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Walcha v St Albert's College

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around the traps

You don't have to travel far off the hills to see some green crops and fat livestock as Tamworth and surrounds looks a picture. Talking with people who live around Gunnedah, and they mentioned how good their season was and how quickly it had improved since winter. Grain crops look to be powering ahead, as well as the natural herbages for livestock which they all stated will be gone as quickly as they grew as it continues to heat up. I was amazed at the amount of people I was speaking to over the weekend that had sent large numbers of cattle away back in Autumn and predominantly to QLD. The interesting part is they are already being asked to move on with the expected heat set to take its toll on their grasses so the next move will be interesting. Unless you can find agistment in the south which would be the only safe bet at present, it's a tricky spot to be in with our current forecast unless, you decide to sell. If we can jag a couple of inches of rain directly, we will be set for a huge spring, and you can see how much the annual and permanent pasture crops have grown just over the last 3 weeks.

A new Angus and all breeds national seedstock record price was set last week with an Angus bull who fetched \$420,000, exceeding the previous record set by a Wagyu bull by \$20,000. Not only did the Millah Murrah stud set an Australian record for the highest price bull but they had a whopping average of \$37,578 which would have to be one of the highest averages, if not the record for a sale average. The strength of the bull sales has been tremendous with sale averages improving as the bull selling season draws to a close in a few weeks, especially the southern sales which is a representation of their current season.

EYCI cracked 1000c/kg late last week with restocker's keen to acquire light weaners to put back into grass filled paddocks in the south. The national saleyards numbers have dropped by as much as 20,000 head to 50,000 hd yarded since the start of August. Numbers throughout our region may start to climb as the temperatures heat up and our season hangs in the balance. What we are seeing in multiple centres is that the weight of the cattle compared to to same time last year has improved, probably more so in the south and north. Southern yardings are suggesting the cattle are 40-60kg heavier than the previous year due to the better season adding more value to the livestock. We are getting plenty of phone calls with southern buyers looking to replace these cattle who are now extremely active in our markets, especially store condition animals with plenty of frame. AuctionsPlus last week went to another level with light Angus steers making more than \$7/kg, Angus heifers made \$6.30/kg while feeder steers stepped up once again to see Angus feeders hit \$6.30, a long way in front of the physical market. Breeder cattle continue to strengthen, especially in the south with young Angus females in the prime of their lives making from \$3600-\$4000 a unit which is where they should be given the price of the weaner market.

The El Nino is forecasted to peak in late spring early summer with temperatures already on the rise across the eastern states. Parts of western QLD have already been forecasted to hit high thirties and with the threat of bush fire season upon us, bush fires are already causing havoc across southern QLD, and along the great divide. The threat is heightened given the extra warm weather and the expectation that we will have a severe storm season. It was evident on Saturday night when that small front whipped through the region with huge gusts of wind. I only mentioned last week that we hadn't had much wind, well I may have helped bring that on. We haven't had much rain, but I hope this has the same effect as my wind statement last week. Judging by the black cockatoos I've seen over the last week there should be plenty of rain coming, or maybe they are just nesting specifically around my house just to taunt me!

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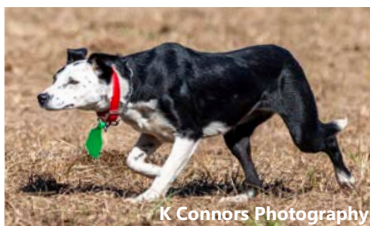

Quite a few men just come for the morning tea at 10am where they can enjoy the wonderful cakes and slices provided by our own cook, Sam or our wonderful supporter, Lorraine. Recently we have been asking a member to tell us their life story at the 2nd Wednesday of the month morning tea. As we have a vast range of members this has proved very interesting. Then on the last Wednesday of each month Sam cooks up a lovely lunch for those who put their name down. 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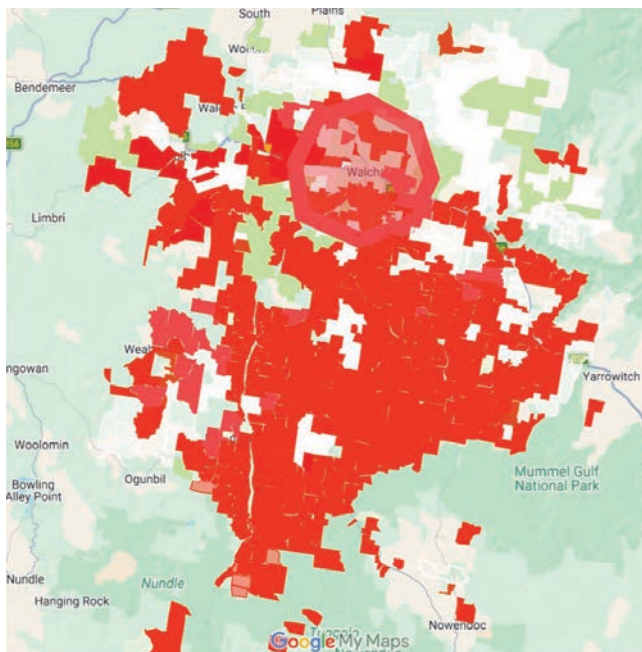
WHCG map development

Over the past few weeks, the Walcha High Country Guardians (WHCG) have been working on developing a map of our region to signify the lack of social licence towards hosting renewable projects and its associated infrastructure. The resulting image speaks volumes; there is no room for the development of any new generation projects, hosting the transmission lines or the workers camps.

This map is also a stark contrast to the original map Walcha Energy produced which blanketed our entire region with proposed generation projects, misrepresenting our community and misleading the Government to believe the support was here to develop the NE REZ to 8GW. With this many landowners opposed to hosting, we believe this is clear evidence to cap the REZ at its current generation and scrap the transmission line along with its workers camps.

A special congratulations goes to Flynn O'Connell, who was named Best and Fairest for the finals in both the U/16 and Opens divisions.

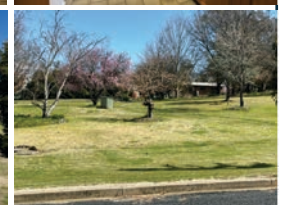
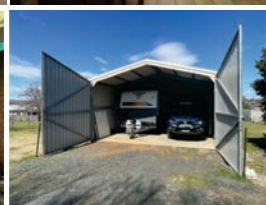
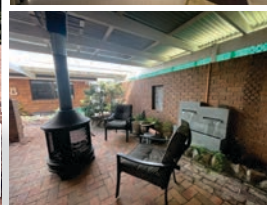
It was a great effort from all teams, with Walcha Central School bringing home two silver medals and a gold medal at state level for touch football.

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RUGBY REPORT FINALS

REGGIES

Walcha Reggies booked their place in the grand final with a tough, well-executed 28-19 win over the Armidale Blues at Bellevue Oval. It was the sort of finals performance the Rams needed: physical up front, organised in defence, and clinical enough when chances came.

The Blues came out with plenty of intent and looked dangerous early, stretching Walcha across the park and forcing the visitors to scramble. That is where the Rams' structure held. Harry Partridge was outstanding in defence, repeatedly stepping up and rattling Blues attackers before they could get over the gain line. His hits set the tone and gave the rest of the line time to fold in.

Nick Rogers' service from nine was flawless. Clean, quick ball off the deck and a calm head at the breakdown meant Walcha could play on the front foot instead of living off scraps. When the Rams did get go-forward, it usually started through the midfield. Jordan Hill and Andrew Kelly were solid all afternoon, hitting the line hard and adding the extra metres that turned half-chances into genuine pressure. Their work in the 13 channel kept the Blues guessing and created space out wide.

Ben Fussell continued his excellent form with some rampaging runs that regularly bent the Armidale defensive line. Every time Walcha needed a lift, Big Fuss put his hand up, carrying through contact and giving the pack something to work off. Those charges, combined with patient phase play, eventually told on the scoreboard.

At the back, Hunter Thornbury had an excellent game at fullback. He was composed under the high ball and, more importantly, made a number of covering tackles when the Blues looked set to break. Several times the home side thought they were away only for Thornbury to appear and shut the door. That last line of defence was the difference in a match that never quite got away from either side.

Walcha's pack won enough of the collisions to keep the game in the right parts of the field. They were not flashy, but they were consistent: first to the breakdown, tidy at the set piece, and unwilling to give the Blues cheap ball. When Armidale did find space, the Rams' scramble defence held. The 28-19 scoreline flattered the contest a little in the last quarter; Walcha had done the hard work earlier and then managed the game well once they had their noses in front.

It was a complete team effort, Reserve grade now head into the grand final with belief and a clear idea of how they want to play. A grand final awaits. If the Rams can produce another display like this — tight defence, sharp service, and go-forward through the middle — they will give themselves every chance.

FIRST GRADE

Walcha's first-grade season ended in the cruellest way at Bellevue

Oval, falling 53-48 to St Alberts College after a runaway try in the last minute. It was a high-scoring preliminary final in which both sides threw everything at it, and for 79 minutes neither team could kick away. Then Albies found one last gap, went the length, and the Rams were left with nothing but a long trip home.

The contest see-sawed from the opening whistle. Every time Walcha punched a hole, St Alberts answered. Every time the College looked set to squeeze the game, the Rams came again. It was physical, direct rugby, and Walcha's best work came when they ran straight and hard at the Albies line rather than looking for the pretty option.

Sam Colwell was at his destructive best. He rampaged in attack all afternoon, bending defenders and giving the Rams a platform they could play off, and he did it for the full 80 minutes. There was no drip-feeding him minutes off the pine — Colwell stayed on and kept asking the same question of the St Alberts defence.

Banjo Lawrence threw himself into the attack the same way. Time and again he ran into the Albies line, taking the heavy contact and forcing the College to reload. That willingness to go first created the space others used later in the phase.

Ross Monie was big at both ends. In attack he carried with purpose; in defence he was a constant presence around the ball, slowing Albies' recycle and making them earn every metre. On a day when the scoreboard never settled, that two-way work kept Walcha in the fight.

Out wide, Hamish Heeney laid the platform with some dominant carries. He didn't just finish attacks — he started them, getting the Rams over the gain line on the edges and giving the backline a chance to play. Michael Paull had a good game on the wing and finished off the attack well when the ball finally came his way. Those two linked neatly whenever Walcha went around rather than through.

At the back, Eddie Pitt played well at fullback. His kicking was sound, both from the tee and in general play, and he added a layer of attack out wide that St Alberts had to respect. Pitt's presence meant Walcha always had a second option when the middle of the park got congested.

For all that, the game would not sit still. Leads changed, the try line kept getting crossed, and both packs emptied the tank. Walcha will replay the last minute for a while. A season's work came down to one missed assignment and a runaway, and that is a hard way to go out.

There is no dressing it up: it was heartbreaking. But it was also a performance the club can stand by. The Rams played with physical, direct attack, punched holes in a good St Alberts side, and stayed in a shootout that could have gone either way until the final play. The manner of the loss will sting. The way they played should not.

First grade's year is done, but the club's isn't. Reserve grade take on St Alberts College in the grand final at Bellevue Oval, Armidale and they will need the same noise and numbers.

Get behind them. Wear the jumper, get to the ground early, and make it a Rams Day. The Reggies have earned the shot. The rest of the club can help them finish it.
