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Looking To The Future

Our houses of worship are the crown jewels of our communities. The neighborhoods they serve grew-up around them over decades and today they address housing, hunger, immigration, arts and all of the other enumerable needs of their communities. And notwithstanding all of this generosity and all their strengths, these houses of worship cannot do it alone.

The idea of Bricks and Mortals started almost five years ago - with NYC faith leaders and members of the real property community coming together to ask, how can we save these houses of faith? With so many congregations across New York City struggling to keep up with their expenses, as the cost to maintain their historic property rose and their memberships declined, myriad of heterogeneous groups gathered together to tackle this question, realizing that they were not experiencing this alone, but rather, it was happening to houses of faith all across NYC.

This vision of Bricks and Mortals was formed then, around that table -- to impartially inform, educate and connect FBOs to professionals and resources, and to empower FBOs to plan and make the best decision to achieve their goals with their property. To empower the mortals to manage the bricks to serve their communities.

In June 2019, Bricks and Mortals was grateful to receive its first official funding, from the New York Community Trust, transforming this from a mere idea to reality. Since then, the organization has only continued to grow -- in impact and vision, if not in the size of our still small team.

With funding Bricks and Mortals has conducted regular meetings and outreach, created its first mayoral policy platform, and novel research to understand the depth and breadth of the needs of the faith-based communities' real property. Together with the support and expertise of our staff, Members, Board of Directors, and funders, we've done so much in such a short time; and we have even more potential.

We're gratified that many of the same people in that first conversation continue to walk with us today.

Thank you to everyone that has been with us since that first conversation, and everyone involved in building this organization from its nascency.

We have so much more to do, and so many more people to reach.



Starting January 2022




For a duration of three years (January 2022 - December 2024), we will bring on a National Expansion Director for the \$1 million Thriving Congregations grant that we were awarded from the Lilly Endowment in partnership with Partners for Sacred Places in Philadelphia and the Hartford Seminary.

This five-year grant includes cohorts of five congregations in five cities, will develop and offer a training program, a Toolkit on Adaptive Reuse (applicable for congregations of all faiths and suitable to a wide array of needs), and coursework for long-term capacity building for clergy.



STAFFED UP: 5 COHORT COACHES



While the five cohorts are active for the Congregational Learning Process for the Thriving Congregations grant, We five (5) Coaches will be brought on for a duration of two years (January 2022 - December 2023).

The Coaches will

provide direction for the

congregations in their city's cohort. This includes support for the four in-person trainings to be provided in the two years, as well as, building working relationships and providing guidance and advice for individual congregations in their cohort as they pursue their goals and adaptive

reuse projects.

NY Community Trust: 2019-21

NYCT awarded Judson Memorial Church a grant to establish Bricks and Mortals. This included hiring a coordinator, surveying needs of houses of faith across NYC, and establishing 501(c)(3).

This was a two-year grant, which ended in June 2021.

NY Community Trust: 2021-23

B&M was awarded a second NYCT grant, in partnership with Partners for Sacred Places, for a term of 24 months that begin after our first grant expired, in June 2021.

This project supports the development of a website for houses of faith to list their spaces to rent, particularly for artists, but also to other mission-driven groups, and more.




