Over the last 22 years, hundreds of students have discovered the Winston-Salem Street School and the life-changing opportunities it offers. Some have been referred from area public schools, a number have come because a friend or sibling found success here, and others reached out because they heard that there was just something different about the Street School.

What is that difference? Is it that we are a tuition-free private school that offers small class sizes and specialized attention to every student? Maybe it's that we meet each student where they are in their educational journey, whether they need two or 20 credits, or are a sophomore in high school, or are a 22-year-old adult looking to earn their diploma. Maybe it's just that Street School students experience a special love from the moment they walk through our doors. Perhaps it's all the above and more.

I feel certain that Street School students gain confidence, knowledge, and a newfound belief in themselves when they commit to our programs. Whether it's mastering financial literacy skills, discovering artistic abilities, or hearing a guest speaker share an inspiring message, Street School students are truly blessed with opportunities.

Gabe Sweat is a shining example of what is at the heart of the Street School experience. Gabe has gained an appreciation for the chance to grow, respect for the staff who support him, and an opportunity to step out of his comfort zone. From the time Gabe entered our program, he has been committed to getting everything possible out of his experience. He has navigated his way through classes, settled for nothing less than honor roll-level grades, established himself as a leader on our basketball team, and quickly become a young man who has earned the respect of staff and fellow students. Through our mentoring program, we connected Gabe with Guy Morgan, a community leader and longtime supporter of the Street School. Their relationship has been a positive experience for both and one that continues to this day. Gabe is currently enrolled at Forsyth Technical Community College through our dual enrollment partnership, and he has also landed a part-time job at Novant Health Forsyth Medical Center, introducing him to a career path he hopes to follow.

MELANIE

High School Program

For some students, the path to a diploma is anything but straightforward. For Melanie, it was shaped by hardship, resilience, and ultimately,

transformation. Growing up in a home filled with conflict and instability, Melanie faced toxic family dynamics and an abusive relationship that pulled her away from school. Eventually, she was forced to leave the traditional system altogether, followed by a year marked by depression and self-doubt.

Then Melanie made a life-changing decision to try again. That choice led her to the Winston-Salem Street School, a place she now calls “a huge blessing.” The journey back wasn’t easy. Leaving an unhealthy relationship and rebuilding her confidence took courage. “The staff here helped me push through with how understanding and motivating they are,” she shared. With the support of caring teachers, mentors, and counselors, Melanie began to believe in herself again, and in December of 2025, she earned her diploma.

At the Street School, Melanie began to see college as a real and attainable goal. Today she is enrolled at Forsyth Tech and plans to attend law school in the future. Along the way, Melanie gained more than a high school diploma. She found purpose and direction. Being part of a supportive community that included staff, classmates, and meaningful volunteer opportunities helped her learn more about herself. “I definitely have way more opportunities with my diploma than without it,” she said. Her message to others is simple: “You can accomplish your dreams if you put your mind and time into it.”

Melanie’s experience is one she will never forget. “I honestly couldn’t give more thanks for the opportunity that was given to me, and I know it will help future students just like it helped me.”



YOSELIN

Young Adult Program

For many young adult learners, returning to school requires courage. For Yoselin, that motivation comes from wanting a future for herself and her two

young sons. A devoted mother, she returned to school to create new opportunities for her family.

Her journey has not been easy. Yoselin faced the difficult reality of leaving a toxic relationship with the father of her children. “It was hard because I was emotionally attached,” she shared, “but I knew it was time to leave for me and my kids.” Despite challenges, she remained focused on building a safer future.

Through it all, Yoselin never lost belief in herself. “I pushed through the whole time,” she said. “There wasn’t a moment when I thought I couldn’t do it.” Encouraged by her mother and supported by teachers like Ms. Tammy and Ms. Denise, she has stayed committed to earning her diploma.

As she nears graduation, Yoselin plans to continue her education and pursue a career as a translator. “Now I want to keep going and have a better future for me and my boys,” she said. “I had to accept that dropping out was a mistake, but I chose to do something about it,” she reflected. Her advice: “Follow your dreams and do what makes you happy. Never let your dreams go, no matter what you are going through.”

Career Prep Club

The Career Prep Club was created several years ago by caring volunteers from Reynolds American. These individuals saw a need and an opportunity for people from the local business sector to help upcoming graduates navigate life after high school. Every other Wednesday, they give 45 minutes of their time to discuss what it means to prepare to attend college, compile a solid resume, hone interview skills, or brush up on anything else that could help our students with the next steps after their Street School experience.

Ladies Club

The Ladies Club is led by a dedicated group of Street School supporters with one thing in mind . . . caring for and assisting female students with life. In this atmosphere, students know they can share challenges, barriers, and successes in confidence with their fellow female students and adults who can offer advice or just a listening ear. Tears of daily struggles often flow during their

time together but are quickly followed by laughter and newfound kinship among their peers. The Ladies Club has become a much-needed source of support and inspiration for the Street School's female population.

Entrepreneurship Club

One of the unique aspects of the Street School is that in addition to a solid educational foundation, we encourage an entrepreneurial spirit for students who feel they may have a passion for creating and running their own business. In the Entrepreneurship Club, area leaders like Austin Moody share their stories and their dreams of creating their own businesses, and how they found success. In some cases, students take knowledge and experience and turn it into a career. Others might be inspired by the lessons learned during these sessions to step out of their comfort zone and continue their education when they thought they might not or take a leap of faith with a particular career path.

Chess Club

Some Street School clubs represent the opportunity to just try something new. That is a good description of the Chess Club. In this day and age of 24/7 tech devices and sometimes mind-numbing bright screens, the serenity and pace of chess is an experience foreign to many of our students. Once the game is taught by our volunteers, Chess Club sessions sometimes become the most peaceful part of our students' day. Cerebral moves, concentration, new friendships, and respect for fellow competitors, all become part of the chess experience for our students. We extend a special thanks to the volunteers who share their expertise and give of their time to teach a game that can be played for a lifetime and impart lessons that can be used daily.

Teachers Impact Our Students



KATHY GRAVES

High School Program Teacher

"I was drawn to the Street School because, believe it or not, I missed being around teenagers! My three children

had left for college, and I was trying to decide what to do next. I had a chance to interview for an English Teacher position at the Winston-Salem Street School, and it seemed like it was where I was meant to be."

With a background in teaching students with learning differences and a heart for counseling and supporting young people, Kathy Graves found that the Street School perfectly combined her educational training, love of reading, and desire to mentor teens. "Every day that I have the chance to teach, counsel, laugh, and spend time with our students is a gift. It brings me so much joy to be part of their lives, and the kids have blessed me in so many ways."

Her first year came with a steep learning curve. "There were days when I made mistakes, days when I heard heartbreaking stories, and times when I got in my car after school and cried," she shares. "But there were also small steps forward, lively class discussions, victories both academic and personal, and students crossing the stage to receive their hard-earned diplomas."

At the Street School, students often arrive facing significant challenges. "As a staff, we try to meet students where they are. We offer love and grace paired with expectations and goals." In Kathy's classroom, creating a safe and welcoming environment is a priority. Each day begins with students sharing a positive story, a challenge, or one word to describe how they feel. "Every voice is heard," she says, "and over time, that builds trust and community." One student, Zarahya, captured Kathy's impact best: "If you need a therapist, some cookies, or a book, Ms. KG is who you need to see!"

"I admire these students because they choose to show up every day despite the hardships they face. Some work night shifts and come to school the next morning. Others have experienced violence or loss of a loved one, and they still find the strength to keep going. I know so many of their stories now, and I am amazed by the resilience I see."

"If they can show up, then I owe them my very best—compassion, energy, consistency, and grace. Our students deserve nothing less!"



TAMMY DARDEN

Young Adult Program Teacher

When Tammy Darden reflects on her journey to the Street School, she sees a path shaped by unexpected turns and a

steady pull toward education. She once envisioned a career in international relations, studying history, French, and psychology with plans to join the Peace Corps and work in an embassy. Her life, however, took a different direction. After working in logistics, college recruiting, and raising her children, Tammy found her way into schools through volunteering in her children's classrooms and through the PTA.

That early involvement soon grew into something more meaningful. Just before COVID, Tammy and a group of friends began delivering lunches to teachers in Title I schools. Through a friend, she was introduced to the Street School. What began as a simple gesture of appreciation evolved when they recognized that students also needed support. When access to public schools became limited during the pandemic, the group focused their efforts on the Street School, providing meals for students and staff. In the process, Tammy discovered a mission that resonated deeply.

In 2022, she officially joined the team as assistant director of the young adult program and works with learners who have made the decision to earn their high school diplomas. In this role, Tammy serves not only as an educator, but also as a mentor and encourager. "I help our students realize that they can do this," she says. "They can learn, grow, and accomplish big things in their lives!"

Many of the young adults she works with are balancing school alongside jobs, children, and other responsibilities. Tammy supports them in building structure, setting boundaries, and staying committed to their goals. Just as importantly, she helps them recognize their own potential. The small, relationship-centered environment makes that possible, allowing staff to walk alongside each student and connect them with resources and opportunities.

For Tammy, the most inspiring part of her work is the determination she sees every day. Each student who returns to school has made a choice to pursue something better and represents perseverance in the face of challenges. "They all have something pulling them away from graduating, but they know this matters. We are fortunate to have so many people and organizations who support our mission, from tutors who generously give their time to donors whose contributions keep our doors open. The Winston-Salem Street School is all about second chances, and our community makes that possible."

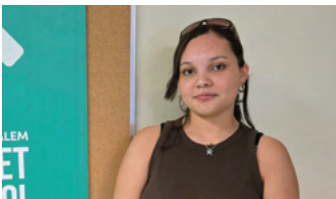
Life After the Winston-Salem Street School

When students enroll in the Street School, they are often caught up in what went wrong at their previous school or what led them to make such a significant change, leaving old friends and ways behind. Once the initial trauma of changing schools settles, new relationships are formed and students begin to enjoy the “alternative” approach of the Street School. They begin to experience success and can finally start to look at life through a different lens. While they may have once approached school as something to endure, they can now begin to dream of a future after graduation.

One of the most important goals of the Street School is to make sure every graduate leaves with a plan. Whether they choose to continue their education, head straight into the workforce, or serve our country in the military, students who complete our high school or young adult program have a blueprint for success.

Graduates of our program remain a part of our Street School family. There is no better feeling than getting a call or text from a former student letting us know that they are doing well, asking for a copy of their transcript for college admission, or wanting to be involved with the school that was there for them when they needed it most.

A few examples of those interactions have occurred in the last year:



- A young lady who graduated two years ago and attended UNC Greensboro dropped by to let us know she was transferring to Salem College to be closer to her family while she continued to study for a career in the medical field.

- A representative at an area business shared that his nephew, a 2010 graduate of the Street School, is now married, has a great career, and lives with his family in Tennessee.



- A former student, who has served as a Street School volunteer in several different capacities, delivered much-needed supplies for the school just when we needed them most.



- A graduate from 2023 messaged us via social media to let us know he is doing great, enjoying a supportive relationship, and working as a military police officer in the Marine Corps.



- Another graduate, who operates his own electrical contracting company and has a beautiful family, has served this year as the vice chair of our Street School Board of Directors and will become chair next year.

These are just a few examples of Street School success stories and lives that were forever changed because of our program. None of these successes happen without your support. Whether you give financially, provide in-kind donations, or give of your time as a volunteer, you are making a difference!

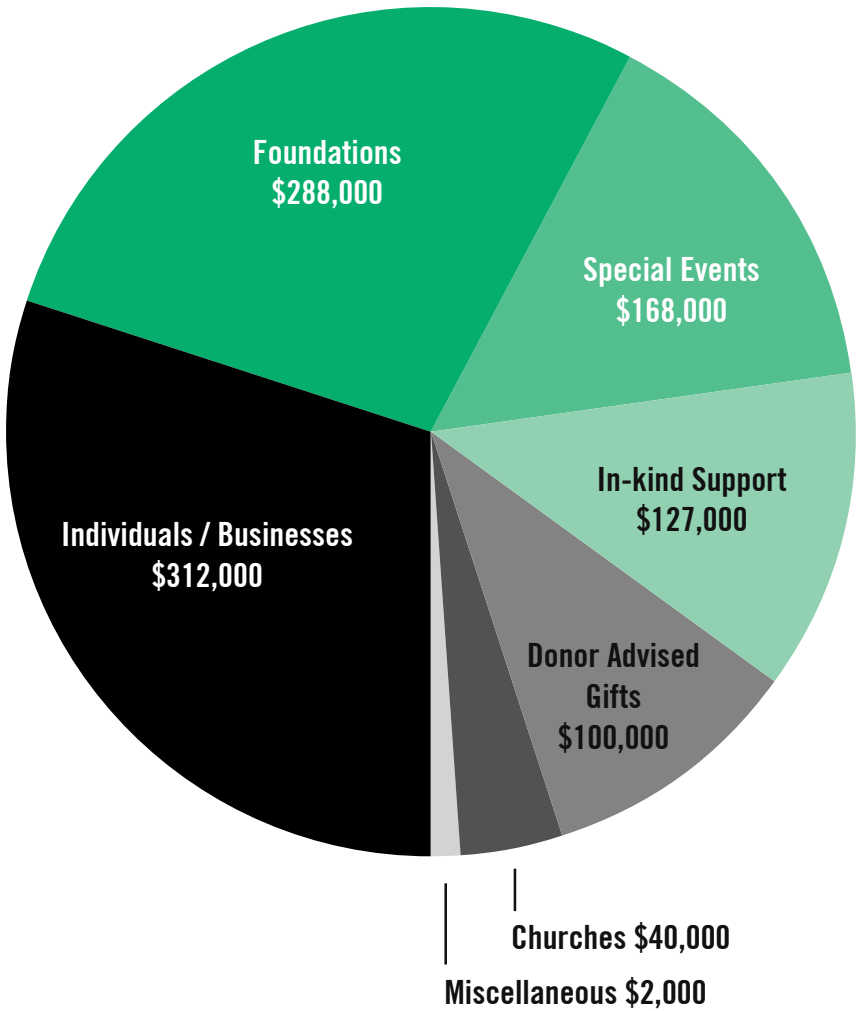
