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Fleece to Fashion Awards

At the prestigious 2025 Fleece to Fashion Awards, held at the CSIRO's 'Chiswick' local textile artist and milliner Jo-Anne Barr, of JAMB Hats, was awarded top honours. This was in the Established Designer Gilded Glam Category for her breathtaking, hand-felted bridal ensemble.

These awards are one of Australia's leading wool-focused design competitions, highlighting innovation in fibre, textile artistry, and sustainable fashion. Bringing together designers, growers, makers, and industry leaders to celebrate the enduring relevance of Australian wool in contemporary design.

Jo-Anne's winning bridal ensemble, titled "Ethereal Heirloom", reimagines timeless luxury through the artistry of hand-felted Australian wool. Inspired by the grandeur of the Met Gala and the opulence of the Gilded Age,

the collection evokes romance, refinement, and the enduring beauty of slow fashion. Crafted entirely by hand using the ancient technique of wet felting, each piece - from the silk-infused wedding gown to the felted top hat and bouquet - was formed without stitching or machine sewing. Instead, layers of superfine Australian merino and silk were gently coaxed into sculptural form. "Felting (using soap, wool, silk, and water) allows me to transform wool fibre directly into form with no

waste, no mass production and no stitching" Jo said. "This collection began with the felted bridal top hat, everything else evolved from there - the dress, the pelerine, even the bouquet."

Judge Julie Schaefer praised the seamless craftsmanship, remarking that she "went looking for the seams only to discover there were none."

The merino fibre used was sourced through the

Well, the weekends weather threw up a mixed bag of results for rainfall with the storms being extremely patchy. The lucky ones got under 20-50mm of rain, while others just got enough to roll the dust. There isn't a lot of rain predicted for the rest of November with someone saying to me it will be very wet December. I hope they are right and it is wetter than the predicted 'wet November' we were meant to have.

The newly redesigned Bureau of Meteorology website has come at a huge cost to taxpayers. Now said to have cost \$96 million instead of the original quote of just over \$4 million. How does the cost blow out from \$4 million to \$96 million and who is responsible for spending the taxpayer's money on this site that everyone is complaining about. If you or I were to personally cost a business this much money then we would lose our jobs on the spot. I'm sick of the government spending ridiculous amounts of taxpayer money without getting an actual cost of a particular project. The new route of the proposed transmission line through Walcha is another example. We never hear of them saving \$96 million because the project was grossly over quoted and it was cheaper to complete.

Southern farmers, at two locations in Victoria have blocked VicGrid staff, who attempted to use compulsory access powers, from entering their properties. The VicGrid staff, a similar company to EnergyCo, were trying to conduct environmental studies on these properties for a proposed new transmission line. Groups of people blocked them from entering two properties and will now have to stand up against potential court orders that VicGrid staff will acquire for next time. Regardless of the court orders these landowners will continue to block access. These people are fighting the same fight as Walcha people are with EnergyCo. Once again, rural communities are bearing the brunt of renewable projects to keep the lights on for metropolitan areas. They call it environmental studies, but we all know it's just a ploy to tick a few boxes and keep someone in a job. I don't believe the environmental study matters one bit, well it hasn't for our district thus far as they have grossly ignored their initial studies by changing the route.

I mentioned it last week, but it didn't take long for Trump to drop the steep 40 per cent tariff on Brazilian beef imports. The knock-on effect for the USA beef producers was immediate as it saw domestic cattle prices drop over the weekend with the news that frozen Brazilian beef which was already in cold storage into the USA would hit the market immediately, regardless of the 26 per cent quota tariff. What will this mean for Australian beef? It obviously puts us on a level playing field with Brazil for 2026, but it's more a matter of global supply and the fact we aren't producing enough kilos of beef on a global scale to support consumption. Yes, our export volumes to USA might subside but we will also face less competition in other markets such as China. UK and the EU from Brazil. US Beef processing facilities are under extreme financial pressure with another plant closing its doors just this week. The company that closed one of its plants this week reported losses of US\$426 million for the last twelve months, coupled with \$292 million from the previous 12 months and a further predicted loss of \$4-600 million in the next financial year due to cattle shortages. The USA has some serious shortages of beef cattle, and it's predicted to last at least another two years before they see some rebuild numbers flow through their system.

4200 cattle were yarded in Tamworth on Monday while another 5000 had been drawn for Gunnedah on Tuesday. The market was firm from start to finish with restocking steers back to the paddock topping at 500c/kg, while the heifers made to 496c/kg. Feeder cattle topped at 526c/kg for Angus steers while heifers made to 462c/kg. Heavy export cattle topped at 475c/kg for prime heifers while the best of the cows topped at 432c/kg, majority of the prime cows made from 390-415c/kg. Heavy lambs in Tamworth on Monday topped at \$390, the best of the sucker lambs made to \$330 while the best of the mutton made to \$262.

Victorian weaner markets are firing in the led up to their big weaner sale selling season in January. Autumn drop steers just last week being 250kg made a whopping \$7-720c/kg, while 300kg steers made to 660c/kg. Hold on to your hats in 2026 if we get a season.



Celebrating 75 years of aerial agriculture

Walcha's Deputy Mayor, Glen O'Brien addressed a great crowd at the Mirani airstrip on Saturday morning, marking 75 years since the first application of superphosphate by aeroplane took place in Australia back in 1950. We have re-printed Glen's speech which he was kind enough to supply to us.

Today we celebrate a remarkable milestone — 75 years since the first aerial spreading of superphosphate in Australia, right here in the Walcha district at Mirani. This is not just an aviation anniversary. It marks a turning point in Australian agriculture — a moment where innovation, courage, and necessity came together to transform how we care for the land.

In February 1950, Captain Bruce McKenzie of East West Airlines climbed into a Tiger Moth fitted with a makeshift hopper and made the first experimental drop over Mirani, guided by the vision of A.S. Nivison, who had already spent decades improving pastures and experimenting with superphosphate. That single flight sparked an industry that would reshape farming across New England and eventually the entire country.

In those early days, Tiger Moths were the backbone of the operation — cheap, available after the war, and capable of carrying up to five 50kg bags of super. It may seem like a small load now, but compared to what was possible by ground back then, it was revolutionary. And with vast areas of Walcha still uncleared or only accessible by horseback, aerial spreading opened up country that had simply never been reachable by machinery.

From the late 1950s onwards the aircraft evolved — the Cessna 180s, the legendary Beavers, and later the Ceres, Fletchers, Crescos, and PAC 750s. Each new type brought more power, better lift, and safer performance in our high-density-altitude conditions. The Beaver alone spread hundreds of thousands of tonnes across New England, and in the 1970s it wasn't uncommon for a single pilot to spread more than 15,000 tonnes a year — truly astonishing output.

These advances helped build the major operators we remember today: Airfarm Associates, Aerial Agriculture, Superair, and Walcha Aerial Services. The long time aerial agriculture pilots not only built companies, but also built a profession. Their leadership shaped an industry that brought prosperity to our region and certainty to generations of graziers. Many of these men were recognised with national honours — and all earned immense respect from the communities they served.

And while aerial spreading is less common today due to cost, logistics, and the rise of advanced ground equipment the fact remains: there are parts of our landscape that only an aircraft can reach or when it's really wet. Our undulating hills and steep, productive country still rely on aviation for full potential. That was true in 1950, and it's still true 75 years later.

For me, like many people who grew up here, aerial spreading

wasn't just an industry it was part of childhood. In the '80s and '90s I remember hearing that unmistakable sound and running outside to watch the low-flying Fletchers, Beavers or Crescos heading home after a massive day. And now, well into my 40s, I'm still doing the same — except these days it's usually David Salter giving me a buzz, just for fun, reminding us all that aviation gets into your blood.

But behind those nostalgic memories are pilots whose skill, stamina, and nerve were — and still are — extraordinary. These men flew long days, made hundreds of landings a week, and operated heavy aircraft at low level, at high weight, in hot and high conditions. They flew machines right at the edge of their performance envelope, day in and day out.

To put that into perspective — I've been flying since 2009 and have logged around 1,000 hours. Pilots like David Salter and the like have logged well over 30,000 hours, with more than 200,000 landings. In the early days he may have exceeded his limitation of 1,000 hours a year. That kind of flying doesn't just build experience — it builds some of the best pilots in the world.

So today, as we honour 75 years of aerial spreading, we acknowledge:

- The innovators like Nivisons and the teams that enabled it to happen and who imagined what was possible;
- The engineers and mechanics who kept these aircraft flying;
- The companies that built an entire industry; and most importantly,
- The pilots and loader drivers whose work improved the productivity of this country and supported thousands of farming families.

Walcha was the birthplace of aerial spreading in Australia. And thanks to the dedication, skill, and bravery of those involved, it remains one of the most important chapters in our nation's aviation history.

To everyone who contributed — past and present — thank you. Your work changed agriculture forever, and your legacy continues to fly.
