donor-imposed restrictions that have not been met. Such restrictions may be met by the passage of time or use for a specific purpose, or the assets may be expected to be maintained in perpetuity.

Categories of Net Assets (continued)

Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met in the same reporting period are reported as *without donor restrictions*. Donor restrictions that expire by either the passage of time or purpose restriction(s) being accomplished are accounted for as net assets released from restriction and reclassified as net assets *without donor restrictions*.

Contributions

Contributions received are recorded as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted support depending on the existence or nature of any donor restrictions. The Organization received approximately 50% and 32% of contributions from a single source during the years ended December 31, 2025 and 2024, respectively.

Cost Allocation and Program Activities

The Organization allocates costs that can be identified specifically with a particular final cost objective directly to the services benefiting. Joint costs are allocated to program services, administrative support, and fundraising on the basis of estimates identifiable with such services. The primary activity groups and their related purposes are summarized as follows:

Program Services – Consists of funds expended for providing vocational training and rehabilitative care with physical and emotional support. Examples include supplies for the location in Nepal, travel expenses to Nepal, and space costs in Nepal.

Administrative Support – Consists of funds that are used for administering the Organization and those activities that are not directly attributable to program services such as accounting and administrative overhead costs.

Fundraising – Consists of costs associated with activities and events that are designed to create public awareness and financial support for the Organization's programs.

Advertising

The Organization expenses advertising costs as they are incurred. The Organization had advertising costs of \$2,549 and \$744 for the years ended December 31, 2025 and 2024.

Management Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Income Taxes

The Organization is exempt from income tax under provisions of Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. This code enables the Organization to accept donations that qualify as charitable contributions to the donor. However, income from certain activities not directly related to the Organization's tax-exempt purpose is subject to taxation as unrelated business income. No provision for income tax has been recorded in the financial statements as management does not believe there was any unrelated business taxable income in 2025 and 2024.

With few exceptions, the Organization's information returns are not subject to examination for tax years prior to 2022.

2. LIQUIDITY AND AVAILABILITY OF RESOURCES

The Organization occasionally receives contributions or grant funds with donor restrictions. Because a donor's or grantor's restrictions require resources to be used in a particular manner or in a future period, the Organization must maintain sufficient resources to meet those responsibilities. Thus, financial assets may not be available for general expenditure within one year.

The Organization considers contributions with donor restrictions for use in current programs which are ongoing, major, and central to its annual operations to be available to meet cash needs for general expenditures. General expenditures include administrative and general expenses, and fundraising expenses to be paid in the subsequent year. Annual operations are defined as activities occurring during the Organization's fiscal year.
