Reflection **ANON.**

I have encountered a few Martha's and Mary's in my life. Let me tell you of two of them. Eileen and Mabel, both long since dead, were figures of note in a local parish. Mabel had dedicated her life to being a live-in housekeeper. As a child she contracted polio, and she endured deformities to her skeleton – in particular her hands. By the time I had met her, she had long given up hope of finding a husband so instead set about a life of dedication to others. Life as a live-in housekeeper was a perfect fit for her. She delighted in 'looking after father'. She was discretion itself and was never slow in helping out in parish events as the need arose – always opting to do the dishwashing or help in the kitchen hidden away, than take centre stage. Eileen on the other hand was something else. She had the sort of physique for which Ozempic had been developed. She never hid behind "Oh, its glandular!". Humbly confessing that she just loved food. She was always at the front of the queue for the buffet table and possessed the skills of a high-wire trapeze artist when it came to balancing mountain of food on the smallest of plates. She had a catch phrase which irritated the life out of many – including Mabel – and it started "What you should do is....." In reality, she was invariably correct in her proffered advice. While the rest were trying to find the optimum arrangements for the chairs and tables, she had a skill in seeing the bigger picture, anticipating potential pitfalls keeping an eye on the hoped for achievements of the event, even as rudimentary Every parish needs its Eileen's and its Mabel's. Eileen for planning took place. the bigger picture, Mabel for the graft.

Martha and Mary, Eileen and Mabel. The truth is we are all a mix - some of us are happier with an active Christianity than we are with a meditative one. Both have worth and value and both are necessary. There is a time to be active and a time to be quiet for both have the thread of prayer running through. Martha and Mary are two of few people ever to be named in the Gospel and their lesson is there for us all to imitate. We resolve to maintain a balance between the two - for in that balance lies our salvation.
