

GOLDEN FLAME LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD



YAVAR ABBAS

RIVERSIDE STUDIOS Sunday 11 May 2pm

Yavar Abbas is a distinguished writer, broadcaster, journalist, and filmmaker whose work bridges cultures, languages, and generations. Born in Lucknow, the heartland of Urdu culture, and raised in a devout Shia family, Abbas was immersed from an early age in the poetic tradition of Meer Anees, whose epic Marsiyas inspired a lifelong passion for Urdu literature. His distinctive style of taht-ul-lafz recitation has been enriched by a career in broadcasting and filmmaking that spans continents and decades.

Educated at Allahabad University in English and Persian literature, Abbas seamlessly navigated roles as a producer, translator, and director at the BBC Urdu Service. He translated and adapted the works of Shakespeare, Wilde, Shaw, Chekhov, and many others into Urdu, producing seminal series such as Othello, Macbeth, Masterpieces of English Prose, and Historic English Speeches. His BBC series European Poets of Urdu remains a landmark contribution to cross-cultural appreciation.

As a filmmaker, his documentaries—including India! My India!, Faces of India, and Mother Ganges—offer deeply personal yet globally resonant insights into post-Partition India. His films, shown widely and celebrated at retrospectives including at the Cinémathèque Française, capture both the grandeur and grassroots of Indian life. A consultant to the UN and a cultural bridgebuilder, Abbas's work is grounded in pluralism, empathy, and unwavering commitment to truth. Urdu, and particularly Anees, remains his first and deepest love.

GOLDEN FLAME LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD



BIDDU

RIVERSIDE STUDIOS Sunday 11 May 2pm

Biddu was born in Bangalore, where he began his career in a pop group inspired by The Beatles and The Rolling Stones. Following early success in India, he travelled west with a guitar, a plastic bag of clothes, and no money. In the UK, he worked in a hamburger joint by day and wrote songs by night.

His big break came producing the unknown Carl Douglas and the 9-million-selling global No.1 hit "Kung Fu Fighting". He followed this with hits as the Biddu Orchestra, including "Summer of '42" and the Ivor Novello-winning "Rain Forest". He also wrote or produced classics for Tina Charles and Jimmy James: "I Love to Love", "Dance Little Lady Dance", "I'll Go Where the Music Takes Me" and "Now Is the Time".

He composed for the platinum-selling Joan Collins films The Stud and The Bitch. In Bollywood, "Aap Jaisa Koi" sung by Nazia Hassan was a game-changer, followed by Disco Deewane, India's best-selling pop album.

In 1995, he wrote and produced Made in India for Alisha, selling 13 million copies. His career total surpasses 45 million records. He also produced hit tracks for Indian Idol winner Abhijeet Sawant.

Biddu's autobiography Made in India was published in 2009. He recently received a Lifetime Achievement Award from Rolling Stone and was named among the top 30 producers of all time.

IN FOCUS

SANDHYA SURI

RIVERSIDE STUDIOS Sunday 11 May 2pm

Sandhya Suri is a British-Indian filmmaker, often blending intimate narratives with broader societal themes. Her documentary I for India (2005), praised at the Sundance Film Festival, is an unparalleled depiction of the migrant experience constructed from Super 8 film letters sent between India and England over 40 years. In 2018, her acclaimed short film The Field, nominated for a BAFTA, showcased her talent for capturing deeply personal yet universal stories in a deeply sensuous way. Her debut fiction feature, Santosh (2024), which screened in Official Selection at Cannes Film Festival is a gritty neo-noir which tackles patriarchy and inequality in rural India. The film was Bafta nominated and shortlisted for the Oscars Best international feature.

Shobhaa De is an Indian novelist and columnist renowned for her candid portrayals of Mumbai's social elite and bold exploration of sexuality, earning her the moniker "India's Jackie Collins." She began her career as a model before transitioning to journalism in 1970, founding and editing magazines such as Stardust, Society, and Celebrity.



IMTIAZ ALI

RIVERSIDE STUDIOS Sunday 11 May 2pm

Imtiaz Ali, one of India's most evocative film directors, writers, and producers, has carved a distinctive niche in contemporary Indian cinema with his exploration of love, identity, and self-discovery. Born and raised in Jamshedpur, Imtiaz began his education in Patna before moving to Jamshedpur, where he nurtured an early passion for theatre and storytelling.

At Hindu College, University of Delhi, he studied English Literature and founded Ibtida, the college's dramatics society. This creative grounding informed his unique voice—emotional, introspective, and rooted in poetic realism.

He launched his career in Mumbai with television series including Purushetra (Zee TV), Imtihaan (Star Plus), and Rishtey (Zee TV), before making his feature film debut with Socha Na Tha (2005). He rose to prominence with films like Jab We Met (2007), Love Aaj Kal (2009), Rockstar (2011), Highway (2014), and Tamasha (2015)—each an intimate portrait of modern relationships.

As a showrunner, he expanded into streaming platforms with SHE (Netflix, 2020 & 2022) and Dr Arora (SonyLiv, 2022), showcasing his range across formats.

In addition to his directorial ventures, Imtiaz has written screenplays for films such as Ahista Ahista (2006) and Cocktail (2012), and presented projects like Laila Majnu (2018) and Thai Massage (2023), supporting emerging voices in Indian cinema.

His latest film, Amar Singh Chamkila (2024), marks yet another ambitious chapter in a career defined by reinvention and introspection. Whether through a road trip across rugged landscapes or a quiet emotional epiphany, Imtiaz Ali continues to chart the inner journeys of modern Indians with rare sensitivity and lyrical grace.



ONIR

RIVERSIDE STUDIOS Sunday 11 May 2pm

Onir, born Anirban Dhar in Samchi, Bhutan, is an acclaimed Indian filmmaker, screenwriter, editor, and producer. A lifelong cinephile, he studied comparative literature at Jadavpur University before receiving a scholarship to train in film editing at SFB/TTC in Berlin. Upon returning to India, he worked across various media roles including editor, scriptwriter, and music video director.

He is best known for My Brother...Nikhil (2005), a landmark Hindi film that sensitively portrayed AIDS and same-sex relationships, inspired by the life of Dominic D'Souza. His anthology film I AM (2011), which addressed themes such as single motherhood, child abuse, displacement, and LGBTQI rights, won the National Film Award for Best Hindi Film and pioneered crowdfunding in Indian cinema.


Onir's work has earned him multiple honours including the Likho Trailblazer Award (2018), Film Victoria Diversity Award (2019), and the Engendered Spirit of Independent Cinema Award (2020). In 2023, he received the

Rainbow Warrior and Rainbow Stories Awards for Pine Cone, which screened at BFI Flare. His memoir I Am Onir and I Am Gay, published by Penguin Viking, won the Likho Award for Outstanding Book in 2023.

Onir is a part of the Indo Australian anthology titled "My Melbourne" that will release in March 2025.

Onir's latest film "We Are Faheem And Karun" is a sequel to his National award winning film I AM and the first Kashmiri language Queer feature film entirety shot in Kashmir. The film premiered at Dharmshala International film festival and makes its International premiere at BFI Flare 2025.
