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MAYOR'S CORNER

After experiencing the devastating February 2024 “monster storm” that caused unprecedented damage in La Habra Heights, city staff members spent a lot of time preparing for and standing by on call 24/7 during recent heavy atmospheric river rains that started in late November 2025 and lasted off and on through the end of the year.

A TV helicopter news event occurred during the heavy storm on November 21 when a 60-foot pine tree fell on the edge of a Kashlan resident’s home (above). Although it occurred on a Friday when City Hall was closed, the staff nevertheless responded along with the Fire Department and City Manager Rafferty Wooldridge. Michael Moore, our building inspector, immediately conducted a thorough damage assessment to determine whether the building was safe for occupancy and for electrical service to be restored. Owner Brian Voight, who was raised in the Heights, came to the December City Council meeting to publicly thank and compliment our staff.

Other than that unfortunate incident, the Heights weathered the recent winter storms with little damage.

Important workshops address LHH fiscal challenges

On January 10, the City Council held the fourth in a series of *Strategic Planning Workshops* to review the city’s current operating environment, capacity gaps and regulatory pressures that affect the budget and staff workload. We really need your input about the city’s path forward, so please attend our final fiscal workshop on **Saturday, February 21, at 10 a.m. at City Hall**. Prior workshop content will be summarized. In the past, we have always managed to keep the city budget balanced. However, multiple factors are now straining the budget:

- Inflation, including the cost of road repair.
- State regulatory mandates, including the prohibition on oil drilling, which will reduce or terminate oil revenue to the city.
- The loss of potential federal and state grant sources.
- Safety services requirements, including two onsite paramedics required 24/7 by our Fire Mutual Aid Agreement with Los Angeles County.

In addition, we have been operating at a City Hall staffing level well below the number of employees in 2010—which is unsustainable and

What do we mean by *rural*?

La Habra Heights is a unique community in the greater Los Angeles area because of its rural character, which is not an accident but a reflection of intentional, continual efforts and commitments by residents since our community was founded and named in 1919 by Edwin G. Hart.

A dictionary definition of “rural” is: “relating to the countryside, characterized by open spaces, low population density, farms and less development than cities, often focusing on agricultural life and natural landscapes. It describes areas with fewer people, scattered homes and a strong connection to nature and agriculture, contrasting with urban environments.” While that general description fits La Habra Heights, our residents decided to be much more specific in the community’s *General Plan*, the first goal of which is: “Protect, preserve, and enhance the residential rural character and individualistic lifestyle of La Habra Heights . . . **‘Rural’ has been defined by the community as: variety of homes; natural terrain and dense vegetation; houses that blend in with the setting; privacy and large distances between homes; keeping of horses and farm animals; scenic views; no ‘city’ improvements such as curbs, gutters, sidewalks, and streetlights.**” The *La Habra Heights Municipal Code* further describes our community character as “the overall perceived environmental setting of the City [including] views of densely vegetated rolling hills, extensive natural terrain, foliage and open space, large lots, wide variety of home styles, roads conforming to the natural terrain, quiet and private residential character and dark skies.” Thus the distinctive character of “the Heights” includes sights, sounds, smells and experiences that arise from living in a rural setting free from common distractions of urban life.

In 1978, residents voted to incorporate La Habra Heights as a city so they could control their destiny and preserve the community’s rural character, which included minimum one-acre zoning and living close to nature and to animals both domestic and wild. They also wished to maintain their own Volunteer Fire Department (officially founded in 1942) and to obtain improved law enforcement services.

To preserve our rural character, our city allows and encourages some things that are forbidden by most other cities and forbids some things commonly allowed elsewhere. For example, keeping horses and other large farm animals is permitted in La Habra Heights, and domesticated animals and pets are also welcome. Our hilly, winding roads are open not only to motorized vehicles, but to pedestrians, cyclists, and horseback riders.

Unlike in most cities, houses here are required to blend into the natural setting, not draw attention or appear more massive than neighboring homes and to be appropriately scaled to lots. Grading and impervious coverings are limited to preserve rural character and allow natural infiltration of water. Our *Dark Skies Policy* calls for the preservation of views of the dark night sky by controlling light and glare from artificial lighting.

Because the state of California designates parts of La Habra Heights as a *Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zone* (VHFHSZ), active, continual fire prevention is critical here all year long—especially now when the growth of brush and other vegetation is so high due to the recent, heavy winter rains.

We protect our unique rural community from wildfires by complying with our city’s comprehensive brush clearance requirement that all properties must remain 100 percent clear of all weeds, rubbish, refuse and other combustible materials that could fuel fires. Our Fire Department publishes the *La Habra Heights Annual Brush Clearance Guide* that explains our fire safety requirements in detail and encourages residences to report any fire hazards to the Fire Department at 562-694-8233. It’s all part of living in this unique rural environment. PulsePoint™

PulsePoint alerts CPR-trained individuals about nearby sudden cardiac arrest incidents and provides locations of nearby automated external defibrillators (AEDs). Used in over 3,400 U.S. communities, PulsePoint is implemented and supported by the PulsePoint Foundation in collaboration with many public safety agencies.



WATCH DUTY™

Watch Duty alerts you about nearby wildfires and firefighting efforts in real time and tracks wildfire developments. It uses a combination of official data sources and human monitoring by experienced volunteers, including active and retired firefighters, dispatchers and first responders—real people with highly relevant knowledge.



MyShake™

MyShake provides timely, potentially life-saving earthquake early-warning alerts in California, Oregon and Washington. MyShake uses ground-motion sensors to detect earthquakes in progress and delivers real-time alerts for earthquakes of magnitude 4.5 or greater several seconds before local shaking arrives.

A Nazi spy in the Heights



In 1939, Carlos Widmann was looking for a lot with a view—an unobstructed, panoramic view of a specific area in the Pacific Ocean.

He found exactly what he was looking for on Solejar Drive in La Habra Heights: a 12.25-acre parcel of land atop a terraced hill covered with avocado trees. The hilltop was fairly level, perfect for the house he planned to build, so Widmann, possibly an immigrant from Germany, purchased the property from Herman C. Smith, a major Heights landowner.

Widmann and his wife built a lovely Spanish-style house with four bedrooms and a casita, adorning the front facade, fireplace and window sills with beautiful, now-vintage Moorish-style tiles made by the D&M Tile Company in Los Angeles.

The couple moved into their new home in February 1940, and Widmann soon added a special accessory: a shortwave radio carefully hidden in an upstairs closet. He used it to report ship movements and harbor activities in the Port of Long Beach and the adjacent Port of Los Angeles, details of which he could clearly see with powerful German-made binoculars.

Widmann was an ardent Nazi sympathizer who was confident that Adolph Hitler's Third Reich, which was dominating the war in Europe at the time, would eventually invade the United States and occupy Southern California, and he believed that Germany and its allies would benefit from the intelligence he was providing. He even planned to offer his hilltop home as a Nazi headquarters.



Early in World War II, the Port of Long Beach (*above*) became a crucial military hub, transforming into a massive U.S. Navy base and shipyard and serving as a vital staging, training and repair center for the U.S. Pacific Fleet, with ships constantly coming and going and thousands of service members and civilians working in the war effort.

The Port of Los Angeles also played a significant role throughout the war. Shown below is a fleet of "Victory Ships," cargo vessels that provided vital supplies to American military forces worldwide.

Both of these ports were daily targets for Widmann's espionage activities.



We don't know to whom Widmann was radioing his reports. He could have been transmitting to a local destination—a large pro-Nazi group was active on the West Coast (*see the sidebar at the right*)—or all the way to Germany. A shortwave radio uses high-frequency (3 to 30 megahertz) signals that bounce off the atmosphere and can travel several thousand miles, even from one continent to another.

We also don't know whether the naval information Widmann provided to Nazi Germany had any significant impact on the U.S. war effort.

But we do know that the FBI became suspicious of Widmann's activities, possibly while closely monitoring pro-Nazi groups in which Widmann may have been involved. Because of its multiple military sites and defense-related industries, the Los Angeles area was considered a "hot spot" for Nazi espionage, so the FBI was especially diligent.

After the U.S. went to war in December 1941, the FBI began rounding up "suspicious persons," and Widmann was one of them. In late 1942, they ordered him to cease and desist and threatened to confiscate his property if he didn't leave. The U.S. deported thousands of suspected spies and saboteurs, but the Justice Department often encouraged suspected Nazi sympathizers to leave voluntarily as an expedient way to avoid legal challenges. Some who were American citizens were stripped of their citizenships before they departed.

Early in 1943, Widmann sold his property to the Prantalos family, and he and his wife left the Heights. There is no publicly available record of what happened to them after that. The new owners of the Solejar Drive home discovered Widmann's radio antenna wires neatly concealed in an upstairs closet and strung among avocado trees surrounding the house.

The Prantalos family lived in the Heights home for 30 years, and Steven Prantalos eventually subdivided the property into four lots and sold them.

Widmann's 66-year-old antenna wires were still in place when the Langstons bought the home in 2006. They remodeled and updated the house, being careful to respect its original architecture.

The Ly family bought the home in 2009. On a clear day, they still can enjoy the wide, sweeping view that enabled Widmann to spy on our coastal ports.

PRO-NAZI ACTIVITIES IN SoCAL

Widmann was probably associated with the German-American Bund, a large pro-Nazi, anti-Semitic organization that was very active in the United States, especially in the Los Angeles area from the mid-1930s to early 1940s. The Bund had secret "cells" that engaged in espionage targeting military installations and war-related industries.

The Bund held frequent rallies to attract German immigrants, including veterans who had served in the losing German army in World War I. Bitterness over economic hardships caused by that loss helped propel Hitler's rapid rise to power after he became German chancellor in 1933, the same year that the Bund was founded and Franklin D. Roosevelt became U.S. president.

The organization sponsored youth training camps throughout the United States to spread Nazi ideologies.

The Bund also appealed to disgruntled non-German Americans who were still suffering from the Great Depression and to "isolationists" who opposed future American participation in the war in Europe. Bund rallies were adorned with banners that read "America First!" and "Keep Our Boys at Home!" Bund members claimed to be ultra-patriotic Americans, and they believed that fascism was the solution to the country's problems—they even asserted that George Washington had been "the First Fascist."

Fascism was a new concept to many Americans at that time, and some of those who opposed the policies of the Roosevelt administration found it appealing.

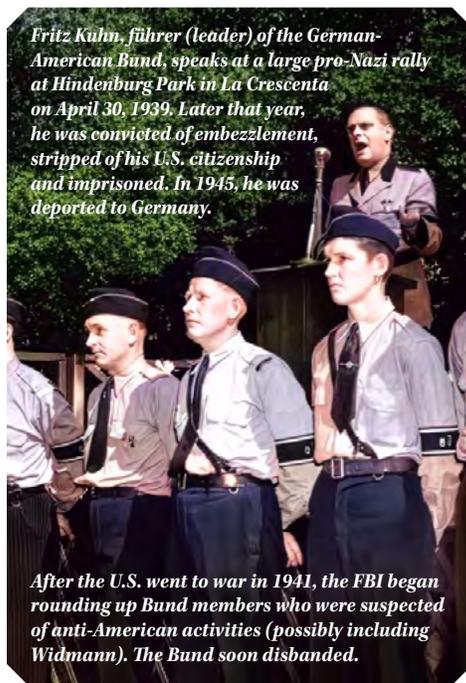
Founded in Italy by Benito Mussolini in 1922, fascism is a far-right, authoritarian political ideology that emphasizes extreme nationalism, militarism and a powerful central government led by a dictator. It prioritizes the nation above the individual and suppresses opposition through relentless propaganda and violence, often with a cult of personality around the leader, a focus on national rebirth, unity, loyalty to the leader and opposition to democracy. Hitler was a great admirer of Mussolini, and he patterned his National Socialism (in German, *Nationalsozialismus* or *Nazi* for short) after Italian fascism, but he put much greater emphasis on racial purity, white supremacy and virulent anti-Semitism. The German-American Bund promulgated this Nazi ideology in the United States.

After the U.S. went to war in 1941, the FBI began rounding up Bund members who were suspected of anti-American activities (possibly including Widmann). The Bund soon disbanded.

Habitat Authority purchases 5.5-acre open parcel in Heights to enhance wildfire safety efforts

The Puente Hills Habitat Preservation Authority completed the purchase in December of a 5.5-acre parcel of open space in La Habra Heights. The acquisition ensures permanent preservation and protection of the land and enhancement of critical wildfire resilience measures for surrounding communities.

The parcel (in light green in the photo above) is just southeast of Fullerton Road. This acquisition adds to the Habitat Authority's Puente Hills Preserve and preserves the land as open space. The Habitat Authority plans to further protect the hills and surrounding communities with the development of a permanent strategic firebreak in the form of a trailhead on this parcel. The land will also serve as an emergency staging area.

The purchase was made possible with recent funding from the San Gabriel and Lower Los Angeles Rivers and Mountains Conservancy (RMC), a state agency. The funding supports the Habitat Authority's Puente Hills Fire Resiliency project, which enhances wildfire safety for the Puente Hills Preserve and the surrounding communities of Whittier, La Habra Heights, Hacienda Heights and Rowland Heights.

"This acquisition is a powerful example of what local and state partnerships can achieve for our communities," said Ivan Sulic, Chairperson of the Habitat Authority's board of directors. "By protecting this land forever, we're strengthening wildfire resilience, preserving critical habitat and ensuring that future generations can experience the beauty and natural diversity of the Puente Hills."

The state funding originates from the Safe Drinking Water, Wildfire Prevention, Drought Preparedness and Clean Air Bond Act of 2024. The three-year grant agreement, executed in August 2025, supports wildfire prevention and protection, wildfire prevention planning, biological consulting and contractor oversight, and land acquisition.

"This purchase represents a major step forward in our long-term strategy to safeguard both the Puente Hills Preserve and the people who live around it," said Andrea Gullo, Habitat Authority Executive Director. "With this new land, we're not only expanding protected open space, we're building real, lasting wildfire defenses that benefit the local community."



The Habitat Authority conducts annual targeted vegetation management and fuel reduction in the wildland-urban interface, areas where preserved open space meets residential neighborhoods. These efforts provide defensible space for first responders. This winter, the Habitat Authority has been using RMC grant funds to clear targeted areas throughout La Habra Heights to increase wildfire safety and preparedness in the community. This work is focused on long-term solutions that reduce fire danger while preserving the natural rural landscape that defines the community.

The Habitat Authority is also working on several other grant projects, including ordering a tactical 2,000 gallon firefighting water tender, home-hardening an Authority facility and long-term strategic fuel-management planning.

These wildfire resiliency efforts are not just about land stewardship, they are about protecting people, homes and critical infrastructure. Proactive land management helps firefighters do their jobs more safely and effectively while providing surrounding communities with greater peace of mind.

Since its establishment in 1994, the Habitat Authority has been preserving and protecting more than 3,800 acres of natural habitats of the Puente Hills area—including Hacienda Hills, Turnbull Canyon, Sycamore Canyon, Hellman Park, Arroyo Pescadero and Powder Canyon—while also providing important recreational opportunities.
