



New event to debut at Walcha Golden Gate Campdraft



Not to be missed! Four days of exciting competition at the 2026 Golden Gate Campdraft.

On Saturday a brand-new event is set to make its debut at this year's Walcha Golden Gate Campdraft, with the first Walcha IGA Ringers Challenge expected to deliver plenty of excitement for competitors and spectators.

The popular four day draft, which commences Thursday 15 and runs through to Sunday 18 January, will see this new event run alongside the campdraft for the first time. The Ringers Challenge brings together horsemanship, stock work and rodeo skills in a fast-paced, one-round jackpot format.

Open to competitors aged 17 years and over, the event is restricted to ten teams of three, with each team required to include one female competitor. With a \$100 entry fee, teams will compete for top honours in a aggregate competition scored out of 300 points. The challenge features three disciplines, beginning with a two-minute snaffle bit cut out

on a maiden horse, working a maximum of two beasts. This is followed by a two-minute working cattle dog trial with five head, before concluding with a steer ride running under ABCRA rules. Competitors must supply their own horses and dogs, reinforcing the traditional skills and horsemanship the event is designed to showcase.

The competition will be held in the rough riding ring, adding to the atmosphere and giving spectators a close-up view of the action.

Entries for the Walcha IGA Ringers Challenge open tomorrow, Thursday 15 January, and will close once all positions are filled. ABCRA membership is required to compete.

With the Ringers Challenge running alongside the Golden Gate Campdraft, organisers are hopeful the event will become a long-term feature and be another highlight to the popular Walcha program.



around the traps

Welcome back everyone, I hope you all had an enjoyable Christmas and an enjoyable new year period – it seems like forever ago already.

2026 has started in top gear, unless you had the smarts to take some more time off during January. The Christmas period was hot and dry and sent our season backwards at pace and it has been nice to jog some decent storms in early January to turn our season. Totals of nearly 100mm have fallen in numerous storms, but we patiently wait for continued follow-up to get us going again. Our chances look to be increasing by the day from a spin-off of moisture from the northern deluge for the next two weeks.

The weather has really been testing, but none more than the tales of two very different seasons – from the deluge of rain in the north to drought and fires in the south. Firstly, a monsoonal trough dumped upwards of 500mm over parts of the Northwest QLD, with reports coming out that they are expecting cattle loss estimates to be north of 40,000 head, a similar disaster to the flooding of 2019. Ex-tropical cyclone Koji has belted the north QLD coast and since making land on Sunday morning has now moved inland towards central QLD. Koji is causing major flooding inland from Rockhampton in areas such as Clermont. At the other end of the country central Victoria are experiencing some savage bushfires with numerous stock losses, homes, shed and properties burnt to the ground.

The Albanese government will establish a national gun buy back scheme to purchase surplus, newly banned and illegal firearms. This is our government's knee jerk reaction to the antisemitic terrorist attack at Bondi Beach in December and the government couldn't be further from the solution. The government is just trying to distract the public from the fact that they aren't addressing the underlying issues of antisemitism. These so-called gun laws need to pass through parliament which will take months, but new laws could pass quicker to directly eradicate antisemitism and combat extremism. I agree that certain parts of current gun laws need to change, like who in western Sydney really needs to have four guns. If you're a firearms licence holder you will also be required to be a member of a Gun Club. The tightening of gun laws may make the government feel like they have been proactive since Bondi, but they will only be policing the honest part of our population, not the minority who are the issue.

Bigs news in the beef industry is the lift on tariffs from China on Australian beef once we exceed the out of quota product. This news sent ripples through the industry when it broke which is a new safeguard for the domestic Chinese product against rising imported beef competition. The 55% tariff on the 'out of quota' beef will price Australian beef out of the Chinese market. What Australia needs to ensure is that the quota should mainly be used entirely for the high quality, chilled, grass fed and grain fed beef, not the low-quality ground beef. We need to put a self-managed quota program in place for Australian beef farmers, feedlots and processors. One thing which counteracts this move from China is the lack of beef on a global scale to the extent of our Australian disease-free product. The fact is that demand out strips supply and we need to be proactive with the hand we are dealt.

Southern weaner sales are in full swing and the prices are as firm as the end of 2025, despite the headwind. The EYCI currently sits around 861CW with weaners selling to most eastern Australian states. Weaner steers have been selling from 480-600c/kg depending on weight and breed while the heifer portion has made from 420-500c/kg.

Our physical fat sales have started off where they finished in 2025, and that is strong. Tamworth yarded just on 2400 cattle Monday, with all categories quoted dearer. Stocker steers sold to 598c/kg while the heifer portion topped at 470c/kg. Feeder steers topped at 520c/kg for 558kg while the heifer made to 468c/kg. Heavy kill cattle were in high demand with kill steers, 600kg topping at 500c/kg, while cows made to 410c/kg for 702kg. 5814 sheep and lambs met strong competition in Tamworth with some outstanding export lambs making \$370, while the best of the trades made to \$273. Mutton sold strongly and topped at \$346 for XB while heavy wethers made to \$320.

New format for Field Day this Friday

The New England Merino Field Days are undergoing a new format this year, and will be held this Friday 16 January at Uralla Showground from 9am to 4pm with guest speakers from 1pm.

President, Paul Pittman explains the format below, so if you are a sheep grazier, there will be something for all breeders at the 2026 Field Day.

From Paul Pittman

Since our last Field Day which saw a change to having all member studs display at the one location, we have decided as a committee it was a progressive move forward with a lot of positive feedback. Once again, we look forward to showcasing our genetics in the New England from our member studs and would like to also welcome our new members Clive, Natasha and Emma Pearson from Glenbrook Merino and Poll Merino Stud.

For the past two years we certainly have seen our merino commodities move in all directions, but we are very pleased to report a lot of positivity with the wool market making some significant gains across the board most of this year. I think with dwindling supply going forward, I believe there is a very positive outlook for the wool market in the future. This also gives people a great opportunity to inspect and research our New England genetics and perhaps take their opportunity to move towards a few more merino joinings.

The buoyant lamb and mutton prices this past year has also put a very positive spin on the merino enterprise, making it a profitable one. Cashing in on merino lamb prices and for those with first-cross lambs being rewarded with some record prices recently. With this in mind it has come to our commitment to the sheep industry, that the field day committee has decided for the first time to introduce some meat breed studs.


As a committee we feel we want to progress and grow the field

day as many merino producers utilise meat production, making it suitable for the event. We continue to promote the industry together, making the merino ewe the most dual-purpose animal in grazing enterprises. That's one of the great things about the merino industry is its versatility to capitalise on several different markets provided by the merino ewe.

I would like to take this opportunity to introduce the meat breed studs: Alfoxton, Arakoon, Chandler, Hampshire, Harewood, Linton, Maryland, Old Woombi/Chain-O-Ponds, Wilsons Creek.

We hope this event can be positive for all studs. I would also like to thank our committee for all the help putting this event together.

Regarding seasonal conditions it certainly has been a challenge this past year with some well above rainfall recording in most parts of the region which once again gives our member studs the opportunity to showcase our genetics under seasonal pressure. This affirms our members commitment to producing a sheep which can combat many challenges thrown at them. This ensures which ever breeding objective you choose New England genetics are there to capitalise on once again.

Gun laws

In the days leading up to Christmas, Premier Chris Minns recalled Parliament to make unnecessary changes to firearms laws in NSW. I voted against these changes, as did the rest of the NSW Nationals.

The Government played politics as it combined the firearm provisions in a single bill which contains anti-protest provisions. Farmers, professional and sporting shooters, gun clubs and regional businesses already operate under some of the strictest gun laws in the world. In regional NSW, firearms are essential tools for biosecurity, animal welfare and livelihoods.

People in regional NSW expect governments to respond to tragedy with honesty, restraint and clear thinking. While grief and accountability matter, rushed policy designed to deflect from government failure does not.

Responding to terrorism by targeting law-abiding firearm owners undermines public trust and does not improve safety.

The changes to the gun laws were not required and penalised lawful firearm users for an act of terrorism.

Portfolios

NSW Opposition Leader Kelly Sloane unveiled a new Shadow Cabinet last week and I am pleased to be taking on the Shadow Minister for Agriculture and Prevention of Regional Crime portfolios.

These portfolios give me an opportunity to continue delivering for the Northern Tablelands by leading important discussions around two areas which are fundamental to the electorate.

In terms of regional crime, the issue goes beyond the regional crime rises above the usual argy-bargy of politics, and I intend to keep working constructively with the Attorney General and others to ensure it remains firmly on the agenda. There is so much more that can be done in this space. While our opposition crime bill was ultimately defeated, it contained many strong measures, and my job is to keep prosecuting those ideas, particularly around giving victims a greater voice and tightening bail conditions.

On agriculture, it's the old saying: when farmers are doing well, small businesses in town do well too. It's a significant challenge and a portfolio everyone in The Nationals wants, and I'm genuinely looking forward to it. I've already reached out to NSW Farmers to start identifying where we can make real improvements.

I am grateful for this opportunity and am looking forward to getting on with the job in working hard for our communities.




