She continued to live with her mother, Kathrine, and her brother, György (also known as Giora or George).



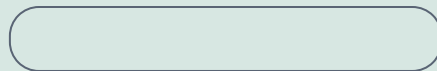
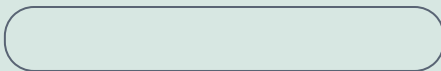

Chana Senesh was “writing” even before she actually knew how. When she started composing poems in her head - at the age of six! - her Grandma Fini wrote them all down by hand in a notebook.

At age 7 or 8, Chana felt that the Senesh family needed its own newspaper and she would be the editor-in-chief.

On completing high school, Chana experienced antisemitism and realized that the situation of the Jews in Hungary was becoming precarious.

She joined Maccabea, a Hungarian Zionist students organization and then decided to emigrate to pre-state Israel in 1939, what was then the British Mandate of Palestine.

What are we looking at?

An Israeli postcard and stamp from 1955, designed to remember Jewish parachutists during the Second World War.

Chana felt an urgent need to enlist in the struggle against Nazi Germany. She volunteered for the British Army and was selected for one of the most dangerous secret initiatives: parachuting into Nazi-occupied Europe to gather intelligence and help save Jews.

In March 1944, Chana and her comrades landed in Yugoslavia and crossed the border into Hungary.

The last letter that Chana Senesh would ever send.

It had been about two months since Chana parachuted. She sat down to write to her brother, writing in English since all letters were required to go through the British army censor before they were sent on to their intended recipients.

If she had written in Hungarian, it would have taken longer to translate and get approved. Chana wanted to be sure the letter would be quickly delivered to her brother.

Lyrics and musical score for “Eli, Eli”.

Chana wrote “A Walk to Caesarea” in 1942, describing a walk from her kibbutz, Sdot Yam, to nearby Caesarea.

In 1945, the words were set to music by Israeli musician David Zehavi. The song is also known as “Eli, Eli” and has become an integral part of Israeli culture. It is sung on Holocaust Memorial Day (Yom Ha'Shoah) ceremonies throughout Israel and in Jewish communities around the world.
