Fall Watering Tips for Trees and Shrubs

Why Fall Watering Matters

- Root Growth Continues: Even as leaves drop, roots keep growing until the ground freezes. Moist soil helps them expand and strengthen.
- Winter Prep: Well-hydrated plants are better equipped to handle winter stress and avoid frost damage.
- **Dry Autumns**: Fall has been surprisingly dry, without supplemental watering, plants may enter winter dehydrated.



- Deep Soak: Water slowly and deeply leaving a hose on a slow trickle near the base of the trunk for 15-60 minutes. Water the plant to a depth of about 6-8 inches below root ball.
- **Frequency**: Once a week if there's no rain. For newly planted trees and shrubs twice a week for the first 6 weeks.
- **Timing**: Water in the morning to reduce evaporation and prevent fungal issues.
- **Until**: Newly planted evergreens should be watered till early December. Deciduous plants until all leaves have fallen.

T Bonus Tip

Add mulch (3 inches thick) around the base to retain moisture and insulate roots — just keep it a few inches away from the trunk to prevent rot.

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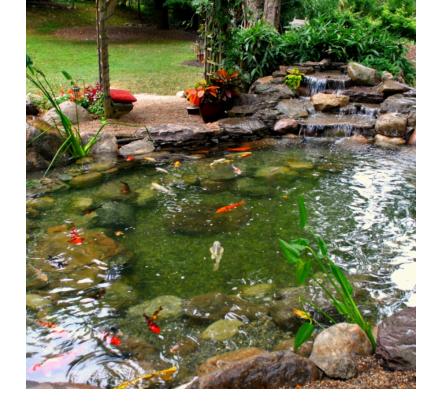
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Autumn to Ice: Transitioning Your Pond Through the Seasons



Fall Prep (Late September to November)

- Clean out debris: Remove fallen leaves, dead plants, and sludge to prevent decay and poor water quality.
- Trim aquatic plants: Cut back hardy plants and remove tropical ones that won't survive the cold.
- Install netting: Use pond netting to catch falling leaves and keep the pond clean.
- Stop feeding fish: As water temps drop below 10°C (50°F), switch to wheat germ-based food, then stop feeding entirely once it's consistently cold. Fish metabolism slows and they won't digest food well.
- Check equipment: Inspect pumps, filters, and aerators. Clean and store any equipment you won't use over winter.



- **Keep a hole in the ice**: Use a pond heater or aerator to maintain a small opening for gas exchange. This prevents toxic buildup under the ice.
- Remove or insulate pumps: If you leave a pump running, ensure it's deep enough not to freeze.
 Otherwise, remove and store it.
- **Protect fish**: Ensure the pond is deep enough (at least 18–24 inches) so fish can overwinter safely at the bottom.
- Avoid disturbing fish: Once they're dormant, don't poke around or try to move them. Let them rest.
