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QUESTION 1

Concept Tips

- · Use formal greetings with teachers.
- · Reserve casual words for friends or family.
- Notice titles like 'Ms' or 'Mr' show respect at school.

- 1. At school, teachers are addressed more formally than family or friends.
- 2. 'Good morning, Ms Lee.' uses a polite phrase and the teacher's title, which is correct for school.
- 3. Other options use casual or incorrect greetings for a teacher.

Concept Tips

- 'Home words' are used with family.
- 'School words' often use titles and polite phrases.
- Recognise who you talk to at home vs. school.

- 3. The other options are for school or polite conversation.

QUESTION 3

Concept Tips

- Polite words show respect.
- Adding 'please' makes requests kind.
- Use gentle tone when asking adults for help.

- 1. Requests to teachers should be polite and respectful.
- 2. 'Excuse me' and 'please' are both polite phrases, making option 2 best.
- 3. Other options are too demanding or rude.

Concept Tips

- Relevant questions fit the topic or picture.
- Curiosity connects to what you see.
- Stay on topic in conversations.

- 1. The picture is of a wombat burrow, so questions should be about it.
- 2. 'What do you think lives here?' is about the burrow and shows curiosity.
- 3. Other questions are off-topic or unrelated.

- Move, it's my turn!
- Let me have a go!
- Can I have a turn, please?
- I want to go now!

Concept Tips

- Polite language gets better results.
- Adding 'please' is important.
- Kind requests use friendly words.

- 1. When asking for a turn, being polite is best.
- 2. 'Can I have a turn, please?' uses a question and 'please', making it polite.
- 3. The other sentences are demanding or rude.

Concept Tips

- Express feelings using 'I feel...because...'
- Being clear helps others understand you.
- Say why you feel that way.

- 1. To share a feeling, start with 'I feel' and give a reason.
- 2. 'I feel sad because I lost my hat.' is a clear way to express emotions.
- 3. The other options do not explain feelings or reasons.

Concept Tips

- Match feelings to kind actions.
- Polite requests show self-care.

- 3. Other choices do not show kindness or are off-topic.

Concept Tips

- Polite words help us show respect to teachers.
- Different greetings are used for friends and for adults.
- "Excuse me" is a polite way to get an adult's attention.

- 3. "Excuse me" is commonly used to politely ask adults for help.

Concept Tips

- Shopkeepers like polite words.
- "Please" is used when asking for something.
- The other words do not fit a shopping context.

- 3. "Please" is a polite word used to make a request.
- 4. So, the right choice is "Please."

In the playground, your friend asks, 'Do you want to play on the slide?' Which is a kind way to say you do not want to: No way!, I don't like slides, Go away, or Maybe later?

QUESTION 14

Concept Tips

- Kind words help keep friends happy.
- It's okay to say no, but how you say it matters.
- "Maybe later" is gentle and polite.

- 1. Look for a response that is not rude or hurtful.
- 2. "No way!" and "Go away" can sound mean.
- 3. "I don't like slides" is honest but could be improved with kindness.
- 4. "Maybe later" is polite and keeps the friendship positive.
- 5. So, "Maybe later" is the best answer.

QUESTION 15

Concept Tips

- "Ms Lee" is a formal name used for teachers.
- We use titles like "Ms" or "Mr" at school.
- Family names are usually Mum or Dad.

- 1. Read the second sentence: "Good morning, Ms Lee!"
- 2. Ms Lee is a name used for a teacher, not a family member.
- 3. So, you are talking to your teacher in the second sentence.

- 3. The correct answer is she is showing she likes bananas, because both the words and the smile express a positive feeling towards bananas.

- Facial expressions give clues about feelings.
- Tears are often a sign of sadness.
- A frown is not usually happy.

- 1. Notice the frown and tears in the picture.
- 2. Think about what those clues mean—tears and frowns often show sadness.
- 3. The correct answer is 'Sad' because those clues match feeling sad, not excited or hungry.

- · Good asking uses polite words like 'please.'
- Clear words help others understand you need help.
- Demanding is not polite.

- 1. Read all the sentences and think about which one asks for help kindly.

- 3. Therefore, Option 2 is the best way to ask for help at the beach.

Concept Tips

- Thumbs up often means 'good' or 'like.'
- Saying 'Yum!' is used when liking food.
- Look for clues in both gesture and words.

- 1. Notice the thumbs up gesture and the word 'Yum!'
- 2. Putting these clues together, they both show a positive feeling about the food.
- 3. The answer is 'She is showing she likes the food.'

Concept Tips

- Use words like 'do not like' to show dislike.

- 2. Option 2 says, 'I do not like mushrooms,' which clearly shows dislike.
- 3. Other options say you like mushrooms, so Option 2 is correct.

Concept Tips

- Polite words help when asking for help.
- 'Excuse me' and 'please' are respectful.
- Being clear helps others know what you need.

- 1. Review each choice for polite and clear language.

QUESTION 23

Concept Tips

- Feelings words help us say how someone feels.

QUESTION 25

Concept Tips

- People can show feelings without speaking.
- Waving and smiling are called gestures.
- Gestures are body actions that help share feelings.

- 1. Notice what Tim does: he waves and smiles, but does not talk.
- 2. Waving and smiling are actions with the body, not words.
- 3. These actions are called 'gestures', which are signs or movements to show how we feel.
