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Celebrating dedication SES Walcha Unit honours long-serving volunteers

With well over 200 years of combined service, the SES recently held a special awards ceremony to recognise the incredible dedication and years of service contributed by its Walcha members.

The event was officiated by Stuart Fisher, Acting Zone Commander, with support from Matt Chadwick, Deputy Zone Commander for the North West Zone, and Rob Baillie, Chief Inspector for the Lower Northern Tablelands Cluster.

The evening was particularly significant for three remarkable individuals - Bob Burnell, John Stuart, and Peter McNeill who were each honoured with the 50 years of Service Award for their extraordinary commitment to the SES and the Walcha community.

In 1975 a Rescue squad was formed under the Walcha Civil Defence Unit which later became the State Emergency Service (SES). "One of our first jobs in early 1976 was a search and recovery of a murder victim on Clay Road," Warwick Fletcher recalled

The Walcha Unit purchased and fitted out their first truck in the mid 1980's with John Stuart having a big influence on its design and later the modifications and improvements. "In reality alot of the Rescue Squad's operation, planning, de-briefing and social activities happened at John Stuart's shed," Warwick said.

John Stuart has always been the first point of call, and for 50 years has been not far from any form of communication! "If anyone wants to bring 'Shag' unstuck is to put him in a situation where he has no phone, radio or scanner, or just to get him 10 feet off the ground," Warwick commented.

On the presentation evening, Milestone awards were also presented to Steve Wiggins, Terry Olsen, Pat Stace, and Juan Carey, with Chris Feltham also recognised for his service, despite being unable to attend on the night.

These achievements not only reflect the dedication of the individuals involved but also highlight the strength and resilience of the Walcha Unit as a whole. SES volunteers regularly respond to a wide range of emergencies, including road crashes, storms, and floods-often putting themselves on the line to help others.

Unit Commander Bob Burnell also extended his appreciation to several other valued members for their ongoing service: Donald McHattan 43 years, Bernie Brady 35 years, David Salter 24 years, Lisa Wratten 10 years, Michael Morris 9 years, Daniel Reardon 7 years, Steve Lisle 4 years, Cameron Norbury 4 years and Meg Nolan 1 year. The awards night was a fitting celebration of those who go above and beyond for their community.

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around the traps 💦

We will find it hard to find a better weekend of weather than the one we just had, yes big frost but glorious days without the wind. Last week's wind was horrendous, that cold wind just makes it hard for anyone who wants to do anything outside. It's still extremely wet in places but it has dried out to an extent so we can get about and the livestock have been doing better. The dry weather might be short lived as the chance of rain is high for the remainder of winter judging by the forecast, and when it has us in for a chance of rain, we generally get it at present.

President Trump looks to be making more global conflicts with his imposed tariff on Brazilian imports by threatening to raise the tariff by 50pc. If Trump follows through with this threat then imported Brazilian beef will incur a 76.4pc tariff which would effectively shut Brazilian beef out of the US market. If this happens then it would push Brazilian beef into other markets like China and other secondary markets. What this does to Australia is that it leaves us as the only supplier of imported lean beef into the USA. It will also make beef dearer in the USA for the consumer but also draw exported US beef back into their own domestic markets. If anyone follows the US beef prices then you would know the current physical spread of Australian to US cattle prices sits at a discount of 45pc. Currently the heavy steer indicator in the US on a liveweight basis sits at 610c/kg in Australian value while our very own sits at 320c/kg. Demand is growing for our beef both domestically and globally with another perfect storm brewing for cattle producers as talks regarding Australian beef prices in 2026 are expected to be 200c/kg higher than 2025. We could see Angus feeder steers hit 700c/kg while grassfed kill cattle might hit 1000c/kg. If this eventuates on the back of tight supply and ideal environmental conditions then we could see prices of 2021 and 2022, but it's also a long way to drop and we've been through that hardship before.

These prices are no doubt excellent for our producers who must ride the high and lows of every market and every season, but what it does is it puts more pressure on our domestic process. Take lamb, currently we are experiencing the best prices we have seen for years and it's starting to out price the domestic consumer on our supermarket shelves. Lamb cutlets are now nudging fifty dollars per kilo while the all-time Sunday roast favourite, a leg of lamb sits at a reasonable fifteen dollars a kilo. Currently hook prices for lamb sits at eleven dollars per kilo and if these prices hang around then expect prices to get even dearer which will only push consumers to other more affordable proteins like chicken and pork.

There has been some big cattle yardings this week with Tamworth and Gunnedah both yarding more than 3000 fat cattle. The price lift in the cow market saw over 1000 cows yarded on Monday which topped at 364c/kg, up 15c/kg on the previous week. Heavy steers and heifers to process topped at 362c/kg, while feeder steers topped at 482c/kg and heifers 392c/kg. Light weaner steers and heifers look great value and are making less than feeder rates. 4468 sheep and lambs were yarded in Tamworth with heavy lambs more than 80kg topping at \$420 per head. Heavy trades topped at \$270 while the mutton job was on fire with prices exceeding 700c/kg dressed weight.

Bull sales are quickly approaching, and I must say the seedstock producers of our district have once again done a remarkable job with their cattle. Southcote Shorthorns have an Open Day this Friday on farm at Rambrah, east of Walcha for those who wish to inspect their quality line up of bulls on offer at their annual sale to be held on the 8th of August.

Congratulations to Cross Bros. Butchery on being voted the best butcher shop in the New England, great to see a local business doing well and offering a high calibre of service and quality.

RUGBY REPORT WALCHA V ALBIES

FIRST GRADE

In a commanding display at Bellevue Oval, the Walcha Rams First Grade delivered a clinical 34-10 victory over St Alberts College. The match, played on a breezy afternoon, showcased Walcha's dynamic attacking options and impenetrable defence, cementing their position at the top of the table.

The game kicked off with both teams probing for early dominance, engaging in a tense arm-wrestle for momentum. The opening exchanges were physical, with neither side yielding ground easily. Early penalties against Walcha put them on the back foot, but the Rams' defence stood tall, led by Cole Tweedy, whose bone-crunching tackles stifled Albies' early raids and set a defiant tone. Walcha soon turned the tide, with Richard Hunt leading the charge. His powerful carries punched holes in Albies' defence, securing valuable field position. The forwards, rolling up their sleeves, executed a series of tight carries, grinding down the opposition. Hamish Heeney proved a nightmare for Albies' defenders, consistently breaking first-up tackles with his elusive footwork and raw power. Their efforts created space for a clever blind-side snipe, allowing Dom Bower, recently promoted from second grade, to cross for a well-worked try, showcasing his readiness for the top level.

A moment of brilliance came when Chaden Hawkins snatched an intercept and sprinted 60 metres to score under the posts, a just reward for his tireless work rate. By halftime, Walcha held a commanding 24-5 lead, their attacking flair and defensive steel overwhelming Albies.

The second half saw the Rams facing a stiff breeze, forcing them to absorb significant defensive pressure. Ross Monie led from the front, delivering bone-rattling tackles that disrupted Albies' rhythm and inspired his teammates. Nathan Cullinan was immense, nailing his set-piece duties and organising a watertight defence out wide. Troy Tape, playing a roving winger role, was everywhere, popping up in key moments to spark attacks or shut down threats. Walcha's defence was the cornerstone of their victory, combining disciplined organisation with unrelenting physicality. The Rams' line speed suffocated Albies' attacking plays, while their scramble defence snuffed out any breakthroughs, with Walcha's defensive wall holding firm, turning back wave after wave of attack.

In the end, the Rams' 34-10 triumph was a testament to their attacking versatility and defensive resolve. This clinical performance keeps Walcha firmly atop the table as they head into next week's challenge with momentum and confidence.
