Reflection – Anon.

We're the proud owners of two Dobermann dogs – a male and a female – they make good companions. Their temperaments are completely different – as well as their personalities, though obviously most of their genetic makeup is held in common. They're not dissimilar to you or me. We share a common ancestry that can be traced back to the first genus of 'homo-sapiens', probably originating from the area we now call Ethiopia – and 'Eve', the first woman was most likely black – but don't tell Nigel Farage or Tommy Robinson. Despite all that we have in common, we have personality traits and characteristics that are unique. Most of us will live a life of relative anonymity. Some might crave fame and will try to gain a place on *Traitors* or *Love Island* (fat chance!) but most of us will live lives that are marked only by their lack of anything remotely remarkable: except. that is, for our Christian witness and our determination to follow the example of Jesus. In a world of tension, hate and division, this means that we work tirelessly in protecting the downtrodden, and always stand up for what is right. We may never be famous, but we should all strive to be remarkable.

And what does "remarkable" mean? "Being remarkable" is the ability to attract notice by being unusual, striking or extraordinary. Being remarkable means going above the norm by doing, saying, offering or being that individual who puts more heart, soul and thought into your actions. Think just how impressive that would look on your headstone. In this weekend's Gospel we hear and read of John the Baptist pointing away from himself and towards Jesus: *Look, there is the Lamb of God....Yes, I have seen and I am the witness that he is the Chosen one of God.* John is remarkable for his humility. Probably his greatest act of witness was to identify Jesus to the crowd. To the onlookers Jesus was just another face in the crowd but now that he has been "outed" by John all eyes look towards him. His years of anonymity are no more, and his public ministry has begun. Over the next few weeks, we will follow him in that ministry with one eye firmly fixed on our calling to be 'remarkable', individuals like John the Baptist who always point towards Jesus and we will join the Psalmist in today's Responsorial Psalm: *Here I am, Lord, I come to do your will.*
