Patricia Lee Daigle Appointed Chief Curator of Memphis Brooks Museum of Art



MEMPHIS, Tenn. (October 29, 2025) – The <u>Memphis Brooks Museum of Art</u> today announced the appointment of <u>Dr. Patricia Lee Daigle</u> as its Chief Curator. Daigle will lead curatorial vision for the institution at a pivotal time in its 109-year history as it will open a new, state-of-the-art cultural campus overlooking the Mississippi River in 2026, marking its next chapter as the Memphis Art Museum.

Since joining the museum team in 2021 as Associate Curator of Modern and Contemporary Art, Daigle has organized several acclaimed exhibitions including *Harmonia Rosales: Master Narrative*, *In the Moment: Art from the 1950s to Now*, and *Tommy Kha: Eye is Another*. She also served as site curator for major traveling exhibitions such as *Christian Siriano: People Are People* (organized by SCAD FASH Museum of Fashion + Film) and *Black American Portraits* (organized by the Los Angeles County Museum of Art), among others. Most recently, Daigle curated *Navigating Knowledge*, an exhibition of modern and contemporary works that explores vessels and navigation as metaphors for the containment and transmission of knowledge.

Daigle succeeds Dr. Rosamund Garrett, who left the museum after seven years of dedicated service to become Head of Collections at the Chester Beatty in Dublin, Ireland. Under Garrett's

leadership, the curatorial department secured major acquisitions, several of which will be on view to the public for the first time in the new Memphis Art Museum in 2026, and organized important new exhibitions, several of which won awards and traveled nationally.

Building on that strong foundation, Daigle will guide the museum's curatorial vision as it enters this next phase of growth and transformation.

"Patricia brings thoughtful curatorial insight and an expansive vision for what a museum can be," said Zoe Kahr, Executive Director of the Memphis Brooks Museum of Art. "Since joining the team, she has shaped exhibitions that connect global perspectives with the heart of Memphis. Her depth of knowledge and collaborative spirit make her an incredible partner as we move downtown and expand how we connect art and people."

Daigle previously served as Director of The Martha and Robert Fogelman Galleries of Contemporary Art at The University of Memphis, and has held curatorial positions at the Dixon Gallery & Gardens and at the Santa Barbara Museum of Art. She has written for numerous exhibition catalogues and other publications, and is a member of the Association of Art Museum Curators and its Professional Alliance for Curators of Color. She holds a Ph.D. in the History of Art and Architecture from the University of California, Santa Barbara.

"It's an incredible honor to step into this role at such a defining moment for the museum," said Daigle. "Having been part of the team for several years, I've seen firsthand how our work connects people through art and how deeply this museum matters to Memphis. My background in art history and teaching has always centered on helping others see the world in new ways, and I'm excited to carry that forward as we prepare to open downtown. This move isn't just about a new building—it's about expanding our reach, deepening our relationships, and continuing to serve as a place where art and community meet."
