Working Dog Sale for Walcha

For Walcha local Maddie Davidson, working dogs have always been more than just farm helpers, they are the heartbeat of the land. Now, after years of dreaming, she is set to bring her vision to life with the first-ever Nutrien Boulton's Working Dog Sale, to be held at the Nowendoc Recreation Grounds in March 2026.

Maddie says the idea has been a long time coming.

"I've been interested in running a sale for quite some time," she explained. The boys at Boulton's also agree that this region and right down to the coast and Upper Hunter has been needing a true working dog sale, not just one for trial dogs. "This will be a showcase for the real dogs that keep our farms going."

The sale will be a one-day event with a packed schedule: pre-works in the morning, a vendor dog trial, and then the main auction. Both sheep and cattle dogs will feature, sold in their respective categories.

While the event will be interfaced with AuctionsPlus and livestreamed to reach buyers across the country, Maddie is determined it remains a genuine community gathering.

It is not Maddie's first venture into the world of auctions. In 2024, she made her auctioneering debut at The Wauchope Hobby Farmer sale, where she sold two steers to raise funds for Dolly's Dream.

The 2026 Working Dog Sale is already attracting strong interest from breeders, trainers, and buyers alike. Trade sites will also be available on the day, giving local businesses and community groups a chance to get involved. Maddie encourages anyone keen on booking a stall to get in touch.

The event has also launched a Facebook page where updates will be shared. Kate Connors has been working alongside Maddie on the advertising, helping to bring her vision to life and share it with the wider community.



around the traps 💦

While the long awaited sun has been amazing to see, it didn't take long before people started mentioning that we may need another shower of rain shortly if this warmer weather kept up. The weekend weather was outstanding and the grass is starting to grow. However it will be a shock, after hitting 20 degrees on Monday, to dive back to a top of 6 degrees this Thursday. Wednesday looks to be getting a shower this week with a large rain band from QLD to Victoria dropping widespread moisture, offering the possibility of follow-up rain in many areas of the south once again. Hopefully the frosts are nearly gone, other than this weekend, night time temps look to be in the positives going forward.

Well the Labor government, elected by the people of Australia, has once again come back to bite our small community hard. Chris Minns recent announcement for an immediate moratorium on logging in the Mid North Coast's State Forests is ludicrous. 176,000 hectares of State Forest will be added to the existing National Park reserves in this area with the aim of creating a conservation area for koalas, Greater Gliders and other threatened species with Chris Minns stating that Koalas are at risk of extinction in the wild in NSW by 2050. Walcha was built on the back of the timber industry, an industry that still employs a large group of people in our community. This will be devastating for the timber businesses in our town who give a lot back to our community through numerous sponsorships of sporting clubs, other organisations, causes and events. The NSW government have very short memories if they think locking up State Forests from logging will solely save these koala's. The bush fires that ripped through these areas, before the drought broke in 2019, did more damage to the koala population and habitat than logging ever would. This decision is ridiculous and I bet there has been a deal done somewhere. Looks like the cost of building and firewood that keeps us warm just got dearer again.

The NSW department of Ag have made 165 people redundant from their jobs and funding for a major genetic research project discontinued. These redundant jobs, primarily across the beef sector including approx. 15 biosecurity positions have made us extremely vulnerable and affect all DPI services for graziers. A multi breed project has been scrapped which was the first in its kind to compare traits between cattle breeds, as EBV's only allow single breed comparison. Interestingly, a low methane beef project is still underway and still receiving funding as it reflects the NSW government commitments to net zero. Ridiculous. Once again, the government is pulling funding from our rural agricultural sector and using it elsewhere.

Cattle numbers continue to come forward through the northern NSW saleyards with 2,218 cattle sold in Tamworth on Monday and 4,150 yarded in Gunnedah on Tuesday. The markets remain fully firm to dearer with extra southern orders present, especially in the feeder and kill sectors. Weaner steers topped at 570c/kg while heifers made to 424c/kg. Feeder steers topped at 533c/kg while the heifer portion made to 514c/kg. Heavy kill steers topped at 472c/kg making \$3,223 while heavy heifers made to 477c/kg. The best of the cows lifted 25c/kg and topped at 440c/kg, making \$3,105 per head. 4,000 sheep and lambs were yarded in Tamworth on Monday which was quoted as a dearer market than the previous week. The best of the store sucker lambs made to \$230 - destined for the southern fattening paddocks. The best of the trade weight made it to \$330 while the best of the extra heavies topped at \$394. Mutton met a dearer market with XB ewes hitting \$300 for the extra heavies and majority of the kill mutton making more than \$200.

Bad luck to the Walcha Rams who went down to the Armidale Blues in Saturday's New England Rugby decider at Bellevue Oval. Well done on a good season and a huge thank you to all the local supporters who went up and cheered them on. In other results the Quirindi Lions saw their first win of the Central North rugby shield in 33 years on Saturday, great effort for another small community.

Walcha Sapphires shine brightly in Armidale Netball Competition

The Sapphires wrapped up their season with a round robin of three games last weekend to make up for weather affected weekends. These fast-moving games showcased the girls' improvement with quick footwork, strong ball skills and plenty of goals — a fantastic effort in their first season of netball.

Sapphires' coaches, Elyce Laurie and Kelly Makeham, are very proud of the team. The Sapphires have received lots of comments from spectators about their improvement throughout the season and have made Walcha very proud.

The Sapphires are part of the NSW Netball Woolworths NetSetGO program – Australia's leading grassroots netball initiative designed for children aged 5 to 10. The program fosters skill development and teamwork through three progressive stages:

- Net (5-6 years): Focuses on fun and basic netball movements.
- Set (7–8 years): Introduces movement skills and fundamental strategies.
- Go (9-10 years): Refines techniques and coordination for more competitive play.

Engaging in the 'Go' phase in 2025, the Sapphires have laid strong foundations for their netball journey. In 2026, they are set to advance into the Primary School Division of the ADNA competition,

following in the footsteps Walcha Netball Club's Diamonds and Opals.

"We are looking forward to seeing the Sapphires back on the court next year and to having another team go through the NetSetGo Program!" said Meggie Davey, Walcha Netball Club President.

With a strong focus on development, camaraderie. and community spirit, the future of Walcha netball looks bright!

Mayoral Column

GENERAL MANAGER COMMENCES ROLE

On Monday 1 September newly appointed General Manager, Stephen Parry commenced his role at Walcha Council. Much was written about Stephen's experience in local government when he was appointed and we look forward to that experience leading Walcha through the challenges we face. Along with his wife Wendy they are settling into the local community and look

forward being part of it.

TELSTRA AND BATTERIES

Following the August snow storm resulting in the loss of both electricity and connectivity, the true inconvenience and cost was soon evident. We can say that we didn't have these conveniences many years ago and survived but that is not really the point. As technology moves on we adapt to the changes and let go of the old. Phone and internet services are heavily dependent on electricity from the network and while there is battery backup its effectiveness was shown to be very limited. Subsequent negotiations with Telstra have led to an increase in battery capacity from what was around two hours during the storm to what should be closer to six hours. In the words of Mike Marron (Northern NSW Regional GM) "this replacement will ensure we have adequate backup reserves in the event of mains failure allowing sufficient time for a power technician to attend the site with a generator if needed".

Questions were raised about the installation of a permanent generator that could automatically cut in (Automatic Transfer Unit) but were dismissed due to the site being incompatible. Hopefully the extended battery life will ease the inconvenience. Mike also raised the ability of modern phones to access the satellite system in emergencies.

PUBLIC DISPLAY

Council currently has two draft documents out on public display. These are Cumulative Impact Assessment and Land Use Strategy. The purpose of these documents is to evaluate the opportunities and constraints to the Walcha LGA expected to result from the influx of capital investment into the area by large scale infrastructure projects in the New England Renewable Energy Zone (REZ).

There was community consultation carried out before the consultants submitted the report to Council detailing their findings, including recommendations to address the impacts and achieve satisfactory and positive outcomes for our community.

These documents are accessible to read and make comment on Council's website.

AWARDS

Sheree and I travelled to Armidale on Thursday to the Northern Inland Volunteer of the Year Awards where our local CWA received recognition for their mammoth efforts in this area. CWA is one of those select few organisations that you don't need to explain what the acronym stands for due to its high profile. It was great to see their hard work recognised on the larger stage.

On Friday we went to the Walcha Garden Club Luncheon at the Golf Club. Always an interesting function with a passionate speaker, Angela Sole, whose topic was cold climate gardens. While I am only a 'hole digger' in our garden due to my lack of ability to rise above that position, I did learn a bit about positioning plants, so I may get a slight promotion under close supervision.

Part of the day involved the bestowing of Life Membership on three members: Col King, Gwen Higgins and Joy McLeod. One point that was evident was the amount of knowledge contained within that club on gardening in what is often a challenging climatic environment in Walcha. Council is honoured to have that resource available to us through some of the members being on the Beautification Committee.

Bloat and Pulpy Kidney the risk is ripe

As we enter spring, having had a very wet winter, Local Land Services (LLS) is encouraging livestock producers to take steps towards reducing the risk of bloat and pulpy kidney.

Pulpy Kidney can cause sudden death in cattle, sheep and goats on high carbohydrate, energy-rich feed. Fat healthy livestock in prime condtion are particulary susceptible and generally there will be no prior signs of sickness or evidence of struggling. Vaccination is the best form of protection against pulpy kidney.

"Initially, two vaccinations are administered, four to six weeks apart, with timely boosters during high-risk periods around every three months are crucial to ensure ongoing protection" LLS Principal Program Manager of Animal Biosecurity and Wefare, Lyndell Stone said. "It's worth noting, the better your lambs and calves are doing, the more important it is to give a booster as pulpy kidney strikes the best stock. If purchasing stock, it's best not to assume they have already been vaccinated. It's a costly error to find out vaccinations were incomplete when you start losing stock."

Pasture bloat is another potentially fatal digestive condition in ruminant animals. "Ensuring cattle are not hungry when first introduced to high risk pastures is crucial." is the advice given from the LLS. This can be achieved by; timing your rotations, providing access to roughage such as hay; grazing livestock in smaller paddocks to allow for more intensive monitoring and management. There are also three bloat control agents for consideration, anti-foaming agents, detergents and rumen modifiers."

Whichever method, or combination of methods is used, monitoring stock after introduction is essential.






GARDEN 3 - 'HUNTLY' | RICHARD & LORRAINE WALSHE

Richard and I purchased 'Huntly' in 2000 and moved onto the property in 2003 after we retired from our professions in Gloucester.

I've always been interested in gardening but wasn't fully aware of the differences between Gloucester and Walcha. Despite the very cold winters, I was very excited about learning what to plant in a cold climate garden. There have been some very steep learning curves and the feeling that there is a non-existent garden during winter.

Walcha Council Land Use Strategy And Cumulative Impact Assessment



Early in 2025, Walcha Council engaged the services of Gyde Consulting to assist in the preparation of a Land Use Strategy and Cumulative Impact Assessment for the Walcha local government area (LGA). The purpose of this work is to assess the potential opportunities and threats to Walcha's land supply, housing and tourism infrastructure as a result of development in the New England Renewable Energy Zone (REZ).

The consultant team and Council staff have undertaken extensive community engagement and have prepared a draft Land Use Strategy and Cumulative Impact Assessment for public exhibition.

Council resolved at its Ordinary Meeting on 27 August 2025 place the draft documents on public exhibition for 28 days and invite public submissions on their contents and recommendations.

The Land Use Strategy considers existing zoned general residential, rural residential, commercial and industrial and assesses, in the context of the REZ and related development, existing capacity and suitable land for future rezoning to accommodate anticipated demand.

The Cumulative Impact Assessment is focused on housing supply and demand and the potential impacts of a short-term, transient construction workforce. The intended outcome of the Cumulative Impact Assessment is to identify measures Council can take to minimise and mitigate the impacts and take advantage of the opportunities presented by development within the REZ.

Council is interested in hearing from residents and business owners in relation to the draft Land Use Strategy and Cumulative Impact Assessment and will be accepting submissions until close of business on Friday 3 October 2025. All submissions must be in writing and can be submitted by email, post or in-person to Council's customer service counter

The draft documents and supporting documentation are available electronically on the public notices section of Council's website. Hard copies of the draft documents can be viewed at the Walcha Council customer service counter (2W Hamilton Street, Walcha) and at the Walcha Library (42N Derby Street, Walcha).

Notice of 1080 Wild Dog & Fox Baiting Program



NSW National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS)

is conducting an aerial & ground baiting program from Monday 15 September 2025 to Friday 3 October 2025. The operation will use 1080 (sodium fluoroacetate) poison for the control of vertebrate pests including wild dogs and foxes.

The program will take place in the following reserves in the New England Area:

Oxley Wild Rivers National Park, Werrikimbe National Park, Mummel Gulf National Park, Cottan-bimbang National Park, Nowendoc National Park, Aberbaldie Nature Reserve, Tuggolo Creek Nature Reserve, Tomalla Nature Reserve, part Curracabundi National Park, Booroolong Nature Reserve, Bulagaranda - Mt Yarrowyck Aboriginal Area, The Basin Nature Reserve, Indwarra National Park, and Single National Park.

The program is designed to minimise predator impacts on wildlife, especially threatened species, and to minimise the impact of wild dogs on neighbouring stock.

Domestic pets are not permitted in NSW National Parks managed lands. Pets and working dogs may be affected (1080 is lethal to cats and dogs). Pets and working dogs must be restrained or muzzled in the vicinity and must not enter the baiting location. In the event of accidental poisoning seek immediate veterinary assistance. Warning signage will be placed at key entrances to the reserves.
