Utilities Association in developing an important tool for dealing with stray voltage challenges. Also joining in the effort and research were the Minnesota Department of Labor and Industry and Department of Agriculture. As a result, the Minnesota Stray Voltage Guide is available for livestock organizations across the state and is being used to address any concerns that may arise.

The presence of stray voltage is a normal result of electricity traveling through utility distribution systems, which must be grounded to earth to ensure safe and reliable operation. However, if problems occur, the level of voltage present on a farm can reach levels that could impact livestock. Dairy farmers are our member-owners. The Guide provides another tool to ensure any challenges they may be experiencing in this area are being addressed.

Other states have adopted standard practices to address stray voltage concern, and there has been a lot of research done. This research was used in developing this guide, and has served as the foundation for the development of standards in other states. The entire guidebook can be downloaded at https://www.minnesotastrayvoltageguide.com. There is no cost to download the guidebook. As always we encourage anyone with questions to contact us.

# Off-Peak Programs

## Q: I keep hearing about "off-peak." What does that mean?

Great question! Think about what happens when you flip on a light switch or adjust your thermostat, you probably don't consider how many of your neighbors are doing the same thing at that very moment. When lots of people are using power at once, called peak times, it puts extra strain on the grid and drives up costs for everyone. Off-peak programs help by shifting certain electric use away from those busy times. In return, members save money, and the cooperative can keep electricity more reliable and affordable for all.

## Q: What kinds of things can go on off-peak?

Quite a few! Many members choose to put their electric heating systems like boilers, furnaces, or heat pumps on off-peak. Water heaters are another popular choice. If you drive an electric vehicle, charging it on off-peak is a great way to stretch your dollar, too.

## Q: Will I have to change how I use electricity if I join off-peak?

Nope! That's the beauty of it, off-peak works in the background. Your water heater, heating system, or charger is managed automatically, so you can go about your day as usual, all while saving on your heating and charging bills.

Q: Why does this matter to the cooperative?

When demand for power spikes, electricity costs more. By working together through off-peak, we can avoid those extra costs, keep rates stable for everyone, and keep our system reliable. Our wholesale power provider also benefits by being able to reserve resources for when they're needed most, instead of running extra generation just to cover short bursts of demand.

In the end, it's a true win-win-win: you save money, your cooperative keeps rates affordable, and our power provider can better manage resources for a stronger, more reliable grid.

#### Q: How do I get started?

That's the easy part, just call our Member Services team! They'll walk you through the options and help you find the off-peak program that's the best fit for you.

## **COLD WEATHER RULE**

In accordance with Minnesota's Cold Weather Rule (216B.096), electric service cannot be disconnected for nonpayment between Oct. 1 and April 30 if electricity is the primary heat source and ALL of the following statements apply:

- Your household income is at or below 50% of the state median household income. Income may be verified on forms provided by Wild Rice Electric Cooperative or by the local energy assistance provider.
- You enter into and make reasonably timely payments under a payment agreement that considers the financial resources of the household.
- You receive referrals to energy assistance, weatherization, conservation or other programs likely to reduce your energy bills from Wild Rice Electric Cooperative.

## Minnesota's Cold Weather Rule does not completely stop winter disconnects.

Before disconnecting electric service to residential members between Oct. 1 and April 30, Wild Rice Electric Cooperative must provide:

- A 30-day notice of disconnection;
- A statement of members' rights and responsibilities;
- A list of local energy assistance providers;
- Forms on which to request Cold Weather Rule protection; and
- A statement explaining available payment plans and other options to continue service.

### ENERGY ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

The Energy Assistance Program (EAP) is a federally funded program through the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, which helps low-income renters and homeowners pay for home heating costs and furnace repairs. Household income must be at or below the state median income (\$68,845 for a family of four) to qualify for benefits. Applications must be received or postmarked by May 31, 2026.
