KEY GOALS



Determine the number and species of native plants needed statewide.



Coordinate seasonal propagation schedules.



Provide support for increased native plant nursery stock.



Match plants with riparian restoration projects.



Build community through outreach, education, and engagement opportunities.

What is RPPP?

The Riparian Plant Propagation Program (RPPP) coordinates with nurseries, conservation districts, and restoration groups to increase the native trees and shrubs available for riparian habitat restoration. RPPP is designed to provide a range of benefits, including improved water quality, erosion control, enhanced biodiversity, and the preservation of culturally significant areas in support of statewide salmon recovery efforts.

How it works

Propagation

Working with nurseries to increase the propagation of native trees and shrubs to be provided to conservation districts and other restoration groups to allow for long-term planning on restoration sites.



Cultivation

Annual funding to support conservation districts with the creation, expansion, or maintenance of cultivation sites to grow out plants.




Restoration

Matching plants with restoration groups for riparian restoration projects, including conservation districts, state or federal agencies, tribes, counties or non-profits.
