

Are there big jobs planned that day?



If the farm is going to be busy then it is NOT the time to go for a visit.

There could be machinery in full swing or animals being moved around.

Fern Sefety Signs



Yellow means be careful, take care. You need to watch out for things out there!



These signs are warning signs to be careful or to watch out for something

Hand Signal:



Red means stop or danger's near, Don't go ahead stay clear, stay clear!



These signs are warning signs for danger or to stay away.



Green means it's safe , you're good to go. Green points the safe way when you need to know!



These signs are for us to follow. They tell us where we can go or what we can do.



Blue is something you must do. When it's blue you have to!



These signs are signs for us to follow. They tell us things we must do.

Let's practise our hand signals together!







Pick up tools and store them properly

What are the sheds on the farm used for?

Safety Signs:





Fires



Most hay fires occur within the first six weeks after baling due to moisture.

Farmers must be sure not to bale or stack hay that is moist.

Safety Signs:





Safety in the sheds



Stay away from ladders and bales, pallets, tyres or anything else that you might find piled up on the farm.

Never try to play on these things on the farm.


Extra care must also be taken when fixing rooves as they may not be able to support an adult's weight.

Using a hydraulic crane will protect farmers from falling through rooves during repair work.

The Animal Pen



Farmers will keep animals indoors at different times of the year. In spring time many sheep and cattle are indoors as they prepare to give birth.

Why do you think we need to be careful around animals and their young?

The Animal Pen

Did you know: Freshly calved cows can cause more accidents on farms than a bull!

Safety in the sheds



Be careful around animals in the sheds.

NEVER enter a pen with animals without an adult.

The Animal Pen



Animals will behave a certain way to let us know how they feel.

They will use sounds, their ears and tails.

NEVER go near an animal that looks stressed or angry.

Safety Signs:





The Animal Pen Bulls



Bulls don't like anyone being too close to them in their pen or field.

NEVER enter a pen or field with a bull!

Safety Signs:



The Animal Pen Medicines



Sometimes animals may need to be given medicine by the vet or farmer.

Farmers must store these medicines in a locked medicine press or cupboard.

NEVER touch any bottle that you see in a shed.

Safety Signs:

Protect Yourself





Get some water, not too hot
Add the soap, quite a lot
Now clean on top and in between
Twist those hands, they're
NEARLY clean
Clean each thumb, one by one
Finger-tip twists, we're nearly
done
Rinse them off and dry up too
They're clean, we're done good
for you!

Wash your hands every time you are touch an animal to avoid zoonosis.

Safety Signs:

Protect Yourself





Farmers set up footbaths to disinfect shoes and boots which prevent diseases spreading among their animals.

Always disinfect your shoes and boots when you enter or leave a farm.

The Fields

What are fields used for on a farm?



Always make sure you have permission before entering a farmer's field!

The Fields





If it was closed when you got to it, close it behind you.

It is never safe to climb over fences, or to go into fenced off areas. They are fenced off for a reason!

Safety Signs:





The Fields Water

Farms can have ditches, ponds, streams or rivers which can be slippery and dangerous.

DId you know: Uncovered holes can easily fill with water if not covered in as well as water barrels, animal drinkers, etc can be a danger.

Look out for signs that warn you of any danger.

Stay away from water so you don't fall in.

Working at Heights Falls



When removing bales, farmers must do so from the top first.
Removing bales lower down the stack will leave bales unsupported, which could tumble and fall.

The main causes of a fall on a farm are:

- Bales of hay
- Bad use of ladders
 - Roof repairs
 - Untidy yard

Safety Signs:





Working at Heights Ladders



Children should NEVER use ladders on a farm.

Always secure ladders on firm ground
Never carry heavy items or lean sideways
Use platforms or proper equipment when possible

Safety Signs:





Working at Heights Roof Repairs





Remember to use the cherry picker.

Fragile materials like Perspex or galvanised sheets can break if stood on by a person's weight.

Electricity

Electricity is a kind of energy that can give things the ability to move and work. Eg. A TV, a hair dryer, lights, vacuum cleaners. All things with a plug use electricity to work



Where and how would a farmer use electricity on their farm?

Safety Signs:







Electricity

Farmers use electricity to help them with many jobs on the farm.

They need it for lights in the sheds, electric fences and clippers to shear sheep.



Always be careful around electricity!

Safety Signs:







Electricity

Electricity also powers heaters to keep baby animals warm and machines in the dairy that help milk the cows.







Always be careful around electricity!









Electricity The Fields



Farmers use electric fences to keep their animals safely inside certain parts of the farm.

NEVER touch an electric fence!

Safety Signs:







ElectricityPower Lines



Stay away from overhead cables and poles

Don't fly kites or use fishing rods near power lines

If a wire is on the ground, do not approach – call for help

Key Safety Rules From ESB Networks

- 1. Watch out for overhead electricity wires
- 2. Steer clear of electricity poles
- 3. Electricity wires are always live
- 4. Never touch fallen wires.
- 5. Never handle stock that may be in contact with electricity wires.
- 6. Display safety stickers on farm machinery to remind everyone to be "electricity safe"

Electricity Key Safety Rules

OVERHEAD WIRES

Farmers must be careful not to come in contact with overhead wires. If they do they must follow these steps:

- Never touch the machine & ground at the same time.
- Call ESB
 Networks
 1850 372 999.
- 3. Iffin danger, jump clear and stay clear. Landon your feet & don't touch the ground. Do not go back into the vehicle, it could still be live.
