# around the traps 🔧

The weather has been outstanding, and the grass is growing like the wind. I travelled to North Star last week and it looked a picture the entire way, the crops were thick enough for a fox to run across the top while the cattle were fat. Speaking with numerous people they mentioned that they had a late season, and a lot of forage crops were grazed until July which means the cattle aren't quite ready. Looking forward, there doesn't seem to be any rain on the forecast for the next two weeks and looking at our daytime temps, it would be ideal if we got some.

The spring forecast of wetter than average seems to be shaky after some forecasters have completely changed their attitude. The south looks to be once again staying dry with chances of their season changing still slim. A lot of southern agistment cattle are now finding their way onto our markets in the northern NSW and southern QLD with 5500 cattle yarded in Gunnedah on Tuesday alone. I do believe we have seen the cattle market stabilise and the season will play a major role in its ability to stay firm. Speaking to southern agents, we are getting quoted cattle ready for October/November delivery, which will be when the heat arrives and the crops run out of puff, or the native country tightens up.

In a positive light the Australian wool markets have lifted sharply this week amid the accelerating demand from China. The industry benchmark eastern market indicator lifted 109c/kg to 1453c/kg, highest since 2022. The EMI has risen 10 weeks in a row, and we must remember the Australian wool clip is historically low. The dramatic rise has only come as a shock to the purchaser, not the grower as plenty of sheep were sent to the kill floor. China buys eighty five percent of the Australian wool clip and in comparison, to the same week last year, 10,000 bales less were offered. No doubt there will be some woolgrowers sitting on wool bales in their sheds, but the huge drop in the national flock numbers would have the largest implication on wool pricing. Wool is finally following the upward trend on prices paid for lamb and mutton due to low national flock numbers.

One thing most farmers are unaware of when it comes these increased imposed tariffs from the USA earlier in the year was the rise in value of non-tariff barriers. Non-tariff barriers are quietly wiping \$4 billion off the value of our exports annually. We don't see it, but it does affect the farmers' back pocket. It's an obstacle to Australia's agricultural exports, adding costs and delays for farmers. Forecasters believe that Australian agricultural exports will fall by \$2 billion this financial year with diminishing returns another reason to address the increased cost of \$4 billion a year in non-tariff barriers. Just another cost to us we don't know enough about.

2264 head of cattle were yarded in Tamworth on Monday ahead of the long weekend break and no fat sale next Monday. Light restocking cattle were cheaper due to quality with steers topping at 545c/kg while the heifers topped at 456c/kg. Feeders still sold to strong demand with steers topping at 540c/kg while the heifer portion made to 492c/kg. Cows remained firm with the best of the heavy cows selling to a top of 432c/kg. 3919 sheep and lambs were yarded on Monday in Tamworth with new season lambs making from \$290-333 while heavy old season lambs topped at \$368 and heavy sheep made to \$260.

Walcha's own Lacey Newton has claimed a national title, winning the Ladies Campdraft at the ABCRA Australian Campdraft Championships



Drawing number two in the final, Newton delivered another solid run, scoring 83, despite narrowly splitting her gate. Her combined total of 172 proved enough to hold on for the win, with the runner-up finishing on 168.

The Australian Championships were run alongside the ABCRA National Finals, where the top 25 riders in each category were invited to compete for national titles. Walcha was strongly represented across the weekend, with several locals posting standout performances.

#### "MY DOG DOESN'T BITE"

Following a number of recent concerns raised around dog behaviour in public spaces it seems timely to revisit the legislation and policies that apply here. Everyone seems to use the reason their dog is off leash is that "my dog doesn't bite". This may well be right but a lot of times it is not the point. Unwelcome dogs bounding up to people who are out walking can be intimidating and frightening, especially for young children and the elderly. Council has the responsibility of

enforcing much of the State Government's Companion Animal Act and we have adopted a Dog Control Policy (2019) that gives Council the power to issue fines and take further action. It should be remembered in this that the levee banks are not an off leash area and is currently raising most of the concerns. An off leash area is available at John Oxley Oval.

Under a revamping of Council's Customer Request Management (CRM) system we will become more responsive to all animal complaints and the enforcement of our obligations.

#### SKATE PARK OPENING

Last Thursday our local members Barnaby Joyce and Brendan Moylan attended the long awaited opening of the revamped skate park. Built with generous contributions from their respective governments the outcome was well received. About 70 school students arrived with every manner of wheeled riding device and basketballs along with parents and grandparents. Every time I have driven past since there is constantly large numbers of people utilising this facility. Thanks to the community members who drove the consultation and design of this park. Your work on behalf of the community is greatly appreciated.





and keep us safe in the difficult times. Communities thrive on helping each other in the good times and the challenging times and the depth of volunteering we witness in ours never cease to impress. On that point the brigade is on the lookout for more members and would appreciate any inquiries.

It is also a time to recognise the work of Paul Metcalfe for his considerable lobbying and commitment to see this project come to fruition.

#### **DOCUMENTS ON PUBLIC EXHIBITION**

Council still has both the Land Use Strategy and the Cumulative Impact Assessment on public exhibition and will be receiving comments and feedback from the public relating to the content and recommendations of these documents. The closing date for comment is COB Friday 3 October. Council will then review and consider all submissions and matters raised and be taken into account prior to Council making a decision and formally adopting these documents.

I won't cover the purpose and outcome of these here as this is all covered on our website. Suffice to say these documents will assist in guiding parts of the renewable energy transition pathway but also have an impact on all development in our LGA.

#### **GREEN WASTE DISPOSAL**

Monday saw the end of the free green waste disposal at the waste facility. Processing this waste comes at a considerable cost to Council and if the requirement is there it will be reinstated for two weeks at a later date when ground conditions may have improved. In the interim there is an option to contact Council for a fee exemption on a case by case basis.

# **Barriers to Trees on Farms**

**Insights from Nuffield Scholar Michael Taylor** 

At the recent Nuffield Australia National Conference in Adelaide, New England grazier Michael Taylor shared fresh insights from his Future Drought Fund scholarship research into the barriers to agroforestry adoption across Australia's grazing and cropping regions.

Michael travelled from the pampas of Argentina and Uruguay to the forests of Borneo, the fields of Poland, and the hills of Italy and Japan to understand how farmers integrate trees into productive landscapes. His message is clear: while the benefits of agroforestry are proven for shade and shelter, improved soil and water, carbon storage, biodiversity, and new income streams, Australian adoption remains stubbornly low.

The reasons are complex. Farmers recall failed plantation investment schemes or conservation plantings, worry about tying up land for decades, and face shortterm financial pressures that often outweigh long-term gains. Skills and extension services are patchy, and regulation can add uncertainty. "It's not the trees themselves that are the barrier," Taylor said in Adelaide. "It's the human, financial and cultural systems that surround them."

Taylor is linking these lessons to Australia's emerging natural capital accounting research, which aims to measure and value ecosystem services in ways that banks, policymakers, and markets can trust. If successful, this work could help farmers recognise the full productivity value of trees - not just as a cost, but as a positive asset.

The CSIRO Chiswick farm has also started investing in research to demonstrate what plantings can work with production from crops and grazing. The plantings aim to demonstrate practical sustainable farming measures and have taken into account environmental planting and biodiversity measures in relation to carbon projects. Taylor hosted the CSIRO researchers on his family farm as part of their planning process to learn from their experience managing agroforestry plantings.

Local landholders will have a chance to discuss these ideas further at a farmer discussion evening in Walcha this Thursday 2 October, hosted by TASC Carbon at the Walcha Sports Club from 6pm. The session will explore how climate policy, carbon markets, and environmental plantings are reshaping opportunities for resilience and cash flow on farms. Taylor's global insights bring timely context for New England farmers weighing up the role of trees on their own farms as the competing demands for land mounts between power, carbon and agriculture.



#### Walcha visit

Last week I had the opportunity to meet with multiple community organisations from the Walcha area. It was excellent to catch-up with those groups and get updates on how things are going.

I also attended the opening of the Walcha skatepark upgrades. \$433,482 was secured from the NSW Government to make those improvements which are fantastic. A half basketball court, new pathway, extension and safety modifications to the skate park, fencing and garden beds were added. I am sure it will be a popular place for the local kids.

There is more funding coming to Walcha and I will announce those in coming weeks so stay tuned for details.

## **Roads funding**

I have been fighting hard to improve travel conditions for residents and road users so I am glad to see the NSW Government has responded with \$23 million for the Northern Tablelands.

\$1.5 million of that will go towards the Oxley Highway at Honeysuckle Creek, Yarrowitch for shoulder widening and safety improvement to corners.

Although this is great news for state roads, local council roads really need funding, and I am committed to continue fighting for this in NSW Parliament.

## **Bushfire danger period**

The bushfire danger period has now commenced in parts of the Northern Tablelands. Fire permits are now required for the Armidale Regional, Glen Innes Severn, Uralla, Walcha and Inverell council areas. Permits can be obtained from the NSW RFS.

# Defibrillator grant program open

Local sporting clubs and recreation facilities can apply for a grant of up to \$3000 for clubs and facilities across NSW to purchase Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs). Cardiac arrest can happen to anyone at any time and it is important sporting organisations are equipped to respond to life-threatening emergencies on and off-the-field.

I encourage clubs and organisations to apply for this funding because you never know when you may need a defibrillator.

Walcha has been included in the list of eligible postcodes so jump on to the Sport NSW website and apply for a grant through the program: <a href="www.sport.nsw.gov.au/grants/local-sport-defibrillator-grant-program#eligible-applicants">www.sport.nsw.gov.au/grants/local-sport-defibrillator-grant-program#eligible-applicants</a>. Applications close 1 December or until funding allocation is exhausted.

#### Double demerits this weekend

Double points apply for speeding, using a mobile phone illegally, riding without a helmet, not wearing or incorrectly wearing a seatbelt or carrying passengers not wearing or incorrectly wearing a seatbelt or restraint.






