7. Jonah obeyed before his heart seemed fully changed. Have you ever had to take the right next step before you felt ready or willing?

8. Nineveh's repentance included turning from "evil ways and violence." What is the difference between feeling sorry and actually turning?

9. Who are the kinds of people or groups we find it hardest to imagine God showing mercy to? Why?

10. Where do you most need to respond this week: receiving God's mercy in the depths, obeying a call you have resisted, or extending mercy wider than you naturally want to?

Read Jonah 2 & 3.

1. When people go through a hard season, what are some ways they usually try to make sense of it?

2. Jonah saw the sea as death and chaos, but the fish became rescue. Why do you think God's mercy sometimes looks uncomfortable or unwanted at first?

3. Jonah's prayer comes from "the depths." What are some places people find themselves today that feel like the depths?

4. Jonah was in trouble because of his own running, but God still met him there. What does that teach us about mercy?
