## Cambridge at Springbank: Evolving for Excellence

At Springbank, academic excellence is at the heart of what we do. That's why we continue to offer the internationally respected Cambridge International Curriculum (CIE), a programme known for its strong academic rigour, global recognition, and clear progression pathways.

Compared to New Zealand's national qualification system (NCEA), Cambridge offers greater consistency and depth, preparing students well for both local and international university study. It challenges learners to think critically, master content, and perform confidently under pressure.

## **Principal Welcome continues ...**

But even the best systems benefit from reflection and refinement. After careful consultation with our staff and other Cambridge schools across New Zealand, we are excited to announce several enhancements to how we deliver the Cambridge programme, starting in 2026.

#### What's Changing in 2026?

We are making a few key adjustments to our core subjects of English, Mathematics, and Science to strengthen learning. The structure of the Options subjects remain unchanged.

#### Year 9

Students will begin the first year of their IGCSE studies in English, Core Mathematics, and Core Science, bringing forward content previously taught in Year 10. We will also discontinue the Year 9 Cambridge Checkpoint exams, freeing up valuable time for deeper, more relevant learning.

#### Year 10

Students will sit external IGCSE exams in:

- English
- Mathematics (Core)
- Combined Science (Core)

They will also choose three option subjects and complete NZQA Literacy and Numeracy assessments, ensuring they meet these national requirements early.

#### <u>Year 11</u>

Students will:

- Progress to IGCSE Extended Mathematics
- Study Coordinated Science (Extended) earning a double award
- Begin a two-year AS English Language programme

These changes reflect our commitment to depth and breadth, ensuring students build strong foundations early, gain confidence in assessments, and are well-prepared for success in senior Cambridge qualifications.

We know the Cambridge pathway is rigorous, but it is most rewarding. With these carefully considered changes, we are confident our students will continue to thrive in a learning environment that supports both challenge and success.

## **Year 9 Community Projects**

As part of their Future Studies class, students in Year 9 must complete a Community Project. The project must support or benefit a charity or community group, and students are required to create a plan and implement it to help fundraise money and/or resources for their project. Community projects are an excellent aspect of the Future Studies curriculum, as it encourages students to connect with their community and develop organisational, communication, and problem-solving skills.

This year, Year 9 are supporting the following charities and groups in their area:

#### Pakaraka Hall

Isabella Morris has identified that the Pakaraka Hall needs significant renovations, from the roof leaking to the weather boards rotting. With a goal of \$15,000, Isabella has so far organised a successful fundraiser with a High Tea for the Pakaraka Community. She has also sold burgers at The Packhouse Market one Saturday. The fundraising total to date is \$3,500. Way to go, Isabella!

#### **Kerikeri Retirement Village**

After the success of a previous Year 9 team in building a vegetable garden for the retirement village and the pleasure it has brought the residents, Addie, Mila, and Ramneet are following in their footsteps to build another raised garden, this time as a flower bed. They have already held a bake sale and are well on the way to make this project a reality.

### **Waitangi Mountain Bike Park**

This charity is popular with our students, as it provides an awesome resource for our youth. Jacob, Ruby, Neo, and Sidhesh have already run a sausage sizzle to raise funds to build a jump and have another fundraiser up their sleeve to be successful in their mission to give back. 
## The BEAST

#### **Youth Parliament**

Every three years, the Youth Parliament is held at the Beehive in Wellington. This is a unique opportunity for young New Zealanders to learn first-hand about our democracy, influence government decision-making, and have their voices heard. Students aged 16-18 years are eligible to apply to become a Youth MP, and each sitting New Zealand MP gets to chose a young person to represent them over a six-month period. Springbank School was delighted that we had two students represent Northland at this year's event.

Over three packed days in Wellington, I got to step into the shoes of a real MP, debating in the actual House of Representatives, working in select committees to improve the lives of rangatahi across New Zealand, and working alongside other passionate young leaders from every part of the country.

One of the biggest highlights for me was speaking in the debating chamber about issues facing youth in Northland. I also got to listen to all the other leaders' speeches, with a very wide range of speech topics. With some amazing and some questionable, it showed how passionate everyone was on the issues that affect us all.

I also had the chance to meet a bunch of current MPs and Ministers, such as the Hon James Meager, the Minister for Youth, Rt Hon Christopher Luxon, The Prime Minister, as well as working with the Hon Mark Mitchell and his office. This experience gave me a better understanding of how decisions are made, what goes on behind the scenes, and what it actually takes to create change.

Youth Parliament was an unreal experience that opened my eyes to a vital part of our country, introduced me to leaders from across New Zealand, and put me into a position to advocate for change. If you can ever apply, apply - it is worth it.

Recently, our teina enthusiastically created a lovely arch and our tuakana walked through while we sung a whakatauki. After the welcoming, our tuakana had the chance to introduce themselves using their whakapapa.

To round out our ceremony we had a hui about what a tuakana might do and how we identify them. The feedback we get from tamariki and whanau alike tells us the children love and value this role.

Jenna and I (Mrs Parker) look forward to supporting our Term 3 tuakana in their newfound roles and to help them develop their leadership skills.









## **Preschool Update**

Every Thursday we take eight of our eldest children to Little Dippers. This is an exciting and much anticipated activity here at Preschool and the children LOVE every minute of it. Just look at those smiles!




