TAKE ACTION

Take action to fight the Trump regime's efforts to turn America into a whites-only police state. It's happening in a community near you.

On Thursday, Sept 4, ICE agents used crowbars and dogs to force their way into Nutrition Bar Confectioners in Cato, north of Syracuse. According to the terrified, heartbroken company owners, they targeted Hispanic workers, detained about 60 employees, and took company files. One owner described the raid as inhumane, indecent and "almost theatrical." According to Cayuga Co sheriff, Brian Schenck, the local sheriff's office was conscripted into providing peripheral support for the judicially-warranted raid and acted to ensure public safety and to support families impacted by the raid. He insisted that his office did not act to "enforce civil immigration laws under New York State statutes and did not enforce such laws during the operation. He said the office's role was strictly to support public safety and assist the federal investigation."

ICE raids traumatize ALL residents of a municipality, in their performative execution and in the aftermath. They separate family members and leave children without one or both parents in the home. They terrorize and isolate immigrant communities, and leave neighbors mourning the loss of friends, co-workers and classmates. They promote distrust in local law enforcement which is caught in a tangle of mandates: to investigate criminal behavior, to ensure public safety, to protect civil rights, and to follow state and federal law. They hurt businesses that lose valued employees, and damage local economies as a result. Most importantly, they are racist, xenophobic actions intended not to reduce crime, but to remove immigrants of color from the US and fulfill White House Chief of Staff Stephen Miller's white supremacist dream.

<u>5 Calls</u> provides contact information and a phone script for you to use to call your elected representatives, including Governor Hochul, Senators Schumer and Gillibrand and your House Member, to express your opposition to ICE raids and detentions. Use the <u>Nutrition Bar Confectioners ICE raid</u> as an example in your call. GOOD NEWS

It was a tough week for the Trump regime, and that's good news for us!

- After facing calls for his resignation all week, "Health" Secretary RFK, Jr, had a rough visit to the Senate trying to defend his risky vaccine policy.
- Bipartisanship is back: AOC is working with Republicans on a bill to prevent Congress members from owning or trading stocks; five Rs helped kill a measure to censure Rep LaMonica McIver; Reps Massie (R-Ky) and Khanna (D-CA) are forcing a vote to release the Epstein files. Encouraging!
- About 100 survivors of Epstein abuse spoke out and threatened to release their own list of abusers.
- A federal judge ruled that Trump's deployment of the National Guard in L.A. was illegal.
- Several federal judges anonymously criticized the Supreme Court's use of the shadow docket—aka "snap judgement" without explanation—while talking to an NBC reporter.

And Trump is NOT dead after all—so there's still hope he'll be held accountable for his crimes someday.

MAGA ATTACKS ON PUBLIC BROADCASTING A GRIM SIGNAL FOR COMMUNITY

Amid the rest of the terrible news in recent months, the MAGA Republicans' shutdown of the Corporation for Public Broadcasting (CPB), and through it their targeting of PBS, NPR, and countless local public media stations, is almost uniquely indefensible, even considering this administration's many other reckless efforts to destroy good governance and the American civic spirit.

Set aside for the moment the reality that the CPB makes possible the broadcast of crucial local information to small, underserved communities, which should be of obvious interest in Yates County and the rest of rural central New York.

Set aside that it's not "lefty fake news," but local government information, paywall-free journalism, and, terrifyingly, public safety infrastructure like weather alerts and evacuation announcements that are victims of the Republican Party's obsession with "clawing back" funds – a commonly used image for their legislative priorities, which puts one very accurately in mind of ghouls tearing at the throat of the body politic

Set aside even the cascading consequences of this one thoughtless act, described best in the public media publication *Current*: "CPB ties together a sprawling, diverse network of stations, serving communities red and blue, rural and urban, rich and poor. Through its grants and projects, it connected media organizations that otherwise may have little in common. The problem isn't just the loss of money. The danger is that the system will fracture. Stations and networks will go into survival mode, trying to preserve what they have and ignoring everyone else — or even cannibalizing them." More ghoulish imagery, still apt.

All that aside, it should be enough that we recognize that the Trump movement is attacking the foundation of Big Bird, Reading Rainbow, Mr. Rogers, and their equally worthy successors. These shows and their stars are paragons of empathy who taught generations that differences should be celebrated, that books light runways to the future, and that, in hard times, there are always helpers to be found. If these values are what MAGA conservatives want to pass off as dangerous, then the divide between them and the rest of us who rightly admire Sesame Street and the others is too wide to be bridged.

If some of those cheering for MAGA in the past agree that enough is enough, we welcome your return to reason. Regardless, we hold that these attacks on made-up "wokeness" have gone too far. The MAGA Right has tipped its hand once and for all: it wants an uneducated populace, lacking in empathy and community spirit, to ensure its supremacy over future generations. The crushing of CPB is from the same cheater's manual as their undemocratic power-grabs in Texas and DC, and displays the same casual cruelty that continues to deliver cutesy-branded concentration camps holding all the people indiscriminately rounded up by ICE in more and more red states across the country.

FLXJP will follow Mr. Rogers' advice and keep looking for the helpers: the people who embrace diversity, value learning, defend democracy, and treat others with humanity. If it's harder to find those things on the coming Trump State TV, we will just have to find each other in our communities.

Community Alert

DHS recently canceled the parole status of people who came to the U.S. through a CBP One appointment or under the Cuba, Haiti, Nicaragua, & Venezuela (CHNV) parole program. If you came under either of those two, your parole status and work permit are no longer valid. The New York Immigration Coalition recommends those impacted talk to an immigration attorney as soon as possible to explore options.

NYSLGBTQ.org invites you to take the 2025 New York State LGBTQ+ Health and Human Services Needs Assessment provided by the New York State Department of Health to inform policy and to sustain and enhance services available to LGBTQ+ community members. This survey will take about 20 to 30 minutes to answer. You must be at least 13 years of age to participate. The survey is anonymous and will not record any personal information that can identify you. It will include questions about your experiences of health and service needs. Some questions may ask about difficult experiences, or they may spark your interest in seeking services.

As a resource, the bottom of every screen of this survey will provide a link to the New York State Department of Health Crisis contact website. You may use this link to contact counselors or receive immediate assistance. At the conclusion of the survey, we will provide you with a link to the New York State Network for LGBTQ+ Health and Human Services. "The Network" includes over 60 agencies around the state that serve and support LGBTQ+ community members.


