REGULAR MEETING
STANLEY TOWN COUNCIL
NOVEMBER 12TH, 2025, 7:30 pm.

Mayor Michael Knight called the meeting to order at 7:30 pm with the following Council Members attending: Vice- Mayor Bruce Stoneberger, Councilwoman Robyn Good, Councilman Joseph Mauck, Councilman Jeremiah Knight and Councilman Douglas Purdham Others present at this meeting: Town Manager Terry Pettit, Police Chief Ryan Dean, Parks Director Teri Beers, Foreman Ryan Gaunt, and Randy Arrington with Page Valley News. Absent from the meeting was Treasurer Leon Stout.

Mayor Knight gave the Invocation and Vice- Mayor Stoneberger led the Pledge of Allegiance.

AGENDA:

Mayor Knight asked if there were any additions or changes to the agenda as presented. A motion was made by Councilman Purdham to approve the agenda, seconded by Councilman Mauck. Passed Unanimously.

PRESENTATIONS:

Gina Hilliard with the Chamber of Commerce gave an update for the upcoming year stating the 2026 website is completed, they have 385 members, and looking to fill empty chair seats. The Chamber's 100th Anniversary celebrations will be at the Mimslyn Inn either May or June.

PASSED MINUTES APPROVAL:

Mayor Knight asked the council if they had any additions or changes to the past regular meeting minutes. With there being none, a motion was made by Councilman Mauck, seconded by Councilman Purdham. Passed Unanimously.

TREASURER REPORT:

Mayor Knight started off the Treasurers Report by asking if there was a warranty on the new utility truck for the Joe Bowman bill for the engine light? Clerk Atkins stated, it was allocated to the wrong account, that bill was for the Police Truck. Vice-Mayor Stoneberger questioned why the Public Works truck was tinted? Foreman Gaunt stated they are all tinted and it helps protect the inside of the truck. With no other questions a motion was made by Councilman Knight to approve the Treasurer's Report, Pay Warrant, in the amount of \$234,583.01 and the Loan Portfolio, seconded by Councilman Purdham. Passed Unanimously.

MANAGER'S REPORT:

The estimate cost for Chapel Village Road sewer project is \$135,000.00. Once we get approval we will begin the project.

DR'S Quickstop is in the process of switching to Marathon Gas, so we are working on getting cards for all the town vehicles.

The Grant that Sara Levinson is helping us with for the pool will cost roughly \$5,000 in consulting fees once it's all done. The application period won't be done till August of 2026 and the funding to start the project won't be until April of 2027.

The new president of the Little League plans on attending the next meeting to go over what their plans are for this coming year and what they need from the Town.

A motion was made by Councilman Mauck give each full-time employee a \$500 Christmas bonus and all part-time employees \$250, seconded by Councilman Purdham. Passed Unanimously.

Due to issues with dogs not on leash and our code book we will investigate changing the code to state a leash must be on at any time on any public property.

The Christmas Parade theme this year is "Classic Country Christmas".

The Christmas banquet will be held on December 17th and 6 PM.

OLD BUSINESS:

We are waiting on quotes for the office windows.

Tony Weakly, who is putting in the sign in at Ed Good Park, is waiting for Burner Electric to install the electric before he can dig the footers.

Campbells Plumbing has repaired the sink in men's bathroom at the town office. The cost to repair the water fountain in the office is around \$2,000. Council advised us not to replace it.

We are still looking for a company to set off fireworks for Homecoming.

POLICE REPORT:

Chief Dean gave the police report stating there were 363 calls for service, 4 citations, and 297 self-initiated calls for the month of September.

The average speed out of 13,000 vehicles on E. Main Street is 26.2 miles per hour.

The town will be adopting two angel trees from Stanley Elementary.

PARK AND RECREATION REPORT:

The kids at Stanley Elementary will be decorating ornaments for our tree that will be displayed at Ed Good Park.

J Rex Burner gave a quote for the heat for the downstairs at Hawksbill Hall for \$8,000. Council requested more quotes to compare.

The next event will be Christmas in Stanley and Story time with Santa.

The cottage renters are paid and up to date.

Foreman Gaunt will be getting quotes for the fence at the ballpark.

To help clean up the bleachers at Ed Good Park council suggested placing gravel and field dirt to make a retaining wall.

WATER/SEWER REPORT:

The Office of Water Programs will be coming out to give the final approval. Once approved we will turn the well on in January.

The contractor to replace the roof at the sewer plant is waiting on material.

A-Team Construction has been awarded the sewer extension project on Honeyville Road for Chase Louderback (at Chase Louderback's cost) and will begin construction in a few weeks.

Mayor Knight asked to adjourn the meeting at 9:06 PM, a motion was made by Councilman Mauck seconded by Councilman Purdham.
