Community Organizations Launch Walla Walla Valley Hunger Relief Coalition to Meet Local Food Needs, Call for Donations of Funds and Food

WALLA WALLA, WA, October 28, 2025 – Dozens of community organizations announced a coordinated response to fighting hunger through a new Walla Walla Valley Hunger Relief Coalition (WWVHRC), led by Blue Mountain Action Council (BMAC), which is the region's food bank for Walla Walla, Columbia, and Garfield Counties. The WWVHRC is asking community members to donate funds and food to the WWVHRC to address the possibility that the federal Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), also known as food stamps, will not issue benefits on November 1 due to the shutdown of the federal government.

SNAP benefits assist over 42 million Americans, including seniors, veterans, disabled individuals, and working families. According to the Department of Social and Health Services, in the broader Walla Walla region, over 4,000 households receive over \$1.3 million monthly to buy groceries from local stores. Our local food pantries and meal programs do not have the capacity alone to respond to the scale of this need. Funds donated through the WWVHRC campaign will primarily support the purchase of food cards from local grocery stores that can be donated to qualifying households throughout the region. This strategy will also help ensure that local grocery stores receive the benefit of this additional revenue.

"Our region has always prided itself on collaboration, and the size of this need is more than any one organization can address. By coordinating our efforts, we will be able to feed more families by purchasing food cards and food in bulk," said BMAC CEO Danielle Garbe Reser. "We invite all community members and organizations to join with us to support area families and our local grocery stores."

Ways to join in the effort to fight hunger include:

Fundraising:

- **Become a Champion:** Recruit your friends, family, and colleagues to join the program alongside you.
- **Local Donation Partnerships:** Local stores have partnerships to support food needs in the region, including:
 - Andy's Market customers can donate their points to BMAC through the end of December.

 Safeway clients can purchase "Turkey Bucks" to support local food purchasing.

Food Raising:

- Donate to BMAC Food Bank: Donations of shelf-stable pantry items or fresh produce can be dropped off at the BMAC Food Bank, 921 W. Cherry Street in Walla Walla from 8:00am-2:00pm, Monday-Friday. BMAC distributes donated food to all area pantries. See the list of needed items here.
- **Donate via a Donation Barrel:** There are food donation barrels available at the following locations:

- Host a Food Drive: Businesses, churches, organizations, or families wanting to organize a food drive can see BMAC's "Do It Yourself Kit" here.

Anyone in need of food assistance can access the local network of food pantries and meal programs. The current schedule is available on the BMAC <u>website</u>. BMAC will be planning food card distribution days to current SNAP recipients and will announce the dates, times, and location for those distributions in the coming days.

Local food programs have already seen a significant uptick in food need in the region given the higher cost of food in recent years. The Washington State Department of Agriculture estimates that usage at food pantries in our state has increased 77% since 2022 while food availability has only increased 38%. For instance, the Walla Walla Senior Center provides 215 Meals on Wheels meals each day, and its nutrition programs have grown 94% from 2019 to 2024. BMAC's Food Bank usage has grown 200% since pre-COVID numbers.

the federal government remains closed to provide local service coordination and assistance.

BMAC is our region's designated community action agency and home to our region's food bank. The BMAC Food Bank has the warehousing, storage, and distribution capacity to support food pantries across Walla Walla, Columbia, Garfield, and Asotin Counties.
