Our Mission

<u>College Promise</u> is a national, nonpartisan initiative that builds broad public support for funding postsecondary education for all hardworking students. By leveraging cross-sector partnerships and advocating for policies that remove barriers to higher education, College Promise works to increase college access, persistence, and completion across the country.



Celebrating the Growth of the Promise Movement

As of November 2024, the College Promise team has identified more than 440 Promise programs across all 50 states and Washington, DC Additionally, 38 states have established active statewide programs. Notable recent developments include:

- **Arizona:** On June 18, 2024, Governor Hobbs signed Arizona House Bill 2897, allocating \$20 million for Promise Programs. College Promise continues to collaborate with our convening partners to support implementation.
- **Michigan:** On June 27, 2024, Governor Whitmer signed a budget, including the Michigan Community College Guarantee, which covers in-district tuition and fees for recent high school graduates in Michigan.
- Colorado: Families earning \$90,000 or less annually now qualify for a Colorado tax credit to help cover college expenses. Students at four-year colleges can expect an average of \$2,700 in tax credits per year, technical college students about \$2,000, and two-year college students around \$1,000.
- Hawai'i: The state of Hawaii awarded a record \$5 million in Hawai'i Promise Scholarships to University of Hawai'i Community College students this year.
- Massachusetts: On July 29, 2024, Governor Healey signed a new budget funding MassEducate, allowing Massachusetts residents to attend any of the state's 15 community colleges for free. The program covers all tuition and fees and provides a stipend for books and supplies for some students.







The MyPromise Tool

The MyPromise Tool is a pioneering student-centered resource of Promise Programs available nationwide. The platform connects students, families, counselors, and mentors with Promise programs, offering scholarships for tuition, fees, and other crucial supports beyond federal and state aid. The website provides a wealth of information about statewide and local Promise programs, giving comprehensive resources to all prospective college students.

This past year, the MyPromise Tool expanded to allow Promise program staff to update program information more easily. This new feature provides public users with timely information directly from program managers and enhanced search features, allowing users to find programs specific to their needs and interests, including veterans, adult students, or formerly incarcerated individuals. The College Promise team has also added Children's Savings Accounts to its list of profile details. As programs continue to add features, the MyPromiseTool will be able to grow with them.






Civic Learning

The Civic Learning and Democracy Engagement Coalition (CLDE Coalition) includes education and policy organizations committed to making college students' civic learning for an engaged democracy a priority across higher education and in public policy. The American Association of Colleges and Universities, Campus Compact, College Promise, Complete College America, and State Higher Education Executive Officers led the coalition. The coalition is working in partnership with more than 70 higher education and student success organizations, including several state systems and all seven institutional accreditors.

National Convenings

This year, College Promise organized and participated in several major national convenings and events in Phoenix, AZ; Boston, MA; Louisville, KY; Los Angeles, CA, and Riverside, CA. These convenings successfully brought together policymakers, practitioners, and advocacy organizations to collaborate on strategies for improving affordability, utilizing wraparound supports, and enhancing workforce development opportunities. Local, regional, and national policymakers provided attendees with in-depth insights into the higher education landscape at each convening. We assembled state policymakers, higher education officers, and Promise leaders who were deeply involved in higher education policy and practice, enriching the discussions with their expertise.







June 5-6, 2024 | South Mountain Community College, Phoenix, AZ In partnership with Education Forward Arizona, The Helios Foundation, the Arizona Board of Regents, and the Maricopa Community College Foundation, this convening brought together over 75 regional stakeholders from higher education, government, philanthropy, nonprofit organizations, and business. The two-day convening focused on strengthening the state's talent pipeline and engaging students with Promise programs that offer training and educational support. Notable sessions included discussions on economic opportunity, workforce preparedness, and collective impact strategies.

August 4, 2024 | NCSL Legislative Summit Preconference Meeting: Exploring College Promise Programs, Louisville, KY

College Promise partnered with the National Conference of State Legislatures (NCSL) on their annual pre-conference program. At this one-day summit, legislators representing 13 states learned and engaged with experts and peers about College Promise programs across the country, considered state policy options related to College Promise programs and college affordability, heard from program leaders, and contemplated potential state legislative policy options to strengthen the impact of the programs.

August 13-15, 2024 | One Financial Center, Boston, MA

The Boston Convening brought together 115 participants from across the nation and emphasized the use of wraparound supports to develop multigenerational strategies for enhancing college-going culture among opportunity populations. Our team partnered closely with the Massachusetts Association of Community Colleges (MACC) and the Massachusetts state office to identify champions of their recent MassEducate legislation. Lieutenant Governor Kim Driscoll and Secretary of Veteran Affairs Jon Santiago spoke to the audience during the three-day convening.

This convening also marked significant milestones, including celebrating the 10th anniversary of Tennessee's statewide Promise program, welcoming Massachusetts as the 37th state to adopt a statewide Promise Program, and recognizing the newly appointed College Promise Leadership Council. The event served as a platform to kick off College Promise's 10-year anniversary, setting the stage for the future of the National College Promise movement.

October 8-9, 2024 | Toward a Shared Vision Summit | Riverside Convention Center, CA

College Promise hosted half-day convening at the Toward a Shared Vision Summit at the Riverside Convention Center in partnership with Growing Inland Achievement. This event focused on program design and implementation. Approximately 300 participants learned how holistic support contributes to the narrative and impact on students, institutions, and communities, particularly in serving opportunity populations and delivering community-wide benefits through skilling and labor market outcomes.



Celebrating 10 Years of Tennessee Promise

Earlier this year, College Promise released a <u>new report</u> celebrating the 10th anniversary of Tennessee's pioneering statewide Promise program. Since its inception, the Tennessee Promise has reshaped the state's higher education landscape, and central to this success is the innovative leadership of <u>tnAchieves</u>. As the engine behind the Tennessee Promise, tnAchieves has evolved from a localized initiative to a powerful statewide force, driving college access, success, and workforce readiness.

Initially launched in Knox County, tnAchieves quickly established a blueprint for success. Its early model focused on providing financial support and volunteer mentorship to students, making college more accessible for young Tennesseans. This small-scale, local initiative soon inspired the creation of the <u>Tennessee Promise</u>, a statewide program offering last-dollar scholarships to all eligible students.

Since its inception, Tennessee Promise has provided over 90,000 students with a pathway to higher education. The program covers tuition and fees not covered by other financial aid, ensuring that cost is not a barrier to college access. The success of this initiative is evident in the numbers: college enrollment has significantly increased, Tennessee consistently boasts one of the highest rates of FAFSA completion in the nation, and the community college three-year graduation rate has increased by 4 percentage points since the launch of TN Promise.

Tennessee was the first statewide College Promise program in the nation. Ten years later, there are more than 440 Promise programs across all 50 states and Washington, D.C. 38 states have established active statewide programs, following in Tennessee's footsteps.

Technical Assistance and Career Pathways

Technical Assistance

As the free college movement expands nationally, College Promise offers expertise and direct technical assistance to emerging Promise programs to plan a successful launch by identifying federal, state, and local funds and key wraparound services for students. Over the past year, the College Promise has led successful partnerships with several communities and states, including Lynchburg Beacon of Hope and the University of Hawaii Community College System.

Career Pathways

College Promise Programs are leaders in preparing students for careers through their career resources and services tailored to help meet the needs of their communities. Increasingly, communities and learners need a caring group of professionals to support learners on their journey beyond the provision of professional guidance and labor market information. Students also need a single, free, enduring, research-informed solution that connects students and job seekers to pathways and professional skill instruction that aids in the selection, development, and refinement to help launch economically mobile careers. College Promise, with its partner, Promise Pathways, an organization focused on college-career alignment, is actively working with Promise communities across the country to advance economic opportunity in their regions, utilizing the Career Acceleration Tool (CAT).

The Career Acceleration Tool (CAT) is a software solution that can clarify college and career pathways and align the skills necessary to improve educational and economic outcomes for millions of individuals from all backgrounds. The platform focuses on six components of attaining credentials that lead to increased economic opportunity and social opportunity: (1) career identification; (2) strategic skill development planning; (3) belonging and wellness support; (4) financial wellness support; (5) data literacy instruction; and (6) tools to identify community supports. Our pilot is designed to position learners into the best career possible with the least amount of financial and time investment while crafting a pathway that meets their goals, providing long-term economic opportunity. The program prioritizes the best-fit sequence of course/training and local labor market opportunities.

Highlights of this initiative include:

- Helping learners understand labor market opportunities and identify careers.
- Identifying degrees, certifications, supplemental training, and apprenticeships.
- Training on professional skills like social skills, belonging, data, and financial literacy.
- Giving employers early access to skilled candidates.

College Promise National Leadership Council

The College Promise National Leadership Council is an initiative dedicated to furthering the Promise movement on a national scale. The Council aims to disseminate exemplary practices, address program challenges, and advocate for the expansion and sustainability of the National Promise movement through publications, events, and advocacy.

College Promise-Children's Savings Accounts Integration

Since 2017, College Promise has partnered with the Mott Foundation to leverage its experience, expertise, stakeholders, and resources to significantly change the trajectory for hundreds of thousands of children and families. College Promise aims to expand the impact of Promise programs by incorporating Children's Savings Accounts (CSAs) into their designs to help students earn certificates and degrees. When integrated, these initiatives embed sustainable incentives, scholarships, college-community partnerships, savings, analytics, cross-sector collaboration, and a clear pathway for student success to and through postsecondary education, career, and community. College Promise's overarching goal is cultivating momentum and fostering increased alignment within the Promise and CSA fields.

Since the launch of this work, our organization has published two playbooks, multiple policy briefs, and articles and engaged a Peer Learning Network of over 70 communities and national stakeholders committed to sharing best practices and raising awareness about CP-CSA integration.

College Promise celebrates the Promise Programs nationwide that have worked to integrate savings elements into their designs statewide (California, Maine, and Indiana) and regionally, including Boston, MA; Kansas City, MO; Wabash County, IN; Lansing, Mason County, Muskegon, MI; Providence, RI; El Monte, Oakland, and West Sacramento, CA; .
