So, we have almost reached the end of another year at Central. I think you will again agree we have had a busy time with lots of interesting events.

Cinema at Central afternoons have raised over £987.10, with friends from outside the church joining us and having fun, even those who didn't like dancing!

The 3Fs celebrated their 15th anniversary in July. A very successful morning ended with one of John's masterful, special cakes. We are grateful for all the organisations who help to make the group work. Later that month Monday Fellowship ended their year with a delicious afternoon tea; the cakes didn't help the waistline, but Penny, Rev Kevin's labrador had a lovely time!

In September we had to undergo our first quinquennial survey -5 years after we moved in! A comprehensive document which showed mostly we are looking after our building very well. We are grateful to Stuart who is slowly working his way through the small problems which were discovered. As every homeowner knows, there is always a cost to running a building.

Sadly, Reeds in Partnership moved to larger premises in March leaving the second floor empty. We hope a new tenant will be found soon. Derby City Life links are still using part of the 3rd floor; in September, we presented them with a cheque for £1.772 from our POTS collection to enable their charity for Mental Health

and Vox Feminarum now rent the downstairs space. Their sign MOSAICC leads people to a shop which distributes food to needy families and works with survivors of abuse.

U3A have over 12 different groups using our meeting rooms over the month.

Derby Inclusive Fellowship now meet in the sanctuary twice a month and have unveiled a new banner showing their logo, crocheted by Tracey which now hangs on the church wall.

The new student flats are now occupied and we are glad that our joint security gates give them protection as well as us.

Our brand-new signs are in place which advertise our activities including our Friday Coffee morning where they are welcomed in by our Duty Managers.

We still have new people coming to worship on Sunday mornings who enjoy the wide variety of services we offer and the warm welcome they receive. We are so grateful for all who prepare and lead our services each week. During the year we welcomed Rev Peter Little into membership, transferring from the Birmingham area, and then later in August we welcomed Michael Watkinson into membership. Already his technical skills have been very useful, especially in using our church technology, which is quite beyond me.

Thanks must go to Helen Jones who keeps us connected to the other 4 churches via the South West Derbyshire Area Partnership

Facebook page; Matty and Sam who update our profile on social media and Barrie who keeps our website updated.

We were very sad that Rev Kevin's health deteriorated during the Autumn and he has needed to take some time off. We continue to pray that he will soon recover and be able to join us again soon.

As we come to the end of the year, I want to thank everyone who has helped us during the year. Your efforts, small or big have been valued. We remember also to give thanks for our housebound members and friends who also contribute to our fellowship.

I wish you all a peaceful Christmas and good tidings to all.

### Links with Becket School

Over the last 3 years since Matty began his teaching at Becket School, we have been lucky to begin to build links with the school. It began as a meeting of Rev Judith and Ellen, the minister at The Baptist Church at the top of Green Lane. Then when Judith left, Ellen met Jill and myself in the early days of our move to Stuart House. Sam and Matty had spent time with Ellen when they explored with her how to get her congregation more open to LGBT thinking. Co-incidentally, Ellen was at the time, the chaplain to the school. As their church was out of commission during the week, used by Upbeat Communities, she felt Central was an ideal place to show the children what a church was like. We had our first visit from Becket School when the reception class visited in September 2022. Ellen took the lead and we taught a couple of songs and provided drinks and biscuits.

Meanwhile, Matty joined the staff and tentatively suggested I might like to come into school in the run up to Christmas and teach some Christmas music to the Key Stage 2 children. Their piano was rarely played and it would be good for the children. I have to say, I didn't need much persuading.....and what a delight. The children are lovely, uncomplicated, well behaved and enthusiastic.

3 years later and 3 Christmas visits later, it has become an established part of their school life and our church life that years 4,5 or 6 visit Central in early December.

Meanwhile, when Ellen decided to retire, Matty thought it would be a perfect opportunity to suggest our Terry to replace her. This idea was welcomed with open arms and we are very thrilled that Terry goes in for an hour on Tuesday lunch times running a 'Values club' which is very well received.



We were joined by year 3 children (7/8 year olds), whom I met for the first time. ## **SCAMS**

We need to look out for scams by email, which are increasing. As ever, they will be plausible, and the advice is not to click on any links and certainly not to hand over any money. Email scams will often be unexpected, probably won't address you by name, and may pressurise you with a false sense of urgency, or ask you to provide information. But one tell-tale feature from in the past is not so reliable these days – poor spelling and punctuation used to be an indicator of scam emails but unfortunately Al is helping scammers to get better at these things. You can report scam emails by forwarding them to report@phishing.gov.uk

We also warn about SCAM LETTERS, that are using the traditional method of paper! Yes, postal scams do exist mostly promising fraudulent health cures, fortune telling, non-existent prizes, etc - all trying hard to part you from your money. Often with impressive looking notepaper, so please don't be taken in. These can be reported just like scam emails can. You simply pop them into an envelope, and address it to: FREEPOST NTSST MAIL MARSHALS and post it off (absolutely free - no stamp!) NTSST stands for National Trading Standards Scam Team. And of course, please don't reply to the scammers. Lastly, just a reminder of these helpful numbers: 159 - to contact your bank about possible fraud 0808 223 1133 - for Citizens' Advice

Let others see that with you, Christmas can be kind,


Leave spoonsful of joyfulness for others to find.

## AN EASY AND CLASSIC VEGAN CHRISTMAS TRIFLE

#### Ingredients

- 1 ready-made vegan sponge cake (approx. 180g) or homemade.
- 2 pots vegan raspberry or strawberry jelly (approx. 175g each) or homemade with agar-agar.
- 500g frozen or fresh berries, such as raspberries or a summer fruit mix.
- 500ml ready-made plant-based custard (oat or soya works well), or homemade.
- 250ml vegan whippable cream (e.g., Elmlea Plant Double or a chilled can of full-fat coconut cream).
- Optional: 2-3 tbsp sherry or fruit juice to soak the sponge, caster sugar, vanilla extract, and decorations like flaked almonds or glacé cherries.

#### Method

- Prepare the Jelly and Sponge If making jelly from scratch, prepare it first and pour into your trifle dish to set in the fridge (around 2 hours). If using ready-made, cut the sponge cake into cubes or slices and use them to line the base of a large glass trifle bowl. Dot half of the berries over the sponge and spoon over half the ready-made jelly (or place the set jelly layer on top if homemade).
- Add Fruit and Custard Repeat the layers with the remaining berries and jelly, allowing the jelly to seep into the gaps in the sponge. Pour the cooled or readymade custard over the fruit and jelly layer, gently smoothing the surface.
- Whip the Cream Pour the vegan cream into a bowl with a little sugar and vanilla extract if desired. Whisk until it holds soft peaks.
- Assemble, chill and pile the whipped cream on top of the custard layer. Transfer the trifle to the fridge for at least 1-2 hours (preferably overnight) to set and allow the flavors to blend.
- Decorate and Serve. Before serving, decorate the top with flaked almonds, fresh berries, or vegan sprinkles.
- This festive dessert is best served cold, ensuring each serving includes a bit of every delicious layer.
