At the Navajo County Family Advocacy Center, we serve children and their families who have been physically or sexually assaulted or abused, kidnapped, trafficked, or were victims of drug endangerment, domestic violence, and witnesses of violent crimes such as homicide.

We provide forensic interviews, counseling, community resources, court advocacy, sexual assault examinations, strangulation examinations, wellness examinations, clothing, blankets, toys, school supplies, and more- all for free to those we serve.

Since 2011, we have helped more than 2,300 children begin their healing journey. We remain dedicated to prevention and education surrounding the work that we do, and will continue to serve survivors throughout Navajo and Apache Counties, as well as surrounding reservations and jurisdictions.



Vision and Mission

Vision

- We at the Navajo County Family Advocacy Center envision a world where abuse no longer is prevalent in our society. We continue to strive for healing and justice for current victims and survivors of violent crimes, and work to prevent further abuse from occurring and affecting lives.

Mission

- One aspect of the mission of the Navajo County Family Advocacy Center is to empower sexually or physically abused, neglected individuals, children, and non-offending family members. Our main goal is to aid them in healing from trauma and help them receive justice.
- Another aspect of the NCFAC mission is to increase awareness and education surrounding the prevalence of Child Abuse, Child Physical Assault, Child Sexual Abuse, Child Sexual Assault, Domestic Violence, Drug Endangerment, Teen Dating Violence, Kidnapping, Trafficking, Strangulation, CSAM, Neglect, and Solicitation of a Minor. By making sure our community is informed and aware of what is happening, we are better able to stop abuse and prevent revictimization. Similarly, by providing education surrounding warning signs of abuse, we are better able to stop abuse before it starts.

2025 Financial Summary

In 2025, we had an increase of victims, as well as an increase in public support. This is particularly notable because we did not hold our Put It On The Tee for the FAC Golf Tournament (which will be returning in 2026), but we were still able to provide support and resources for ALL victims who needed us in 2025. Thank you so much to both our community partners and our private donors for helping fill this gap and allowing healing and hope to permeate even the darkest places.



Growth Expenditures

While cost of living increases, so do cost of services. At the Navajo County Family Advocacy Center, 100% of our services to victims are provided free of cost. From receiving a Forensic Interview, to having an Advocate fill out Orders of Protection and go with you to court, to Counseling Sessions and clothing/ blankets/ food, payment is never something that should hold a child or family back from receiving healing and resources.

Throughout the last few years, we have noticed an upward trend in our spending. Not because we are *spending* more- but because the services we provide are *costing* more. Creativity and innovation have been key to combating this inevitable growth, allowing us to continue to provide needed services in our rural communities.



2025 Wrapped

2025 ushered in many changes, adjustments, and much-needed resets. This was the year we set aside to ensure our program was fortified and prepared for the inevitable growth in years to come. We are thankful for the time and those who worked with us and supported us through this year.

One of our most notable achievements was our installment of the Therapy Garden. This has been an absolute blessing for the children we see, who are often at the FAC for more than three hours at a time. Having a safe space where they can go outside, swing on the swing set, be in nature, pick vegetables or flowers has been incredible for their nervous system and for assisting in teaching emotional regulation.

Another huge program change this year was our partnering with Summit Regional Medical Center to take on adult Sexual Assault and Strangulation exams, as well as our pediatric program. The program who was previously providing these examinations to adult victims of assault was closing their doors, and we are thankful to have been able to have the capacity to take this program on. With the addition of this adult SANE program, we have seen a 267% increase in Sexual Assault Nurse Examinations provided to victims of physical or sexual assault and strangulation.

As you all know, we did not host our annual 'Put It On The Tee for the FAC' Golf Tournament this year. This was so we could change the date to Spring 2026. We as an organization felt this would be a better fit for our tournament, and allow some freedom from a very busy golf fall. We did, however, bring in a new tournament with our 'Take Back The Night Golf' Tournament, held at Snowflake Golf Course. A huge thank you to our event sponsors- Arizona Child and Family Advocacy Center Network, Summit Regional Medical Center, KGJ Roofing, Horne Auto Center, ACE Hardware of the White Mountains, Cattlemen's Steakhouse, Trevor Tinkle, and Nicole Van Den Bosch. This was an incredibly fun event that we cannot wait to host again in 2026! We are proud to support Domestic Violence Survivors through this event.

Our Adopt a Family Program in 2025 was our biggest yet, providing toys, clothing, food, and other essential items to 263 people. We strive to be a multifaceted Center, providing Forensic Interviews, Counseling, Sexual Assault Exams, Community Resources, Court Advocacy, community and school trainings, and more. All of these services are provided at no cost for the victim and their family.

These numbers represent a year of growth for both the center and community. More prevention efforts means more victims coming forward to receive healing which means more counseling and community resources needed. We are proud to be a hub of growth and change for our community, this year and every year moving forward.





Victim and Offense Type Summary

Survivor Experience



Late one evening, Family Advocacy Center staff received an urgent call requesting two emergency forensic interviews. Earlier that afternoon, two young children had experienced sexual assault, and time mattered. Bringing them to the Center that night ensured their safety, preserved critical details, and allowed them to receive immediate medical and emotional care.

What began as a disclosure of a single incident unfolded into something far more devastating. In the safety of the Family Advocacy Center, where the children felt believed and protected, they found the courage to share that the abuse had been occurring for years. As trust grew, so did the disclosures.

These courageous disclosures shaped every next step—lengthening interviews, guiding medical exams with greater understanding, and allowing professionals to fully grasp the scope of harm these children had endured. Because of this clarity, evidence was compiled accurately and the offender was charged in a way that truly reflected the severity of the crimes.

Most importantly, the children were connected to counseling and support services tailored to their real experiences, not just what was first reported. This case is one of many that demonstrates the power of the advocacy center model: when children are met with compassion, expertise, and safety, healing can begin—and justice becomes possible.
