



Slurry & Water Safety

What is slurry

Slurry is the poo and wee from cows. We can also use slurry from pigs and chickens.

Slurry is stored in a tank or a lagoon on a farm yard.



What is slurry used for.

Slurry is a great fertiliser and full of nutrients to help our crops and grass to grow.

Agitation is when we mix and churn slurry before spreading it on our fields with a spreader.

How is it dangerous?

As well as being a drowning hazard, the bacteria in slurry produces a very toxic and invisible gas called Hydrogen Sulphide, H2S.

At a high level, this gas takes away our sense of smell & just one lungful can be fatal. The gas is released during agitation.



Animal Care

- Horse nuts / cubes



Zoonoses

Tractor Rules

Did you know you have to be a certain age before you can operate or travel in a tractor. See the table below to help you remember.


AGE	RULE	Where
<7 YEARS OLD	Not allowed to ride in a tractor	Ireland
<13 YEARS OLD	Not allowed to ride in a tractor	UK
>7 YEARS OLD	Allowed to ride in a tractor if there is a passenger seat & seat belt	Ireland
>13 YEARS OLD	Allowed to ride in a tractor if there is a passenger seat & seat belt	UK
>14 YEARS OLD	Allowed to drive a tractor. EXCEPT on public roads	Ireland / UK
>16 YEARS OLD	Allowed to drive a tractor on roads. Need a licence and training	Ireland / UK
EVERYONE	Seat belts must be worn by everyone travelling in a tractor.	Ireland / UK

We must never get too close to a moving tractor. The farmer will not be able to see you or hear you. At the **back**, **side and front** of the tractor are the **blind spots**. That means you cannot be seen in these places.








Tractor Safety Checklist

All farmers should check their tractor before using it! Number the checks below in the empty boxes. Discuss your answers.



- 1. CHECK TYRES good tyres = good control.
- 2. CLEAN CAB STEPS so no-one slips on the mud.
- 3. APPLY HANDBRAKE this prevents the tractor rolling.
- 4. CLEAN CAB FLOOR Rolling bottles can jam under pedals.
- 5. CLEAN WINDOWS & MIRRORS- so the farmer can see.
- 6. CHECK LIGHTS so the farmer can see & everyone can see the tractor.
- 7. P.T.O. correctly fitted and covered with safety chains.



Safe Stop Procedure (STOPIT)

The 'Safe Stop' procedure helps farmers stop and park their tractors safely. To help everyone remember, AgriKids calls 'Safe Stop', **STOPIT**

Quad Bike Safety

Quad bikes, also known as all-terrain vehicles (ATVs) are used on many farms. They help farmers transport food to animals, check on livestock and fields. To help us stay safe, lets all remember our 'ATVS'

A is for Age

Quads used on farms are only to be ridden by those aged 16 years or more!

T is for Training

Since November 2023 it is now the law that everyone using a quad bike are properly trained to do so.

V is for Visual Inspection

Farmers check tyres, electrics, fuel, water and oil levels. Also make sure there is no damage.

S is for Safety Equipment

Make sure to always protect yourself when using a quad bike.
See the list below

Personal Protective Equipment, (P.P.E.)



Remember: Quad bikes are not designed to carry passengers as they add weight to the vehicle, making it harder to control and more likely to tip over!!

Helmet: Protects from serious injury.

Boots: Provides better grip.

Long sleeves and trousers: Protects against cuts and scrapes.

Gloves:

Easier to grip and keep the farmer warm in winter.

Sunglasses: Help see on sunny days.

Hi Vis: Helps everyone see you!

Power Take Off (PTO)
What is a P.T.O

P.T.O stands for Power Take Off.

What does it used for?

A P.T.O takes power from a tractor so the farmer can use (power) other equipment and machinery such as agitators and balers.

Why is it dangerous?

The P.T.O. turns extremely fast, approx. 9-16 times per second.

How can farmers stay safe?

- Be sure P.T.O guards are fitted, in good condition and use the safety chains
- Start and stop the P.T.O. from the tractor seat
- Do not wear lose fitted clothing
- Detach or remove draw strings from sweatshirts and jackets
- Tie back long hair
- Never walk over a P.T.O. Walk around it



Weather


