"In his days shall justice flourish, and great peace forever".

Today's psalm continues to proclaim the promise of this Season of Advent which is the coming of the Messiah and the Son of God being born in our midst. The challenge for all of us at this time is how do we prepare ourselves and our communities for this most wonderous event. It is too much to imagine and understand but still we are invited to enter in.

Our invitation comes this week from St John the Baptist who we encounter in the Gospel. John is deliberately given to us by God to prepare our hearts and minds for this great event and of course there is much that we can say about him whether it is his relationship to Jesus, where he lived, how he preached or how he lost his head. For now to share two particular characteristics which we read of this Sunday. The first is how he lived which was clearly the road of poverty and simplicity for he had no more than locusts and wild honey to feast on. He lived in that most inhospitable and arid part of the country, so what we hear is abject poverty. There is complete sacrifice here in which he gives himself completely to the service of the Gospel and the Messiah. There is nothing about him that holds back or prevents that journey of simplicity. Let us pray with this truth and ask what it might mean for our lives and the question that you need to ask concerning our worldliness, dependence upon material goods and satisfaction of our greed. John the Baptist is one with the poor and the vulnerable.

Second, he chooses the way of humility whereby he tells us very clearly that he is not fit to carry the sandals of the Messiah. John is telling us that even though he has many of his own disciples and thousands had followed him, that his status and position is a mere nothing compared to Jesus. He is exhorting us to a radical humility in which we need to ask of ourselves how much have I pushed myself forward, have I stood by my ego, have I been arrogant or dismissive of others. Humility comes in very many guises but it is part of that Gospel journey.

Last Sunday you would have heard from the pulpit the need to take on a greater responsibility for the outreach projects of the parish. I also said at the time that we would have a series of targeted appeals during the year. It happens this Sunday that we are thinking and praying very much about out work with the homeless and vulnerable – known as St Patrick's Open House. There is nothing wrong in taking John the Baptist as an icon of those people that we serve every day in the Parish. Let us pray with the vulnerable and homeless so that we can bring them to God in our hearts and in our prayer.
