
Senesh family newspaper called "Kis Szenesek Lapja"

At age 7 or 8, Chana felt that the Senesh family needed its own newspaper and she would be the editor-in-chief.

Passport, letter to school in pre-state Israel, aliya certificate.



An Israeli postcard and stamp from 1955, designed to remember Jewish parachutists during the Second World War.

Chana felt an urgent need to enlist in the struggle against Nazi Germany. She volunteered for the British Army and was selected for one of the most dangerous secret initiatives: parachuting into Nazioccupied Europe to gather intelligence and help save Jews.

In March 1944, Chana and her comrades landed in Yugoslavia and crossed the border into Hungary.

If she had written in Hungarian, it would have taken longer to translate and get approved. Chana wanted to be sure the letter would be quickly delivered to her brother.

Chana wrote "A Walk to Caesarea" in 1942, describing a walk from her kibbutz, Sdot Yam, to nearby Caesarea.

In 1945, the words were set to music by Israeli musician David Zehavi. The song is also known as "Eli, Eli" and has become an integral part of Israeli culture. It is sung on Holocaust Memorial Day (Yom Ha'Shoah) ceremonies throughout Israel and in Jewish communities around the world.

The words to the poem (song) are out of order. Cut along the dotted lines and piece it back together. Each line includes the original Hebrew words, the Hebrew transliteration and the English translation.
