Concrete reputation earned

Rangitīkei women win rafting gold

The New Zealand Open Women's R4 rafting team – all women from the Rangitikei – have won gold at the International Rafting Federation World Rafting Championships in Malaysia on 1-7 December.

The team was Emma O'Connell, Hazel Cumpstone, Janey Harrison, Keeva Harrison and Christina Donne-Lee, coached by Mangaweka's Paul Eames.

They competed in four disciplines: sprints, head-to-heads, slalom and downriver, winning gold in the

sprints and downriver events, and enough points to win

Eames said the experience was an excellent time away, topped off with a win.

"We knew that we had good river-runners, the river experience was the advantage," he said.

The team work and train on the Rangitīkei River.

They won the R6 Pacific Cup, held in Murchison, in March after practising only four times together.

Crew captain Janey Harrison said they had been going with the flow and, despite being competitive people, went to Malaysia for an experience.

"We surprised ourselves in that first race. To get out of the gate and win that gold in the first sprint, we thought 'shit, once again, we could give this a nudge and do well'," Harrison said.

"It was more grit than anything that got us there – we turned up to play."

She said returning home as world champions felt like a big thank you to the community which supported them.

Harrison admitted the past success of the Rotorua-based New Zealand Open Women's crew added extra motivation to perform well.

"It was pretty special ... those girls have won so many competitions over the last decade," Harrison said.

"The pressure was a little bit on to not let them down, so we felt pretty bloody good about bringing that gold home, not gonna lie.

"They were big shoes to fill but we managed to put our feet in them."

The Kampar River in Malaysia suited the crew, Harrison said.

"It worked in our favour because it was lower. They had a bunch of rain the week before but not much rain while we were there," she said.

"The majority of it was technical rafting, which is what we're used to, so it definitely worked in our favour."

Harrison was unsure what the future held and whether the crew would stick together or try their luck in different categories.

Building Skills for Conservation: Ōwhango Alive workshop trapping

Owhango Alive trappers recently came together for a hands-on trapping workshop hosted by the group's chairman, Mark Fredericks, as part of their ongoing commitment to protecting local taonga species and strengthening their predator control efforts across the rohe.

The workshop offered an opportunity for both new and experienced trappers to refresh their skills, share knowledge and learn best-practice techniques for trap placement, maintenance, safety and humane predator control.

Mark led practical demonstrations, assisted by Dean Wilson, who as a retired electrician, was able to guide the trappers through the intricacies of the AT220 trap, while answering questions, and sharing valuable insights from Mark's years of conservation and trapping experience.

"Workshops like these are a vital part of ensuring our

trapping network remains effective, safe, and consistent,"

"With predators constantly on the move, staying informed and connected as a team is key to protecting whio, kiwi, and other native wildlife that depend on predator-free habitats to survive."

Appreciation goes to Mark for hosting the day and to all the dedicated volunteers who gave up their time to attend, learn, and contribute.

"The strength of Ōwhango Alive lies in its people, and days like this remind us just how powerful community-led conservation can be."

Collaboration helps revive traditional Māori games for schools

When a group of schools recognised their tamariki needed more chances to experience traditional Māori games, they also knew the project would rely on collective effort. That support arrived through two organisations – Men's Shed Whanganui and Waters & Farr – who helped turn the idea into reality.

Teachers were inspired to introduce Pūkao, a traditional Māori game that tells the story of the kūmara and its harvesting, after attending a workshop led by cultural advocate Harko Brown. But Pūkao requires a specialised piece of equipment, the taroaroa, and finding enough for 25 schools, including within the Ruapehu District, posed a significant challenge.

Men's Shed Whanganui, known for its craftsmanship and strong community focus, volunteered to design and build the taroaroa. To make sure the equipment was safe and durable for tamariki, they needed high-quality materials. Waters & Farr responded by donating everything required for the build.

"When Men's Shed Whanganui approached us about this, we thought the project fit well with our values – we're a family owned business and we're part of the community so it seemed like a good initiative, both to support the Men's Shed and also schools and students," Derek Pickering from Waters & Farr said.

The partnership is a clear example of kotahitanga (unity) in action. Through the combined generosity and expertise of Men's Shed Whanganui and Waters & Farr, 25 schools throughout Whanganui, Rangitīkei and Rupaehu now have handcrafted taroaroa sets to bring Pūkao into their classrooms and playgrounds.

The benefits extend well beyond the equipment itself. The project gives tamariki a hands-on connection to mātauranga Māori and creates op-

portunities to engage with cultural knowledge in meaningful, active ways.

"Receiving the Pūkao equipment has had a positive impact on our tamariki and their engagement with traditional Māori games," said one teacher.

"Students and teachers were absolutely ecstatic to explore the equipment and quickly became immersed in learning and playing Pūkao. Having the proper resources really brought the pūrākau to life, helping them make meaningful connections between the stories and the gameplay."

Another added their thanks: "We are incredibly grateful to the Men's Shed and Waters & Farr for their generosity and support in making this kaupapa possible. Their contribution has allowed our tamariki to engage meaningfully with Ngā Taonga Tākaro, and we truly appreciate the time, effort, and goodwill they have invested in our school and the community."

Generosity and character rewarded

David Johnston of Manunui has been named the 2025 Ruapehu Citizen of the Year in recognition of his lifelong commitment to volunteering and community service.

Ruapehu's mayor Weston Kirton said the Citizen of the Year Award provides important recognition of the value Ruapehu places on volunteer workers and the vital role they play in strengthening communities.

"David is a very worthy and inspiring recipient," Kirton said.

"His countless hours of voluntary service have made a real and lasting difference to people and to the wider community."

Mr Johnston's community involvement spans decades and a wide range of roles. He has served as secretary of the Taumarunui and King Country Young Farmers and as chairperson of the Manunui Primary School Committee.

His commitment to emergency services includes 19 years as a volunteer firefighter with the Manunui Fire Brigade, where he rose to deputy fire chief, and nine years volunteering with St John Ambulance.

He also spent five years driving the local mobility van, helping residents access essential services and maintain social connections.

He has shared his professional building skills by constructing stage sets for the Choral and Operatic Society and contributed to community events through the Kakahi School Reunion Committee.

For the past 12 years, he has also volunteered with the Owhango Alive conservation group, supporting local environmental restoration.

Kirton said Mr Johnston's service reflects the best of Ruapehu's community "David is a great example of the selfless people who work quietly for many

years doing the important mahi that underpins our communities.

"This award recognises not only what he has done, but the generosity and character behind it."

A council spokesperson said there were no nominations for the Waimano Citizens Award for 2025. Asked if they would consider extending the nominations deadline, they said they already had once. It would be up to the Waimano-Waiouru Community Board if they extended it again; their next meeting is in March.


The cadet company of 40, which included three women
