Bream Head Conservation Trust – Statement of Service performance 2024/2025

Our vision is to restore Bream Head/ Te Whara as a place in which natural ecology is restored, with healthy forest and abundant bird song and where everyone can experience nature at its best.

Community support remains the backbone of our conservation efforts, and we acknowledge with deep gratitude the many individuals who contribute their time, skills, and energy to the Reserve.

Educational Outcomes

The BHCT Education Committee, comprising Enviroschools and Kiwi North facilitators alongside four retired teachers, has met monthly over the past year. The committee continually reviews the education programme on offer and fine tunes content to meet the needs of visiting schools. Information for schools visiting the reserve has been shared to ensure schools are well prepared and able to make the most of learning opportunities. Website content has been updated to include the programme based at the nursery. Aspirations for future programme development were also discussed.

We have strengthened partnerships with the Enviroschools facilitators, who actively promote and participate in our education initiatives. Promotional brochures were distributed to schools through these facilitators and the programme has been promoted in their regular communications to schools to support wider outreach.

A new collaboration with Weed Action has been initiated, and we welcome their involvement in our education programme.

Over the year, 78 students participated in our on-site education programme, with an additional 23 unable to attend due to adverse weather conditions. Our relationship with Whangārei Heads School has deepened; students have visited the reserve, and our rangers have supported activities focused on *Kaitiakitanga* based at the school. Another



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local school, Parua Bay School, has also engaged with the programme, scheduling a large group visit this year.

Students from Whangārei Girls' High School attended two planting days at the reserve, an engagement we encouraged and facilitated

We are focused on promoting our programme across the district. In December, we participated in a Whangārei-wide teacher information evening. Our presentation was well received, resulting in multiple enquiries and two confirmed school visits for 2025.

BHCT again sponsored an Environmental Award at the Central North Science and Technology Fair. The award recognises student projects (Years 7–13) addressing biodiversity or biosecurity issues in Central Northland.

We were also approached by a teacher undertaking a 2026 Royal Society Science Fellowship, expressing interest in partnering with BHCT for their placement. While discussions are ongoing, this invitation is a testament to the credibility of our conservation education work.

Communications & Engagement Outcomes

We implemented a new database, using CiviCRM which will help us streamline BHCT's communications strategy. Previously isolated databases managed by different committees have now been consolidated. This centralised system enables targeted outreach—ranging from donor engagement and volunteer coordination to ranger updates and event promotions.

The committee coordinated the promotional campaign around our annual planting day, which incorporated announcements on the regional radio, adverts in school newsletters, on our website and social media, flyers at local businesses and road signs.

In partnership with the Northland Community Foundation, we produced and distributed





a new brochure highlighting our Endowment Fund. It featured in NCF's newsletter and is circulating within the community.

Due to ongoing demand, our general information brochure was reprinted in autumn, with 3,000 copies produced for summer distribution. Hopefully this will take us over next summer as well.

We also participated in Community Events. We had a station at the Funky Fishing Competition (major fundraiser for Whangārei Heads School). We ran a bird recognition activity for children. We also joined the Amazing Youth Volunteer Race (organised by Volunteering Northland). This event was held in Whangārei CBD. It introduced youth to BHCT's volunteer opportunities through interactive activities such as bird sound identification and seedling care.

We created a seabird-themed colouring page for our annual Conservation Week Colouring Competition engaging local schools and early childhood centres. It enjoyed strong participation again.

We decorated a tree at the Festival of Christmas Trees (St John's Golden Church). Our contribution to this creative community event helped raise awareness of our conservation efforts.

Regular articles appeared in the *Whangārei Heads Citizens Newsletter* (bi-monthly) and with articles in *Onerahi Orbit* we were able to reach our wider community.

The bi-monthly ranger reports were shared via Facebook, our website, and emailed to our subscriber's list.

Operational Outcomes

As Bream Head Conservation Trust (BHCT) marks 27 years of conservation at Bream Head Scenic Reserve, we reflect with pride on long-standing achievements, while acknowledging ongoing challenges that shape our strategic priorities.





Our native plant nursery, hosted by Rupert and Wendy Newbold, continues to play a vital role in revegetation work. All plantings are sourced from within the Reserve, ensuring genetic integrity and local adaptation.

Our annual survey of pūpūharakeke/flax snails showed the highest ever recorded at our two survey sites.

Our work continues to be underpinned by volunteer commitment. As founding members begin to transition, a new generation of conservationists is emerging—bringing energy, skills, and dedication to the Trust's mission.

Intensification and Innovation in Weed Control

BHCT has deepened collaboration with Aki Tai Here, a skilled local weed control team. Their expertise continues to enhance under-canopy weed management across the Reserve.

This year marked the successful trial of drone-assisted weed control—a first for the Department of Conservation (DOC) estate. Target species included moth plant and passion vine in steep terrain. The initial operation achieved an estimated 80–90% effectiveness. A second drone deployment targeted pampas grass, with results still maturing but similarly promising.

These operations, far more difficult to conduct manually, mark a significant advance in efficiency and safety.

Fundraising Outcomes

We remain deeply appreciative of the generous support we receive from individuals, families, local businesses, and funding partners. Every contribution—whether financial, in-kind, or volunteer time—directly supports practical conservation outcomes within the Reserve. Over the past year, we saw an increase of individuals or families donating to the Trust, a remarkable show of support given the challenging economic environment.

We continue to strengthen our connection with the local community through events and outreach, aiming to increase awareness and engagement. We also acknowledge the

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growing partnership with Channel Infrastructure, building on our historical relationship with Refining NZ. We thank Channel for their financial support and look forward to developing this relationship further. Northport has also contributed valuable in-kind support, such as bark chip for our restoration work.

Securing grant funding remains a critical focus. We extend our sincere thanks to our key funders:

- Foundation North a long-standing partner supporting our core operational costs.
- Lotteries for funding targeted pest plant control and contributing to ranger salaries.
- Pacific Development and Conservation Trust for supporting a strategic review of our pest plant control plan in collaboration with Weed Action and Aki Tai Here.
- Whangārei District Council for ongoing support of our nursery operations, education programme, and community planting events.
- Trees That Count for supporting our native planting initiatives in the Reserve.
- Pub Charity and Oxford Trust for contributing to essential operational expenses.
- Department of Conservation and Predator Free Whangārei for continued collaboration on key projects within the Reserve.

As financial conditions tighten, we recognise the increasing challenges facing community-based conservation. We remain committed to strengthening and diversifying our funding base to ensure the long-term sustainability and resilience of our work.

Community Support

"Volunteers don't get paid, not because they're worthless, but because they're priceless." – Sherry Anderson

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Volunteers are the heart and engine of the Bream Head Conservation Trust. From our governing board to the 100 volunteers who join us on planting days, thousands of hours are donated each year. Conservatively, their efforts equate to an annual commercial value of between \$100,000 and \$200,000.

These dedicated individuals carry out a wide range of activities: servicing trap lines, monitoring native plant growth, counting birds, surveying snails, hosting school groups, promoting our successes, and writing funding grants. They also tackle countless behind-the-scenes tasks—from bagging bait and washing root trainers to scaling steep terrain to refill bait stations.

Our 50 active volunteers, along with many friends and supporters, came together for two community events this year. One featured a guest speaker from the South Island who introduced exciting new technology for predator control and species monitoring.

We are deeply grateful for the time, energy, and dedication shown by our community.

Statement of Accounting Policies

Bream Head Conservation Trust For the year ended 31 March 2025

Basis of Preparation

This performance report has been prepared in accordance with the XRB's Tier 3 (NFP) Standard. The entity is eligible to apply these requirements as it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses equal to or less than \$5,000,000. All transactions in the Performance Report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate in the foreseeable future.

This is the entity's first performance report presented in accordance with XRB's Tier 3 (NFP) Standard. Upon transition to these standards the entity has complied with the General Provisions set out in Appendix B (Transitional arrangements) of the Tier 3 Framework and restated the comparative period figures.

Functional and Presentation Currency

The financial statements are presented in New Zealand dollars which is the Trust's functional and presentation currency, rounded to the nearest dollar (\$).

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

The entity is registered for GST. All amounts are stated exclusive of goods and services tax (GST) except for accounts payable and accounts receivable which are stated inclusive of GST.

Income Tax

Bream Head Conservation Trust is wholly exempt from New Zealand income tax having fully complied with all statutory conditions for these exemptions pursuant to section CW 41 of the Income Tax Act 2007.

Bank Accounts and Cash

Bank accounts and cash in the Statement of Cash Flows comprise cash balances and bank balances (including short term deposits) with original maturities of 90 days or less.

Debtors and Prepayments

Debtors are stated at estimated realisable value. Amounts not considered recoverable have been written off during the year.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Fixed Assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation.

Deprecation is charged using rates that reflect their estimated useful life as follows:

Buildings 2% - 40% DV Plant and Equipment 16% - 50% DV

Land comprises roading improvements which are not depreciated.

Traps are expensed in the year of purchase. This is on the basis that they have a low individual cost and a relatively short useful life.

Creditors and Accrued Expenses

Creditors and Accrued Expenses are recorded when an invoice has been received. Where goods have been received by the Trust or services performed for the Trust but no invoice has yet been received, an estimate of the amount to be paid has been accrued.

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Other Current Liabilities

Other Current liabilities are stated at the estimated amounts payable and include obligations which can be reliably estimated.

Other current liabilities include the amounts payable in the next financial period.

Revenue

General funding received from central or local government, grants from non-government organisations and capital grants

General funding or grants with no documented expectations over use

General funding received from central or local government, grants from non-government organisations and capital grants are recognised as revenue when the funds are received if there are no documented expectations over use.

General funding or grants with documented expectations over use

If funding is subject to documented expectations over use, the funds are initially recorded as deferred revenue. As the documented expectations over use are met, the deferred revenue is reduced and revenue is recorded

Donations, koha, bequests and other fundraising revenue

Donations and bequests received with no documented expectations over use

Donations, koha, bequests and other fundraising revenue with no documented expectations over use are recognised as revenue when cash is received.

Donations and bequests received with documented expectations over use

Donations, koha, bequests and other fundraising revenue with documented expectations are initially recorded as deferred revenue. As the documented expectations over use are met the deferred revenue balance is reduced and revenue is recorded.

Donated assets

Revenue from donated assets is recognised on receipt of the asset if the asset has a useful life of 12 months or more, and the current value of the asset is readily obtainable and significant. If the assets are difficult to value such as intangible assets, highly specialised assets, or heritage assets these are not recorded.

Sale of goods

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised when the goods are sold to the customer. This is recorded as other income on the basis that is neither a commercial or large scale activity.

Deferred revenue

Deferred revenue is recorded when a significant donation, grant, or bequest with documented expectations over use is received.

Deferred revenue is initially recorded at the amount received. As documented expectations over use are met the deferred revenue is reduced and revenue is recorded.

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Interest Revenue

Interest Revenue is recorded when earned.

Changes in Accounting Policies

The Society applied the Tier 3 (NFP) standard for the first time this year. As a result of the first-time application of this standard, significant aggregation changes to items in the statement of financial performance and the statement of cashflows were required.

There are no other changes in accounting policies.
