

Northeast Iowa Food Bank Calls on Community to Take Action During Hunger Action Month

WATERLOO, Iowa (August 29, 2025) - Each September, the Northeast Iowa Food Bank joins Feeding America and food banks across the country in recognizing Hunger Action Month, an annual campaign that mobilizes people everywhere to stand together in the fight against hunger.

Throughout the month, the Food Bank invites northeast lowans to get involved in ways both big and small. From volunteering and donating to advocating for stronger food policies or simply spreading the word, every action helps make a difference in the lives of people facing hunger.

"Hunger Action Month gives us a chance every year to shine a spotlight on the issue of hunger and remind our community that it is not just a statistic. It is the reality for thousands of people," said Barbara Prather, Executive Director of the Northeast Iowa Food Bank. "The need has grown significantly in the past year, with more than 5,000 additional people struggling with food insecurity compared to last year. This month is a reminder that each of us can do something, and together we can make sure fewer people face an empty plate."

Today, more than 45,000 people in the region, including 14,380 children, are food insecure. That means 1 in 8 adults and 1 in 6 children lack consistent access to nutritious food. These rising numbers underscore the urgent need for a strong community response.
