


OVER THE PAST 3 WEEKS...

of Government

I had the privilege of joining 46 remarkable classmates at the Harvard Kennedy School of Government—an international cohort of elected officials and public leaders from across the United States, Ireland, England, Pakistan, and Canada. Representing diverse sectors of city and state government, we came together to deepen our understanding of public service and sharpen our capacity to lead.

The program's rigorous curriculum spanned public policy, history, communications, leadership, finance, politics, and artificial intelligence—delivered through an intensive blend of case studies, experiential learning, group study, and dynamic classroom discussions. It was an environment that was as intellectually challenging as it was deeply supportive. The importance of local government as the front line of our democracy was strongly recognized. The experience was nothing short of inspiring, transformative, and energizing. I return home with a renewed sense of purpose, equipped with new tools, insights, and connections to serve more effectively.

Approximately 25% of eligible voters returned ballots, which, interestingly, was a higher turnout than the City Council election in April. It's also worth noting that this citizens' vote was a thorough rejection of the City Council's decision to move ahead with the annexation. I believe the vote constitutes an unmistakable mandate from citizens of Colorado Springs: enough with so-called "flagpole" annexations!

For years now, I have been very clear in my comments in Council chambers, articles in this newsletter, and official votes, that I think flagpole annexations are an irresponsible way to grow. While our City certainly does need more housing that is attainable and affordable, flagpole annexations far from the City create pockets of incorporated areas that are difficult to serve and maintain. They also stretch our most precious natural resource – water – since

Colorado Springs Utilities is obligated to provide service for all development within City limits. Furthermore, such annexations jeopardize public safety (think additional calls for service and increased response times) even as there is widespread recognition that response times need improvement.

I believe your City leaders (both in Council and Administration) need to show that we understand what the voters are telling us. We need growth that is responsible, considers impacts on all our resources while still balancing the needs for a thriving economy. This is an adaptive not a technical leadership challenge. While I will bring everything I learned through my experience which you will read about in the next article, your thoughts and approaches are welcome and needed!
