Reflection - Father Alexander Sherbrooke

"Fool! This night your soul is required of you and things you have prepared, whose will they be? So is the one who lays up treasure for himself and is not rich towards God".

Many of you have been very kind in asking about my health and the mending of my hands for which many thanks and your prayers are truly appreciated. I find myself answering by saying that I am now an expert in the National Health Service and can speak eloquently in its favour. I seem to have had many hospital appointments, met many doctors and nurses and become very well acquainted with the layout of hospitals. This set me thinking this last week when we celebrated the Feast of St Ignatius Loyola, the founder of the Jesuits. You may remember the story that Ignatius had been wounded in war having been a habitual soldier and fighter. He is in hospital and in looking for reading he has been given a book on Christ and the saints. The book inspired him so much that it caused a complete change in his life so that he dedicated himself to the founding of the Society of Jesus and the evangelisation of the known world. Such is the power of God to work upon a incapacitated person. Please do not worry that I am going to found another Society of Jesus but those moments of helplessness are very providential for they give that precious time for listening to God. Today's Gospel invites us to ask where are our priorities and Jesus gives us the parable of the rich man whose only concern for his comfort and his lifestyle. Perhaps it's a somewhat ironical Gospel given that many including myself are about to take some holiday and therefore we end up thinking a bit more about our own comfort rather than the challenges of everyday life. However, in that is that nub for when the pressure is off then disordered habits can creep in very easily when we forget to say our prayers, make excuses for not going to Mass and are probably not as attentive to those around us as we would normally be. It is in those moments that the Gospel can cut more sharply and we have to look for those opportunities for conversion. It may simply be that we are able to give more time each day to meditation, perhaps to spend more time on reading the Scripture or praying for the needs of those most broken in our world. A little test is to ask ourselves by way of Examen of conscience when we come back from holiday, how was it. If we simply say I ate and drank a lot and sat in the sun, perhaps we haven't taken the journey of Saint Ignatius. The challenge is always to look beyond our physical and concrete circumstances and say where is the Lord, how have I loved Him or been disobedient to Him and how can I make more room for the Kingdom of God when I rise the next day. Holidays are beautiful in so much as we can use them to make a greater space for God and think of what they really mean. They are days which can be HOLY.
