Coming out of distance learning and COVID times did not help, but thankfully, Geo had a family who encouraged him to give our program a try. The first year was a struggle because Geo's attendance was not particularly good. He felt he didn't need school and looked at attending the Street School as a waste of time. He was working full time and was not sure he needed school to achieve his goals in life; however, he enrolled in our program, and like so many students before him, Geo had an awakening and made some changes. His attendance improved, his grades went up, and he began participating in school activities. He played on the boys' basketball team, became a member of the 2024 / 2025 Twin City Conference champions, and success followed.

Geo, who always had a love for cars, focused on his desire to become an automotive technician. Now, after quite a journey through our program, he will receive his diploma in May and begin attending Forsyth Technical Community College in the fall to realize his dream of a career in the automotive field. In the last few months, Geo has become a mentor to younger students. He is quick to let them know there will be tough days, but he also reassures them that hard work is worth the effort because he can see a bright future unfolding right before his eyes.

Graduate Spotlight – Class of 2025



GISELL

High School Program

Gisell, known affectionately as “Gigi” by her peers and teachers, is a shining example of perseverance and purpose. A senior with

dreams of becoming a surgeon, Gigi’s journey has been marked by determination in the face of adversity.

Throughout her high school years, Gigi faced significant challenges including financial struggles, family issues, and a lack of consistent support, all of which took a toll on her mental health. Despite these hardships, she found strength and encouragement within the Street School community.

“I didn’t doubt I would complete my education,” Gigi shared, “but losing motivation can really slow your progress down.” The environment of the Street School gave her the boost she needed to stay focused. Structured guidance, accountability, and a genuine sense of belonging helped Gigi reclaim her momentum. One of the most rewarding aspects of her time at the Street School has been the opportunity to start dual enrollment with Forsyth Tech, which has allowed her to begin working toward her career while still completing high school.

Beyond academics, Gigi credits the program with teaching her invaluable life lessons. She learned how to connect with people from all walks of life, developing empathy and understanding that will serve her well in both her personal and professional future. According to Gigi, “The Street School showed me to see the good in everyone.”

After graduation, Gigi plans to attend Forsyth Tech to earn her associate degree in nursing before enrolling in medical school. She believes that earning her diploma is more than just an academic achievement, it’s a step closer to becoming the best version of herself. Gigi offers advice to others navigating similar struggles: “Live your life with kindness, integrity, and build positive character. It’s not just for others; it’ll take you far. It will benefit you more than others. Make the world better.”

Gigi defines success as a journey shaped by effort and growth. “Success can sometimes mean failure, but failure means effort, and effort means growth, and growth is your success. I have become stronger, more confident, wiser, and my heart grew more than I thought was possible.” Gigi’s story is a testament to the power of resilience and the transformative impact of the Street School.



ISELA

Adult Program

Balancing family, work, and education is no small feat, but Isela Gomez has done just that, earning her diploma through the Street School online adult

education program. Her path wasn’t always smooth; at times, she doubted her ability to continue due to personal challenges, work, and parenting responsibilities. There were moments when she paused her studies, feeling overwhelmed by life’s demands.

However, with the unwavering support of her teachers, Mrs. Tammy and Mrs. Denise, Isela found the strength to return and persevere. “They made sure I believed in myself as much as they believed in me and made sure I had all the support from mentors, counselors, and anyone I needed to complete my journey.” Isela goes on to say, “They gave me so much validation when I needed it, and it helped me gain the strength to keep pushing to be better.”

Graduating has opened new doors for Isela, offering opportunities for further education and personal growth. She advises others facing similar challenges: “It doesn’t matter how slowly you go, as long as you don’t stop. All our dreams can come true if we have the courage to pursue them.”

Her story serves as a powerful reminder of how perseverance and community support can lead to remarkable achievements.

Tutors Impact Our Students



Murray Hewell,
High School Tutor

When he retired at the end of 2023, Murray Hewell began looking for volunteer opportunities. Having attended luncheons and Share the Love events over the years, he was already familiar

with the mission of the Street School and wanted to take a more “hands-on” role in supporting students.

Through volunteering, Murray has seen firsthand how motivated students are to succeed. They recognize that the Street School offers a critical opportunity—one that can change the trajectory of their lives. They understand that earning their diplomas will open doors to a future they may not have imagined possible.

Volunteering at the Street School has given Murray the chance to assist the dedicated staff and teachers who sincerely care about the students and do everything they can to provide them with the resources, support, and encouragement they need. Murray’s support has made a real difference. According to one of his students, Ben, “Mr. Murray has been a great help. Without him, I wouldn’t be where I am now. He’s helped me improve my grade in Biology from a 60 to an 82.”

Murray believes the Street School is a special place. As a 100% privately funded institution, it provides a last chance for many students to earn a North Carolina high school diploma. “I encourage others to get involved, meet some great kids, and have a positive impact on someone’s life.”



Megan Lawson,
Adult Program Tutor

More than a decade ago, Megan Lawson, a retired educator, joined the Street School Board. Over the years, she has worn many hats, from event planning to working in the development office, but tutoring has been

her most rewarding experience. Working one-on-one with students allows her to connect with students personally, support their learning, and witness their progress firsthand.

Megan primarily tutors English, reading, and comprehension—just don’t ask her to help with math! Many students she works with have been promoted without fully grasping fundamental skills. She breaks concepts into manageable pieces, helping them build understanding and confidence step by step.

The best teaching tool she has found is encouragement. Many students have faced setbacks, and sometimes, all they need is someone to remind them that they are capable. By focusing on their strengths, she helps them develop self-assurance, and once they believe in themselves, nothing can hold them back.

For Megan, tutoring is about more than academics—it’s about trust and connection. She loves hearing students’ stories, seeing pictures of their families, celebrating their successes, and seeing how a diploma transforms their lives, whether they plan to enter the workforce, college, or the military.

Volunteering at the Street School has given Megan as much as she has given to the students. She believes the students are the most welcoming, grateful, warm people around. They want to be there and are a pleasure to teach. She especially enjoys seeing the students grasp a lesson or concept that had previously stumped them. According to Megan, “Watching them ‘get it’ is such a gift! I also love being with young people who can certainly teach me a thing or two and keep me current.”

For those considering volunteering, Megan says, “Don’t be afraid to tutor. There is lots of support for tutors, and the students are genuinely excited to work with tutors. If tutoring is not your gift, there are many other ways to get involved, from leading a club to providing lunch. The students are always excited to see volunteers.” Walking through the doors of the Street School, you’ll immediately feel the warmth of the community—and once you experience it, you’ll want to be part of it, just like Megan did.



WSSS Warriors – 2024 / 2025 Twin City Conference Champions



The story of the Street School Warriors basketball team sounds like it could be straight out of a “feel good” movie. At the urging of a guest speaker six years ago, the Street School started taking a group of young men to play ball a couple of afternoons a week, and they soon began to learn plays and work as a team. After a few scrimmages against area JV teams and an extended break for COVID-19, the Warriors began looking for a more organized opportunity to play. The school invited area churches to compete, and soon a new league was formed and a season was scheduled culminating in a tournament conference for the Street School, First Presbyterian, Centenary United Methodist, Greek Orthodox, St. Paul’s Episcopal, and Ardmore Baptist.

The Twin City Conference gave the Warriors the chance to belong to an organized sports environment for the first time.

There were few victories in the first two seasons, but the fun, camaraderie, and sense of belonging easily outweighed the lack of wins. Everything changed during the 2024–2025 season as the Street School Warriors soared, winning the regular season 10–1 overall and capturing the tournament crown. The team discovered that good things happen when players adopt a team concept and truly play together. Coaches E Jay Chandler and Lahmi Simmons took a group of individual young men and transformed them into championship team. The Street School already looks forward to defending the title this coming year.

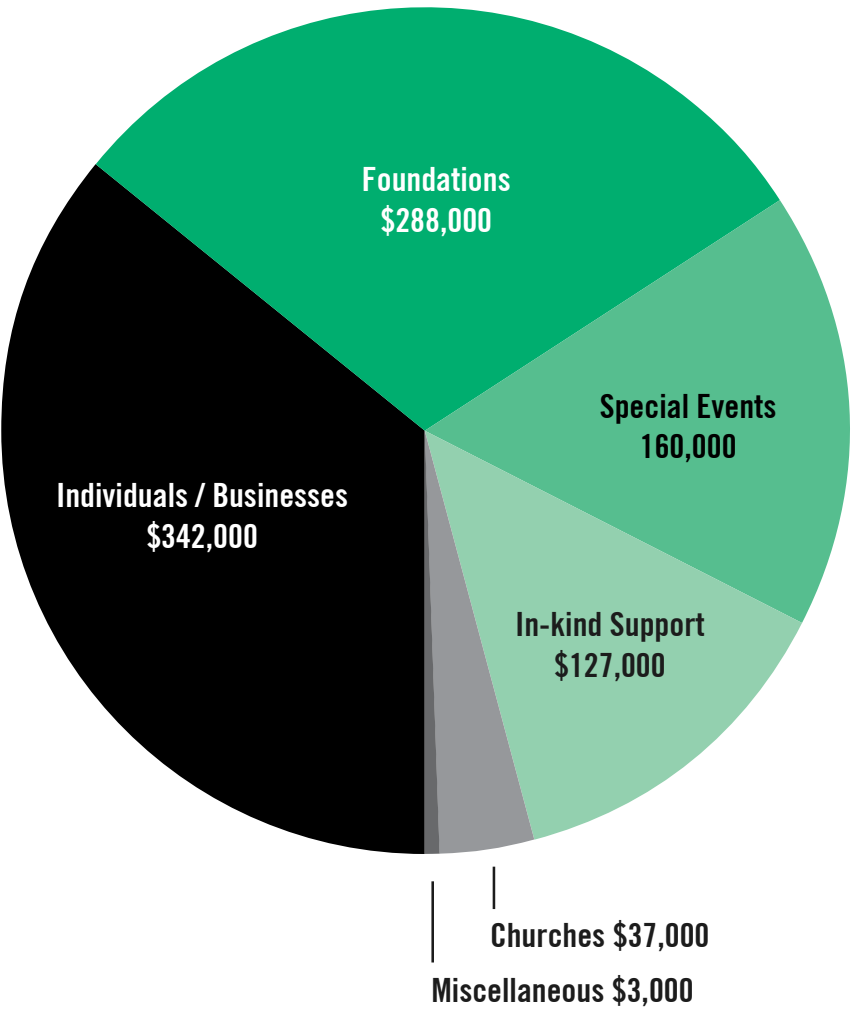

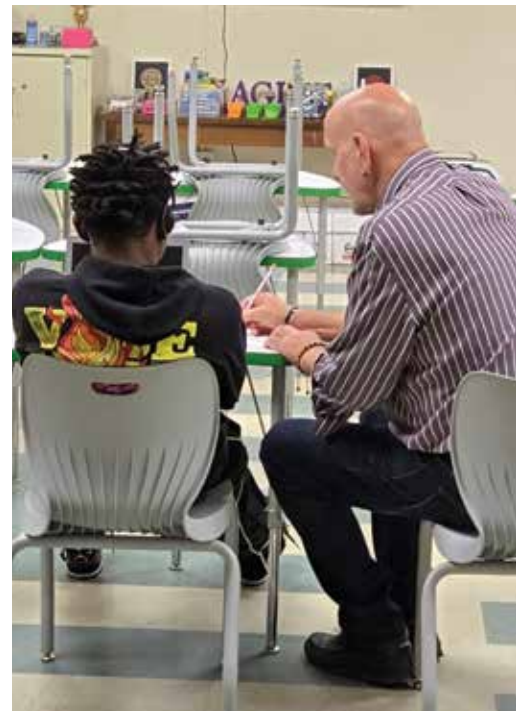
