- Physical Plant Report:
 - o Chapel renovations are in full swing.
 - The Elementary building footings stabilization project is scheduled for the middle of July.
 - The concrete on the south end and partially on the west side of the MS/HS has been replaced.
 - O Steps on the south wing exit at MS/HS are fixed.
 - The high jump pad is complete.
 - o The parking lot is patched.
 - o The new Practice FB field at MS/HS is planted and irrigated.
 - Nearly New front sidewalk has been replaced.
 - o Playground plans for next year is progressing.
 - Hallway floors have received a fresh coat of finish and needed painting projects are in progress.
- As noted, we continue to make the necessary improvements and repairs to meet the needs of our students. Some of these projects are part of our budget and some are the result of

- generous benefactors. We will continue to make sure our physical plants are welcoming and adequate for our students.
- Institute of Catholic Liberal Education (ICLE) training for all faculty and some staff is scheduled for August 7-8. We will be starting with Mass at 7:30am and continue until 3:30pm each day. - Cell Phone Policy
 - Revisions to our cell phone policy are included in your board packet. With the approval of these revisions, student cell phone access will be eliminated during the school day.
 - Studies have shown this practice to positively affect students socially and academically. We have also talked with schools who are already cell phone free. They all report physically healthier students with better interpersonal relationship skills. Reports indicates students learn at a higher level and communicate more effectively.
- Personal Health Update:
 - o I will be undergoing open heart by-pass surgery in the next few weeks. At this point the date for surgery has not been set. I have been informed the recovery period may be as long as 6 weeks. • Institute of Catholic Liberal Education (ICLE)

- Meagan DesLauriers, Mandy Smid, Jennifer Goscicki, Mark Stone, and I will be attending the ICLE National Conference in Lincoln, NE, in July. "Over 500 bishops, priests, deacons, religious sisters, consecrated virgins, superintendents, diocesan leaders, principals, teachers, exhibitors, and supporters of Catholic liberal education will converge in Lincoln, Nebraska, for a program designed to nourish the souls of those involved in Catholic education."
- The teachers will be making adjustments to the decor in their classroom environments over the summer to better align with ICLE recommendations. "In the Catholic liberal arts tradition, the classroom is more than just a place of instruction—it is an extension of the home and a sacred space for the formation of the whole child" For our Roncalli Preschool 5th grade classrooms, our goal is to foster an environment that is developmentally appropriate, aesthetically peaceful, and deeply rooted in our Catholic identity.

PTO

• RPS Playground

Discussions continue regarding the next steps for the RPS playground project.
 The teachers have compiled a wish list, and we are working on developing a plan.
 After failed attempts to grow grass over the past two summers, we will not be trying to plant grass this summer.

• Summer CavClub Program

- O Shelby Braun and her amazing team are doing a fantastic job leading our Summer CavClub program, serving over 100 students this season. The campers have been busy exploring local attractions, including the library, parks, the Arboretum, and even taking a special trip to the RES STREAMLab.
- o They're hoping for a warm Thursday so they can head to the Aberdeen Waterpark. With plenty of summer still ahead, the team is excited to continue making memories and providing joyful, enriching experiences for all our CavClub kids.

• Building and Grounds

o A shout out to Jerit and Kathy, who are busy refreshing the buildings. Cleaning, painting, and reorganizing are on the agenda.

• Enrollment Updates

o For the 2025-2026 school year, we currently have 46 kindergarten students enrolled. We've also received several applications for other grades from new families for the upcoming school year, and we continue to provide tours and respond to inquiries. Full-time preschool is full with several on the waitlist. There are a few random spots available in the part-time room.

Back to School - New Families

- We are excited to welcome our new Preschool-5th grade families with a New Family Ice Cream Social this August at Wylie Park! This fun and informal event will be a wonderful opportunity for parents to meet one another and begin building connections within our school community. In this new format, high school student volunteers will be on hand to help supervise and play with the children, allowing parents to relax, enjoy some ice cream, and engage in meaningful conversation.
- We hope this gathering sets the tone for a welcoming, supportive year ahead while giving families a chance to get to know each other, and their children enjoy a fun evening at the park.

• NWEA MAP Testing

- We recently completed our second year of NWEA MAP testing for grades K-5. Prior to this, we used the ACT Aspire assessment for students in grades 3-6.
- o I am not a strong advocate of traditional standardized tests for younger students. These assessments, typically administered in April, offer only a snapshot of student knowledge and leave little room for instructional adjustment or meaningful follow-up. NWEA MAP, on the other hand, is a growth-focused assessment system that provides timely, actionable data to inform instruction throughout the year.
- Our students in grades K-5 were assessed in September, January, and May. This three-time testing cycle enables us to:
 - O Screen every student with an accurate, efficient, and effective universal screener
 - See student achievement at any testing point.
 - Place students into programs and interventions that will maximize their growth.
 - Drive instruction using strategic, data-driven decisions to help all students access grade-level content.
 - o Measure growth accurately over time using a grade-level scale.
 - o Compare student results to national norms to understand how our learners are performing relative to their peers.
 - Project proficiency for year-end summative tests. The tests can
 even predict future performance on high-stakes assessments like
 state tests, the ACT, or the SAT.
- O To make the most of this data, I created teacher committees in both Math and Reading, with one representative per grade level. These teams reviewed results collaboratively, both horizontally (within a grade level) and vertically (across grade levels). This work uncovered curriculum gaps, clarified instructional needs, and helped focus our professional efforts in powerful ways. Facilitating this process and witnessing the authentic collaboration among teachers was truly rewarding
- This model allows teachers to drill down into each student's needs and adjust instruction accordingly. We're now beginning to see the positive impact of the ELA curriculum changes made over the past few years.

 Starting this fall, our Title I Reading Program will be using the same ELA curriculum as our classroom teachers, further ensuring consistent strategies, shared language, and aligned instructional practices across all support settings.

• Student Growth on NWEA MAP Testing for 2024-2025

- o I am pleased to report that our K-5 students demonstrated strong academic growth on the NWEA MAP assessments this year. Across all grade levels, student performance exceeded national norms by 15 to 25 points in both reading and math. This significant achievement reflects the dedication of our teachers, the support of our families, and the effectiveness of our instructional practices.
- As we celebrate this progress, we remain committed to deepening our understanding of the data and using it to inform instruction. My team is focused on continually educating ourselves on how to interpret assessment results and make strategic adjustments to best support student learning and long-term growth.

• The following is additional information on understanding the value of NWEA MAP Growth Assessments:

- NWEA's MAP Growth assessments are used to measure student learning and academic growth over time in math, reading, language usage, and science. These adaptive assessments provide educators with timely, actionable data to inform instruction, support students in setting personalized goals, and help families engage in the learning process.
- The adaptive nature of MAP Growth ensures that each student receives appropriately challenging questions, helping them stay engaged and reducing frustration. The results reveal each learner's unique academic profile, enabling educators to chart more effective, individualized learning paths.
- o Here's a more detailed breakdown of why we use MAP Growth:

1. Measure Academic Growth Over Time

 MAP Growth assessments track how students progress between testing windows (e.g., fall, winter, spring) and across multiple school years. This provides a robust, longitudinal view of each student's academic journey, not just a snapshot of performance at one point in time.

2. Inform and Differentiate Instruction

- The data helps teachers identify both student strengths and areas where additional support is needed. This allows educators to:
- o Tailor instruction to meet individual and group needs.
- Adjust teaching strategies to ensure all students are challenged and engaged.
- o Focus resources and time where they'll have the greatest impact.

3. Guide Personalized Goal Setting

 Students can set and track personalized learning goals based on their MAP Growth data. Understanding their performance level and growth trajectory empowers students to take ownership of their learning and strive for measurable improvement.

4. Provide Timely, Actionable Results

Unlike many standardized tests that deliver delayed feedback,
 MAP Growth assessments provide timely results. This rapid

turnaround allows teachers to make instructional adjustments right away, rather than waiting until the end of the year.

Aberdeen Catholic School System 008.29 Student Cell Phone Policy

008.29 Student Cell Phone

Cell Phones may be brought to a school class or activity under the following conditions:

- 1) Phones must be OFF from 8:00 a.m. to 3:15 p.m.
- 2) Cell phones may not be used for picture taking on school premises or school activities.
- 3) Use of cell phones to harass or threaten is not permitted.
- 4) Those who violate any of the rules regarding cell phones will have the cell phone taken to the office where it will be kept overnight.

Mobile phones and smartwatches are prohibited during the school day. From a student's arrival at school until the final bell of the day, they are not to be used, seen or heard during any part of the school day. The building principal may authorize exceptions to this policy for health, safety, emergencies or as required by a Student Support Plan (SSP).
