Kolbe parents and Holy Heroes founders, Ken and Kerri Davison share wisdom on homeschooling while running a family business as well as on fostering strong, devout commitment to the sacraments and the saints.

This special episode of the Kolbecast was released on the Blessed Virgin Mary's birthday, September 8. They discuss how homeschooling parents have discretion to plan their weeks and lives based on what their families need rather than on what a school demands, and they encourage liturgical living through celebrations of baptismal days, confirmation days, and name days as well as birthdays. They also have insight into the passive and active listening involved in video and audio entertainment, how

important early formation is for children, and the challenge and joy of doing hard things. Finally, the Davisons share how homeschooling makes it easier to incorporate children into the running of the home since children can gain a greater appreciation of what really needs to be done throughout the day and can live lives that have far more dimensions than just schoolwork.

The conversation highlights how God created emotions, how the morality of emotions is not in the feelings themselves but in the actions growing out of them, and how happiness is not our goal—peace within ourselves based in the peace of Christ is. also offers practical tips on fight/flight/freeze mode, addressing test anxiety, and developing both playfulness and safety.

268 Pilgrimage & Jubilee with Our Lady of Champion



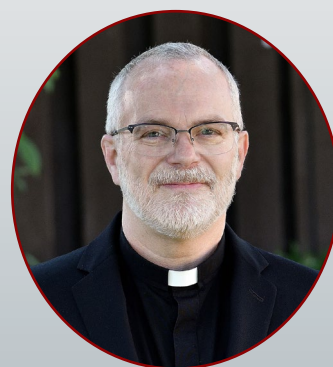
Have you ever wanted to see a Marian apparition site? You don't even have to leave the country to do so—Champion, WI is home to the only approved Marian apparition site in the U.S.

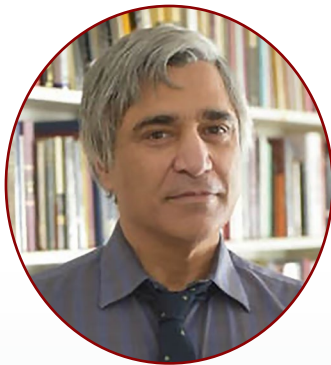

Professor and author Anthony Esolen discusses the value of classical education.

On this very special episode of the Kolbecast, Dr. Anthony Esolen joins the crew to provide advice to families who are intrigued by but have no idea where to start with classical education. Dr. Esolen begins by explaining how the imagination is the driver of the person. From there, he preaches encouragement—don't be afraid to teach your children!—and describes how formation of the human person through classical education contrasts with the “lackadaisical utilitarianism” prevalent today. We don't shy

away from the big questions, either. Is classical education too rarefied for those on the path toward blue collar jobs, and why or why not? If we're called to be salt and light, should children instead be evangelizing within public schools around them? And what about the ~socialization question~? Listen in and find out.

The conversation includes lessons to be drawn from the apostolic fathers, the Church's indispensable role in the development of charitable institutions, and the idea that to learn history is to cease to be a Protestant. Along the way, Mike's references and connections range from the philosopher Nietzsche to the rock and roll hall of famer Dion.

The pursuit of human flourishing in this life and the next takes a clear understanding of what it means to be human. In this episode, Dr. George Harne, Executive Dean of the School of Arts and Sciences and Associate Professor at the University of St. Thomas in Houston, joins Bonnie and Steven to discuss the distinctive ins and outs of classical education. Describing a classical curriculum as “more than old dusty books,” Dr. Harne vividly describes the way this kind of education fosters understanding of both personhood and purpose. He also explains how studying organized bodies of knowledge and sequences of learning leads to self-knowledge, critical skills, and wisdom borne from wonder.

Mark highlights the obligation to be clear where we can be in learning and teaching, the importance of humbly recognizing our limitations as knowers and understanders, and the benefits & tradeoffs of paper books versus eBooks. themes of faith, happiness, and truth as he shares his conversion story, retold in his book *From Calvinist to Catholic*.
