

How a quote works

What is priced, what the quote assumes, and what changes it. Clear on both sides before the work starts.



Two ways to price

Per page

For layout and remediation, where pages can be compared. The sample sets whether a page counts as standard or complex.

Per hour

For work that does not come in pages: source preparation, repairs, audits and correction rounds.

First look: free

A first look at the files costs nothing. A detailed analysis is quoted as its own item.

Every quote states

The price

And how long the quote is valid.

The schedule

Per language, and always the total.

5 working days per language: 20 working days for four languages.

The scope

What is included, and what is not.

The start

Work starts when a confirmed order matches the quoted figure.

A faster deadline

A shorter schedule is a different price, quoted again before work starts.

Text changes after sign-off

A new round for each language affected. See "How to send corrections".

New source files or pages

An updated source or added pages change the scope and are quoted as such.

Missing files or fonts

Work waits, or the quote gives a range. See "What to send before the job starts".

Files that need repair

Broken sources or non-Unicode fonts are quoted when found, before work continues.

More languages or scripts

Each language is a unit of work. A new script can also need new fonts.

Nothing changes silently

Any change to price, schedule or scope is put in writing and agreed before the work goes ahead.

In short

A quote is a shared plan: the price, the schedule per language and in total, the scope, and the order that starts it.
