It is such a privilege to be standing here, entrusted to speak on behalf of Trainee Firefighter School 95. We are sure we are not alone in feeling a sense of disbelief to be here, at the precipice between the culmination of months of hard work and the beginning of what will hopefully be long, fulfilling and meaningful careers.

We all arrived at the school with our own unique backgrounds, experiences and reasons for being here. For some, it has taken persistent effort to be given the opportunity to embark on this career. For all of us, the decision to begin this journey involved some level of sacrifice, stepping into an environment where we would likely encounter feelings of doubt and discomfort.

This experience has tested us all in different ways. Every one of us has proven the ability to push beyond the limits of our comfort zone and grow as firefighters. We can all reflect on times where the challenge felt insurmountable, and what helped us through it. Laughs and quiet words from our squad mates, advice that just clicked from an instructor, or the support from our partners or families, all contributed to knowing that we were not alone in this journey, and that we would get through.

Graduates of Trainee Firefighter School 95 have completed PUA20622 Certificate II in Public Safety (Firefighting and Emergency Operations) and PUA30622 Certificate III in Public Safety (Firefighting and Emergency Operations).

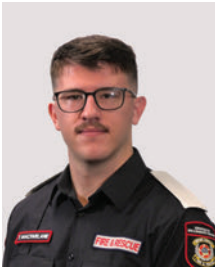

AWARDS

Institution of Fire Engineers Award

This award is sponsored by the Institution of Fire Engineers (IFE) Western Australia Group. It is presented to the graduate who has achieved the highest academic results throughout the course.

The IFE is a global organisation of fire professionals sharing expertise since 1928. The aim of the IFE is to build a safer society.

As a member organisation the IFE promotes, encourages and improves the science, practice and professionalism of fire engineering.

IFE members share a commitment to envisioning, preparing, mentoring and building for the future, ensuring that the fire profession remains relevant and valued, protecting people, property and the environment from fire.

IFE members, representing the whole spectrum of the fire sector, as well as giving to the Institution, benefit greatly from opportunities to meet, exchange views and develop professional networks and friendships on a global scale.

United Professional Firefighters Union of Western Australia Bob Woods AFSM Award

This award is sponsored by the United Professional Firefighters Union. In honour of former firefighter Bob Woods AFSM, it is presented to the graduate who has consistently achieved the highest results in practical assessments throughout the course.

Bob was a firefighter for nearly 28 years, serving at both the North Fremantle and Fremantle Fire Stations. In 1984 he began active service with the United Firefighters Union of Australia, eventually serving as the Union's National President and President of the Western Australian branch.

The Union's decision to name the award in honour of Bob for the best practical candidate pays tribute to a great man's dedication to the fire service through a lifetime of commitment and union involvement.

John McMahon AFSM Dux Award for Excellence

This award is presented to the graduate who has been the highest overall achiever throughout the course. It encompasses theoretical and practical assessment and general firefighting skills.

Previously known as the FESA Dux Award, the John McMahon AFSM Dux Award for Excellence has been renamed to honour an outstanding individual, former Chief Officer John McMahon AFSM, in recognition of his commitment and dedication to the Fire and Rescue Service of WA.

As the Fire and Rescue Service's longest serving firefighter, Mr McMahon commenced service in 1942, progressing over his career to become Chief Officer before retiring on 15 September 1992.

Beginning as an apprentice diesel mechanic with the WA Fire Brigades Board, Mr McMahon also trained as a firefighter and crewed appliances in this dual role. After being promoted, he was the first Station Officer to be appointed to the former Belmont Training Wing. Mr McMahon spent nearly ten years there and progressed through to the rank of Superintendent for Training.

Mr McMahon was involved in the WA Fire Brigades Historical Society after his retirement.

Mr McMahon made an outstanding contribution to firefighting throughout his long career and beyond and had an attachment to the Service for close to 70 years.

DFES is privileged to recognise Mr McMahon through the naming of the Dux Award for Excellence.
