

Nature Notes

My attention was drawn to a recent article in a newspaper regarding the emergence of midsummer butterflies. Apparently, the high frequency of sunny days this year has caused the emergence of some insects two or three weeks ahead of the norm. So, during a sunlit afternoon walk in the valley in mid-May, I am on the look-out for any sighting to match this trend. Unfortunately, there is a cool breeze in the air which takes the edge off the feeling of summer. There are a few butterflies to see – Orange Tip, Peacock, Common Blue and Speckled Wood – but nothing unexpected.

I carry on to the edge of a pond and I notice many diminutive Azure Blue Damselflies close to the edge of the water. There are also a couple of Broad-bodied Chasers which obligingly perch at the tip of an overhanging plant to help with identification. The latter are medium-sized dragonflies typical of early summer and exhibit distinctive flattened bodies and brown patches at the base of the wing.

Moving away from the pond, I walk into a field which was mowed in late winter. Now, it is full of tall, competing plants, in particular umbellifers with their flattish heads of off-white flowers. Although I continue looking for butterflies, my attention is drawn to a small, round, yellowish blob, less than a centimetre in length, partially obscured by the flowers. It is a crab spider; one I remember from my own garden some years ago. Beside her is the body of a Honey Bee and it is possible that I have interrupted the process of consuming the liquid soup from the much larger bee. There are many species of crab spider but the yellow colour makes this one, called misumena vatia, or flower

crab spider, quite attractive. This is a female, given that males are minute, barely two or three millimetres in length.

Crab spiders get their name from their habit of moving sideways and this species possesses long front legs that add to the likeness of a crab. They do not create webs but lie in wait on the flowerhead, with those front legs extended, waiting for an insect to land. They prefer the prey to come to them. Vision is very important so they tend to hunt in the daytime. Unseen by the bee in this case, the spider has grabbed her prey and gone through the process of injecting venom to paralyze her victim. Digestive enzymes are then added. I am a little surprised by the fact that the yellow colour of this species of crab spider stands out slightly against the white flowers, but what I can see is not necessarily what the bee perceives. The spider is also a possible item of prey for a bird, so it pays to be inconspicuous for two reasons. Despite my attention, the crab spider makes no intention to move away, but persists in holding on to her dinner. When she eventually moves and retreats below the flowerhead, the spider and her dead bee are firmly attached.

St Germans Parish Council

Following the uncontested election on the 1st May 2025, the Parish Council have vacancies that can be filled by co-option. These are two seats on the Tideford ward and one on the St Germans ward. If you are interested in carrying out some work to ensure the Parish is maintained and its future is managed, please get in touch. Closing date for expressions of interest is the 27thJune 2025.

A lot of care and effort is being done to look after the burial ground and work remains ongoing. An improved water supply has been installed, and a summarised version of the regulations is now displayed in the notice board. We have, in previous reports, asked that all artificial tributes and ornaments be removed to allow for better maintenance and compliance with the regulations. Unfortunately, there are many items that remain on some of the plots and these will be removed by the Parish Council if left. We understand this is personal to individual families but we hope our rules are respected and adhered to without the Parish Council having to intervene. Thank you.

The date of the next meeting is Monday, 30th June 2025 at the Eliot Hall, St Germans and starts at 18:30. Members of the public are welcome to attend. The agenda along with other documents relating to the Parish Council can be found on the Parish Council website.

We are always available to help residents with Council related casework, and I would encourage you to get in touch if you think we can help or even if you are not sure – we could well be able to point you in the right direction.

There will be two meetings in June: Thursday 12th (Full Council, 19:30) and Thursday 26th (Planning Committee, 18:30). All meetings take place at The Zone, Downderry Methodist Church. See Agendas for details prior to each meeting.

The Council: Since the Elections in May, we have six Councillors, a new Chair and Vice Chair, and a new Cornwall Councillor. Enormous thanks go to our former Cornwall Cllr Armand Toms for the hard work and invaluable support he provided to the Parish Council and to residents across the Parish and beyond, and we wish him a very happy retirement. We also thank Cllr Mark Gibbons for his energy and dedication as Parish Council Chair over the last four years. We welcome him as our new Cornwall Councillor and wish him all the best in his new role serving the parishes of Looe East & Deviock.

<u>Co-option</u>: The Parish Council will be co-opting new Councillors as soon as possible across the three wards of Downderry (two vacancies), Seaton (one vacancy) and Hessenford (two vacancies). Co-option posters are on noticeboards; please contact the Clerk to receive further information and an application form.

For Hessenford in particular, if anyone living in and around Hessenford (including Narkurs) would like to know more about being a Councillor, the Clerk and a Councillor would be happy to meet you informally in the village to go through any questions you may have – please contact the Clerk to ask about this and she will arrange a time to suit all.

<u>Tanver Yate</u>: Changes continue at Tanver Yate, with the installation of a new bin and, in June, pedestrian and vehicle access gates. Phase 2 planting with the support of Forest for Cornwall will follow later in 2025.

<u>Nudist beach, Downderry</u>: The Parish Council has been made aware of anti-social behaviour relating to the nudist beach in Downderry. Should any of our residents (and indeed visitors) witness or experience any inappropriate sexual behaviour at the beach, <u>please report it to the police</u> as only the police have the power to address it. Reporting will also build up a picture of the frequency and seriousness of the issue. However, once you have reported, please do let the Parish Council know you have done so and we can monitor the situation.

You will need to log in to use the Planning site. Any comments posted on the site are viewed by the Parish Council's Planning Committee and Cornwall Council Planning Officers. We extend our thanks to DaSRA for their generous donation, which has enabled us to install a modern, adaptable lighting system in the main hall. We also greatly appreciate the gift of their old notice board, thoughtfully refurbished by Chris and placed proudly at our gate, enhancing how we share updates on classes, activities, and news.

In our efforts to welcome native wildlife, we have introduced bat boxes and created a hedgehog gateway, fostering a more inclusive natural space. This is complemented by our inclusion in the 'No mow May' programme.

On the development front, we have secured significant funding, £80k from Cornwall Council through the Community Infrastructure Levy and have advanced to the second stage of Shared Prosperity Fund, with a positive outcome very likely within the next month. 

Simple Ways To Save The Planet

on the same people doing the work to make things happen? Here is my short guide to being a community player. The first few points are (I hope) mandatory. The final few are ones to work towards.

- 1. Live in your community. Too many second homes kill communities. If you have a second home, do please consider renting it to a local person. If you work away and need two homes, then throw yourself into the community when you can.
- 2. Support your local businesses shops, pubs, restaurants.
- 3. Support local events plays, dances, bands. Without support organisers won't have the resources to put more on.
- 4. Join a local club. There are lots, from gardening, yoga, dancing, art, mother and toddler groups, church groups and many more. Again numbers are important to make them work. If there is something missing that you would like to do, start up your own group!
- 5. Volunteer this could be at a community shop, driving a community bus, delivering Nut Trees, helping in a community garden. This could be a little further afield in places that serve our villages, such as Liskeard Library or Livewire Youth Music. Find something you enjoy and meet likeminded people.
- 6. Become a member of a committee. Every group needs a committee to operate and are always glad of members.
- 7. Join the Parish Council. If you are a young person reading this, I particularly urge you to consider this, as councils are often short of young voices.
- 8. Take a post of chair, secretary or treasurer in a local organisation or council. It might seem daunting, but these posts are often difficult to fill and can be very rewarding.

A big thank you to everyone who already puts in time - you may not always feel it, but you are very much appreciated. To anyone who has yet to put a toe in the water, welcome aboard! Being part of your community is transformative and satisfying.
