

Lets get ready to visit the farm. What do we have to know, before we go!



















Colour in your high vis vest. Make sure it's nice and bright.
















Know your farm signs

As a class discuss some of the sounds animals make that tell us how they feel.













Cows & Bulls


Farmers should always put a sign up to warn people if there is a bull in their field. T

Forward: Happy & alert






To the side - Sleepy

Never walk behind a horse!


They cannot see you and you could get kicked. Place X in the area where a horse could kick you. Then colour in your horse in your favourite colour.

Clean each thumb, one by one

Finger-tip twists, we're nearly done

Rinse them off and dry up too

They're clean, we're done good for you!





Tractors


We must never get too close to a moving tractor. The farmer will not be able to see you or hear you. At the back, side and front of the tractor are the blind spots. That means you cannot be seen in these places.








Wellbeing

Weather


