


Festival Opening Party

Highlights include a reception for the photography exhibition SIGNS, a dance installation by New York City based choreographer jill sigman/thinkdance and DJ Joro Boro, and a dance party with the klezmer/punk band Golem.

features accordion, tambourine, violin,
trombone, upright bass, drums, and powerful
vocals (in Yiddish, Russian, or French).
Golem, "where Eastern Europe meets the







STACKS

Jonah Bokaer and poet Anne Carson

STACKS, a multi-disciplinary collaboration between choreographer Jonah Bokaer, poet Anne Carson, and sculptor Peter Cole, explores the nature of collapse as manifested in human anatomy, grammar, and objects while challenging traditional expectations of what a dance, poem, or sculpture can be. This is a rare opportunity to witness an original work, developed partly in residence at Mt. Tremper Arts, by a prolific media artist and choreographer and an award-winning, genre-crossing writer who has been called a philosopher of heartbreak." (The Nation).





Rindfleisch



Eight Years and Not Without You explore identity, connection, the relationship between the individual and the environment, and the dynamics of watching and being watched. Called "disturbing... sexy and fun" by the New York Times, Elke Rindfleisch uses a variety of intriguing elements including a mirror, digital camera, projections of photographs, and costume changes during the performance. Live music by Chris Woltmann includes vocal music composed on-site that uses audience participation and an intense and driving score for electric guitar and drums.

Fleur-de-lis and Apian Way


Dušan Týnek Dance Theatre

Czech choreographer Dušan Tynek took inspiration from Caravaggio's paintings and the social interaction of bees in creating Flour de-lis and Apian Way. These lyrical and dramatic meditations – on the power of religious imagery in a sacular context and the role of the individual in society – are at once abstract and deeply human, pictorial and kinetic. Since its founding in 2002, the company has toured throughout the United States, Europe and Russia and has held critically-acclaimed and sold-out. New York City seasons at the Kitchen, Joyce SciHo, Dance Theater Workshop, and The Ailey Citigroup Theater.
