Grounded in the principles of the <u>Land and Peoples Relationship Model</u>, Elder Copper Joe Jack will guide participants through a 5-month program on building respectful, caring, and collaborative sustainability solutions.

An optional Summer 2026 land-based session in Kwanlin (Whitehorse, Yukon) will open for applications in Winter 2026.

## **Learning Objectives**

By the end of this course, participants will have

- A deeper understanding of the Land and Peoples Relationships Model and the teachings that ground this collaborative planning tool
- A deeper understanding of Canada's 2030 Sustainable Development Goals (with a specific focus on No. 13: Climate Action, No. 14: Life on Land, and No. 15: Life Below Water)
- An ability to describe the complementary nature of the Land and Peoples Relationship Model and SDG's 13, 14, and 15
- Connected the teachings and application of the Land and Peoples Relationship Model to their own individual context, guided by discussion as well as the reflection assignments and the final project
- Space to consider how the Land and Peoples Relationship Model relates to a broader national and international context
- A certificate of completion (upon fulfillment of the criteria)
- An invitation to apply for the Summer 2026 land-based course in Kwanlin (Whitehorse, Yukon)



# B. Detailed Course Description

The Land and Peoples Relationship Model (LPRM) was conceived by Copper Joe Jack in 2018. He developed the model in response to his concerns about climate change and his commitment to using Traditional Knowledge to help drive meaningful solutions. It is described as a spiritual model that is also an extension of science, designed to bring two different knowledge systems — Indigenous and Western — together to work respectfully without merging or assimilating them.

This course was originally conceived of as a way to expose many people to the existence of, and high-level function of the LPRM. However, upon consulting with the Elder's circle, it became apparent that it was more important for a smaller number of people to become more intimately familiar with the model and its teachings. Thus, the idea of a course-based delivery emerged. Registration in the course will gain you access to 20 hours of virtual sessions led by Elder Copper Joe Jack, and to all the course content, including videos of Copper Jack's land-based teachings, all powerpoint slides, and other supplemental documents. There will be opportunities to dive deeper into the content with Elder Copper in the "off" weeks as well, if participants desire.

The Elders also impressed upon us the importance of people coming to their territory to get to know the Land, especially if they want to engage deeply with the model's teachings. This was the motivation to add the optional Land-based component of the course; those that might want to hire or work with the model in the future, or even those who want to get to know the model further on the Land it was born from, are welcome to apply. The applications for the land-based component of the course will open in the new year.

# **Learning Environment**

This document is a guide to course content and scheduling. Be aware that what we have planned is never set in stone and some changes can be expected, but we will never spring these on you unannounced.

Generally, each 2-hour session will feature an opening teaching or some form of cultural grounding exercise, a short 'core learning' presentation, and some combination of participant discussions, exercises and activities. We also hope to create opportunities to engage with the course materials through online discussion, if that is something participants are interested in.



Our course will be adhering to the Model's key laws of "respect, care, share", meaning that we aspire to foster a learning environment that is welcoming, safe, and interactive, where everyone feels comfortable to engage and participate. We recognize that each participant brings unique perspectives, beliefs, and life experiences to this class. All of us are expected to maintain respect for one another and adopt a caring and open-minded attitude. We recognize that students have different strengths, and diverse needs, and we will work with you to tackle any challenges that arise through this course.

## Participation and Discussion Guidelines (or, "Rules of Engagement")

Beyond expressing your own relevant thoughts and experiences, participation means listening to, responding to, and leaving room for others in the discussion. We will be adhering to the Model's "Rules of Engagement", to ensure all participants hear, and feel heard during discussion. These rules of engagement include:

- 1. Show respect for each other, and the Land;
- 2. Feel as much as you think (e.g. stating "I feel" rather than "I think" during discussion)
- 3. Listen to understand what is being said (with your heart, as well as your head);
- 4. Clarify what you say and hear, and
- 5. Have patience.

### **Code of Conduct**

Based on the above Rules of Engagement, participants will be expected to review, acknowledge and adhere to the Land and Peoples Relationship Model Code of Conduct (to be shared during registration).
