## Many Paths, Many Peoples

This popular loop trail leads up Temescal Canyon's creek-side ramp to a spring-fed waterfall.

The variety in the terrain helped indigenous families develop happy trading relationships, historically. For example, Lion's Head became a trading post where Temescal's beach dwellers could swap shell beads for acorns collected in the Topanga settlements.

When everyone assimilated, it later became harder for smaller bands to gain official recognition as nations, hampering their right to organize and attain financial benefits and freedoms. The sheer number of California's indigenous clans resulted in a struggle for equal recognition.
