We, as the St. John family, have experienced too much loss recently. And maybe well-meaning comforters have offered you words that sound kind but are actually a terribly common lie. The world says, "Death is part of life." But you know better! And we know that so much better is coming in the resurrection!

If your heart is aching and the tears keep coming like waves, you know that nothing in this world is enough to make you think that this loss is "normal." It's not normal. We were not created to accept death. It is not a part of life. It is only part of this fallen world. And like this fallen world, death itself will pass away.

In the meantime, we need someone to wipe away our tears.

In Revelation, the Lord promises that God will wipe away your tears! That's not empty comfort. That's not wishful thinking that someday, somewhere we'll vaguely feel better. When you hear that "God" will wipe away your

tears, picture Jesus holding you while you fall into another pit of grief. When you ache with the loss of your loved one, he aches too. Jesus wept with Mary and Martha at Lazarus' tomb. He has gut-level compassion for your pain, and he is the only one strong enough to carry it all. He wipes away your tears.

He wipes away your tears when church members reach out. He wipes away your tears with Word and Sacrament, bringing you forgiveness and strengthening your faith. And He will completely wipe away your tears in the New Creation, when we live, bodily, in a world without pain, death or loss. When life gets back to normal, the way it was supposed to be in Eden.

See, normal life is coming back. Jesus died, rose and ascended to prepare a place for you. And you and I will join him there, whether He comes for us or we go to him first. Those dear ones who have gone on ahead this year know that death is not a normal part of life. They know that eternal life is normal. Living without the weight of age, infirmity, guilt or shame is normal. Joining the fellowship of the saints in the presence of God is normal.

Here we are, left behind for the moment. The falling leaves are reminding us that we will experience seasons of loss in this sinful world, but we refuse to get used to it. Let us be unashamed to feel the sorrow, anger and confusion that comes with loss. It will not be this way forever. And God himself will wipe every tear from our eyes.



Activities at St. John Lutheran Church

Acolyte - Altar candle duty for boys and girls at worship services. Adult Bible Class - Sunday mornings at 10:30am after our time of fellowship. Adult Choir - Join your voice with others on special festivals. Altar Guild - Prepare vestments, candles, banners, etc. for worship. Audio-Visual - Operate the slides and video production during worship service. **Book Club** - Discuss books about once a month in member homes or at church. **Bulletin Help** - Print worship bulletins a few times per year as needed. Car Show - Annual fundraiser on the church grounds that needs many helpers. Christmas Program - Help or take a part in the Sunday School program. Church Council - Serve on a church board, or as church president, etc. Communications - Publish events on the Website, newsletter, and Facebook. **Confirmation Class** - Teens meet with Pastor for Christian instruction. **Door Keeper** - Open the door and welcome people arriving at church. **Driver** - Provide transportation for those who cannot drive to church. Elders - Men who assist the Pastor with the spiritual life of the congregation. **Evangelism** - Carry out evangelism programs in the church and community. Fellowship - Serve refreshments after worship, and assist with special events. Garage Sale - Annual fundraiser at St. John that needs many helpers. **Gardener** - Keep the flower beds in neat and weed-free condition. **Greeter** - Welcome and offer Sunday bulletin and visitor packet to worshippers. **LWML** - Women's Auxiliary of the LCMS supports LCMS missions. Men's Breakfast - Men of St. John have breakfast about twice a month. **Missions** - Direct monetary resources for LCMS missionaries and missions. Morning Prayer - Almost every weekday at 7:30am in the sanctuary. **Nursery** - Volunteers assist parents who need help in the nursery. Prayer Chain - Receive notice of prayer requests and pray for those in need. Quilters - Construct quilts almost weekly for charities and individuals. **Readers** - Read assigned Scripture passages at the lectern during services. **Shut-In Visitation** - Spend time with members who cannot attend church. Sunday School - Classes for kids at 10:30am after worship and refreshments. **Teach** - Help children learn about their Savior, Preschool through High School. 


Fall 2025

Our next book by Rev. Dr. Alvin Schmidt (a former Ft. Wayne professor) is entitled How Christianity Changed the World (ISBN 978-0310264491). The description reads:

Western civilization is becoming increasingly pluralistic, secularized, and biblically illiterate. Many people today have little sense of how their lives have benefited from Christianity's influence, often viewing the church with hostility or resentment. How Christianity Changed the World is a topically arranged Christian history for Christians and non-Christians. Grounded in solid research and written in a popular style, this book is both a helpful apologetic tool in talking with unbelievers and a source of evidence for why Christianity deserves credit for many of the humane, social, scientific, and cultural advances in the Western world in the last two thousand years. Photographs, timelines, and charts enhance each chapter. This edition features questions for reflection and discussion for each chapter.

Topics include: Sanctification of Human Life, Women Receive Freedom and Dignity, Hospitals and Health Care, labor and Economic Freedom Dignified, Science: Its Christian Connections, Liberty and Justice for All, Slavery Abolished, and more.



Two copies have been ordered for the church. Used copies are available on Amazon for about \$13.50. There is an Audible version available for \$7 and a Kindle version for \$13.50.

This is a longer book than we typically tackle – almost 450 pages. Due to the length and Pastor Dan's sabbatical, we will meet in 5 months on January 13th to discuss the book.

We were thrilled to welcome Pastor Dan Kletke, of St. John Lutheran Church in Canon City, CO, to Cambodia in September. St. John has been a long time supporter of our family as we serve in Southeast Asia, and Pastor Kletke had long wanted to visit. The connection goes even further back, as Pastor Kletke and J.P. went to seminary together! So this trip, as a part of Pastor Kletke's sabbatical, was truly decades in making! Aside from eating strange foods, Pastor Dan engaged with J.P.'s day-to-day ministry, including joining his regular Book of Concord class. But the highlight was traveling to Tbong Khmum to team-teach the Small Catechism in a local church. As always, we traveled with Mr. Khorn Sopha, the Director of the local office of Lutheran Heritage

Foundation, who provides each student with a copy of the Small Catechism. Thong Khmum is the last of five planned locations for Small Catechism teaching, and this was the first of three planned seminars in that location. Each morning started with singing before a full day of teaching on the Ten Commandments. Pastor Kletke is a gifted teacher, and the students (and myself!) benefitted so much from his involvement. Many students traveled quite far to participate, even though their mode of transportation was not ideal. What amazing commitment from these students to study God's Word! Thanks for coming from farthest away, Pastor Kletke!

After adventures in Cambodia, J.P. and Pastor Kletke, along with three representatives from the Cambodia Lutheran Church (CLC), traveled to Bohol, Philippines to attend the International Lutheran Council's (ILC) World Conference. The ILC is a worldwide association of confessional Lutherans. This conference gathered member church representatives from every corner of the globe—some 55 countries were represented (see the whole list)!—for learning, networking, and fellowship as a global Lutheran community. For someone like Pastor Bun Sopheap, the head of the CLC, there are rarely opportunities to gather with other Lutherans in one's own country, let alone with Lutherans from across the world. This was a precious time for Pastor Sopheap to realize that the CLC is a part of a much larger whole. This unity with a larger global community was the theme of the event. In addition to Bible studies and topical presentations, each day included

orders of worship, group meals, and even fun <u>cultural outings</u>. For J.P., this was a great chance to spend time with the CLC colleagues who joined, but also to make new connections with leaders from other Lutheran bodies across the world.
