Dear Fighters for Social and Racial Justice,

At the completion of our fortieth year (1985-2025), we are experiencing increased challenges to racial and social justice across the nation and our region as the current federal administration increases its attack on our shared values of embracing diversity, building equity and being more inclusive. As we predicted last year in the 2024 *WARE President's Report*, our efforts to dismantle racism have come under further attack. We refuse to sit back while Black, Brown and Indigenous voices are marginalized. In the accompanying WARE Newsletter, we share the events, programs and rallies that we have staged, or our members have partnered on to recognize our shared history and the role people of color have played to lead our nation.

Racial and Social Justice Recognition and Celebration (2025)

Over 100 people braved a snowstorm that cancelled our annual MLK Commemorative March inside the *Redeem Bethel COGIC Community Fellowship Hall* in Williamson to celebrate the 2025 Wayne County Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Day Celebration. The event hosted several community organizations as they displayed and shared their services before the Celebration, keynoted by James Schuler, got under way. Past Wayne County school students, April Franklin and Denzell Bissell-Young, also spoke. The program was followed by a free Community Meal arranged by Anne Mack. We look forward to seeing you all again for the 2026 MLK Day Celebration events which will kick off with the traditional MLK March on Main Street in Williamson and be followed by the main celebration at the Redeem Bethel C.O.G.I.C. Community Fellowship Center on 4496 Rte. 104 in Williamson. A free Community Dinner will immediately follow in Redeem Bethel's annex building.

Social Justice Policy and Advocacy

Immigration justice was and continues to be in the forefront of our advocacy this year. WARE members led by Rural Migrant Ministries leaders have helped organize rallies, coordinated dinners, provided rides, distributed food, responded to emergencies and spoken at events throughout the year. WARE will continue to stand up for our neighbors who are being racially scapegoated, unjustly blamed and unfairly targeted by agents of misguided federal policy. Support for farmworkers and our immigrant residents has always been and will continue to be key to WARE's Mission.

Community Engagement and Education

We continued to partner with *Black History Month in a Year (BLHMY)* to counter attacks on historical truth telling. WARE members led a community campaign to highlight local Black History (and BIPOC) information to all high school students at Newark High School, at county-wide educational events and to visitors at eight community events (festivals and farmers' markets) in Lyons and Sodus

Under the leadership of co-facilitators, Earl Greene, Jordan Hill, Jim Wood and Danielle Ohlson, WARE conducted its eighth annual *Anti-Racism Professional Development Workshop* for Wayne County school personnel and the general community.

Other highlights for 2025 included the formation of a book selection Working Group for the WARE Collection at the Newark Public Library and continued collaborations with numerous groups throughout the county and the region. We are happy to continue our collaboration with racial and social justice advocates in the Wayne County/Finger Lakes Region: Wayne County Partnership, Rural & Migrant Ministries in Lyons, Black History Month in a Year, Citizens' Response Network of Wayne County, NY, Finger Lakes Accountability Network (FLAN) in Naples and Finger Lakes Justice Partnership (FLJP) in Penn Yan. Many members foster our mission of action, advocacy, and community engagement & education. Thanks to all of you who have joined us in advancing that mission and working to build a "beloved community". We look forward to continuing the work in 2026. As always, social and racial justice work requires time and money.
